In consideration of HOUSE BILL 2044, HOUSE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO KEKAHA KAI STATE PARK

House Bill 2044, House Draft 1 proposes to appropriate funds to employ four full —time equivalent (4.0 FTE) state lifeguards at Kua Bay, Kekaha Kai State Park, and purchase lifeguard equipment. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this measure provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive Supplemental Budget request.

The Department currently has a contract with the County of Hawaii (County) for lifeguard services at Hapuna Beach State Recreation Area. There is currently no lifeguard protection for visitors to Kua Bay located at Kekaha Kai State Park and the Department would have to contract lifeguard services with the County. After Hapuna Beach, Kua Bay would be the next location to provide for lifeguard services as it has the most reported spinal cord injuries.

The funds for the Hapuna Beach lifeguard contract are derived from the State Parks Special Fund and Transient Accommodations Tax allotments. SECTION 2 of this measure appropriates general funds to hire and provide benefits for four full time permanent staff. Pursuant to the County of Hawaii information, the staffing costs would be around \$340,355 annually. SECTION 3 of this measure appropriates general funds to purchase equipment. The equipment costs would be around \$80,000.

The Department supports the appropriation of general funds to contract lifeguard services at Kua Bay.

Dear Senators and Committee members:

The Daniel R. Sayre Memorial Foundation <u>supports</u> HB 2044 HD1 which will provide life-saving Ocean Safety Officers at Kua Bay.

The purpose of this Foundation is to assist the Hawaii Fire Department in saving lives through the purchase of needed rescue equipment and training not afforded to them by the Hawaii County budget. We help to provide life-saving equipment to the Ocean Safety Division of the HFD and we are extremely concerned that Kua Bay does not have funding for Ocean Safety Officers.

For years, we have been hearing of near drownings, broken necks and drownings that have occurred at this unguarded beach. Off-duty lifeguards have saved countless lives at this location due to the treacherous currents and shore breaks which have put our community members and visitors at risk. Also for years, Representatives and Senators from Hawaii Island have been asking for financial support from the State budget to protect the visitors to this beach from having tragic endings. For years, the State Finance Committee has chosen to not fund Ocean Safety Officers for this dangerous beach and more lives have been lost. This is a State beach and therefore must be funded by the State.

It seems irresponsible to invite our visitors and community members to enjoy the beauty of Kua Bay and not provide protection for them. It is our feeling that the access to Kua Bay be closed or that protection for this Kua Bay be financed. Waiting another year to fund this Bill shouldn't even be a consideration. If charging an entrance fee to this location is necessary to fund the lifeguards, then we believe that most visitors would be more than happy to do so to receive the benefit of having trained Ocean Safety Officers present. Continuing to lose lives at Kua Bay is an enormous liability to the State of Hawaii and it is devastating for the families that are involved.

Please move HB 2044 HD1 through and provide the funding for our Ocean Safety Officers at Kua Bay.

my name is sean gallagher and i just retired from Ocean Safety, HFD last year. i am very familiar with Kua Bay. My wife (an ICU nurse from NHCH) and I visited there on a Christmas Day a couple of years ago. the pounding surf was 4-5 ft...there were 500 people on the beach and over 200 in the water. in the hour and a half we were there 3 people suffered shoulder dislocations and the HFD ambu rig was like a shuttle taking people to NHCH and Kona Hospital. the crazy thing?...not all wanted the ambulance. we spent the entire time dealing with this situation and had to leave. if any beach needs an LG tower it is this beach. it gets to 15-20 ft in the winter and is the definition of scary, chaotic and crazy. crowds go there even when the gate is locked due to High Surf warning.
