On behalf of the Hawaii members and supporters of The Humane Society of the United States, I appreciate the opportunity to submit this written testimony in support of HB2072 HD2 SD1, to limit the tethering of dogs, with an amendment.

HB2072 HD2 SD1 creates reasonable standards for chaining dogs who live outdoors, addressing a critical issue with impacts on both animal welfare and human health and safety. The legislation offers modest, common sense protections for Hawaii's dogs; it does not prohibit tethering. The bill:

- a) requires that dogs who are kept outdoors be provided proper and humane restraints, with collars and tethers that won't cause pain and suffering, and
- b) provides basic standards for the type of chain used, to prevent tangling and the inhibition of the dog's freedom of movement.

We do request an amendment to remove the "in lieu of" language in section 1 of the bill, amending subsection 4 of the statute. The courts already have the latitude not to issue fines or jail time for a misdemeanor.

So saying that the other may be imposed *in lieu of* jail time or fines doesn't grant any new latitude. Judges already know what sentences they can impose, based on the severity of the crime.

The "in addition to" language gives judges the ability to impose other penalties (i.e. performance of community service, mental health counseling, or attendance at educational classes concerning animal abuse prevention) – whether they do so in addition to or in lieu of jail time/fines – and we support its inclusion.

This story of Laki, a Big Island dog found near death with a chain embedded in his neck, aired on KHON on Tuesday, February 20, 2018, and is a prime example of why Hawaii needs stronger laws to prevent dangerous and inhumane tethering methods: http://khon2.com/2018/02/20/couple-nurses-chained-dog-back-to-health-as-new-bill-aims-to-protect-animals/. The Hawaii Association of Animal Welfare Agencies (HAAWA) supports the passage of House Bill 2072, HD2, SD1, which would prohibit the use of specific tethering equipment and techniques that are injurious to dogs.

HAAWA represents the four county animal service providers in the state of Hawaii. Our independent local nonprofits are united in support this change in policy.

The harmful tethering of dogs is an issue on all of our islands. The constant confinement and isolation of dogs is dangerous both for the animals and the people around them. Dogs are happiest when they are treated as close members of their human families.

The provisions of this bill are specific and enforceable. They will allow our humane investigators to educate dog owners so they can correct any violations and ensure that their animals are safe from harm. Educational outreach is the standard first step when investigating a reported violation of HRS 711-1109.

We do find the language on page 4, lines 2-7, of the bill to be unnecessary. Courts already have broad discretion to order community service, counseling and/or education in these cases.

The provisions in HB2072, HD2, SD1, have been endorsed in the prior two sessions by animal welfare groups and law enforcement, we urge you to pass this measure.

Thank you for considering our testimony on this important issue.

I strongly support this bill--to prohibit certain restraints and tethers that endanger, or deny sustenance, to a dog--although this is only a small step towards ending animal abuse.

This bill, when passed, should be effective in the year 2019 or before. There are countless dogs presently suffering and dying. Many more will suffer and die if this bill will wait until 2035. Rather, any form of animal abuse should be considered history by the time we find ourselves in 2035.

Chaining or tethering dogs must be banned altogether. Only during leashed walks or closely supervised activities should dogs be tied, for their own safety. Dogs are no different than human toddlers and must be treated and cared for as family members. They are not accessories, toys, security guards, hunting/killing tools, or slaves.

Aloha Senators,

As of 2017, there are about 21 states that have enacted tethering laws that are now in effect.

Of these 21 states, 17 clearly specify the manner in which a dog may be tethered by addressing parameters that include tether length and weight and collar type.

Current Hawaii law does address collar type but does not address tether length and weight.

By addressing tether length and weight, HB2072 SD1 gives Hawaii's LEOs clear and enforceable parameters to identify abusive tethering and help differentiate abusive tethering from reasonable restraint.

Further, HB2072 SD1 recognizes that abusive tethering can be the result of various motivations on the part of the offender.

Therefore HB2072 SD1 creates the option for the penalties to include mental health counseling and/or educational classes.

In a broader view, HB2072 SD1 speaks to Hawaii's recognition that animal abuse and domestic violence are inextricably linked.

This link is validated by credible agencies including the HSUS, SPCA, FBI, the International Association of the Chiefs of Police.

The animal abuse-domestic violence link has been verified by academic research in psychology, child development, sociology, social work, criminology, veterinary medicine, and law. (http://nationallinkcoalition.org)

Ending the animal-abuse-to-domestic-violence pipeline is a pressing societal need. For the sake of the most vulnerable among us, please pass HB2072 SD1 and make the effective date immediate or no later than 2019.
