In consideration of HOUSE BILL 2097, HOUSE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO LIFEGUARDS

House Bill 2097, House Draft 1 proposes to appropriate funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) to hire lifeguards to monitor state and county beach parks. The Department supports this measure with amendments provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive Supplemental Budget request.

The State does not have lifeguard positions and as a result, the Department contracts with the four counties to support lifeguard services at state beach parks under the jurisdiction of the Department's Division of State Parks, that have been identified as having both ocean conditions and a volume of patronage that warrants the critical need for trained water safety personnel. The total costs of the lifeguard contracts for four state beach parks under the jurisdiction of the Division of State Parks is just under \$3,000,000 and are funded through a creative variety of sources: general fund appropriations, special fund appropriations, and a portion of the Transient Accommodations Tax allocation.

Ideally – all four contracts would be funded via a commensurate increase in general funds, – including a targeted need for new lifeguard stations at Kua Bay at Kekaha Kai State Park with an additional \$375,000 for personnel costs.

This table illustrates the previous and current costs associated with providing the current lifeguard contracts.

The Department recommends that the bill be amended as follows, so that the appropriation be expended by the Department for state beach parks under the jurisdiction of the Division of State Parks, as the Department does not oversee county beach parks.

SECTION 1. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for the department of land and natural resources division of state parks to hire lifeguards to monitor state [and county] beach parks.

SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the tourism special fund the sum of \$1,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for the department of land and natural resources division of state parks to hire lifeguards to monitor state [and county] beach parks.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.

The Department supports this allocation, as it will greatly help to offset current costs.

Dear Chair Luke, Vice-Chair Cullen, and Members:

The Honolulu Emergency Services Department provides both Ocean Safety and Emergency Medical Services for the Island of Oahu. As to Ocean Safety, the Department is the contractor to the Department of Land and Natural Resources, State Parks Division, as the ocean safety and lifeguard services provider at Kaena Point State Park. The Department's Ocean Safety Division provides education, injury prevention, emergency medical response, and ocean rescue patrol and response services for all emergencies that arise on the beach and waters from the shoreline to 1 mile off-shore of the state park lands.

In 2016, the ocean safety staff performed 103,850 preventive actions, treated 3,364 minor medical issues, responded to and managed 44 major medical responses, and performed 64 ocean rescues. There were no reported fatalities at the State Park area, which stretches 3.5 miles from Makua Cave to Kaena Point. The area is heavily used for ocean and land recreation purposes, large social gatherings, and is one of the most remote locations on Oahu in terms of available emergency services support.

As noted in the preamble to HB2097, it is the City and County of Honolulu's ocean safety personnel who provide the lifeguard services that ensure the safety of the public which uses our state and county beach parks.

Due to collective bargaining, the cost of providing these services has increased in the past two years and is anticipated to increase again in the current fiscal year.


As the contracted service provider, the recovery of these increased costs is critical to ensuring the continued provision of these services. This Bill proposes to appropriate funds to ensure the continuation of these services.

The HLA strongly supports HB 2097 HD1, which would appropriate funds to the Department of Land and Natural Resources to hire lifeguards to monitor state and county beach patrs. Statistics compiled by the State Department of Health show that drowning is the fifth leading cause of unintentional injury deaths in Hawaii, and that the overwhelming majority of these fatal drownings involve occur at beaches that are not protected by lifeguards...

Chair Luke, Vice-Chair Cullen and Committee Members:

The Hawai'i Tourism Authority (HTA) **offers comments on HB2097 HD1**, which would appropriate an unspecified sum from the State's general revenues and from the Tourism Special Fund (TSF) for the fiscal year 2018-2019 to the Department of Land and Natural Resources Division of State Parks to hire lifeguards.

HTA agrees with the bill's intent to hire additional lifeguards, but believes that the funds required are best appropriated from Transient Accommodations Tax (TAT) revenues, rather than the TSF. Currently, under HRS § 237D-6.5, TAT revenues are allocated to the special land and development fund for this same purpose and are administered by the Department of Land and Natural Resources for the "protection, preservation, maintenance, and enhancement of natural resources, including beaches, important to the visitor industry."

HTA is actively involved in supporting State, county and community ocean safety programs, as well as programs focused on education and increasing visitor awareness of dangerous ocean conditions. These programs include the Junior Lifeguard Program, which HTA funded in 2017. Through this program, approximately 2,000 young residents were trained as community water safety ambassadors to enhance their ocean safety awareness and water rescue skills. HTA is also a partner to the State's Drowning and Spinal Injury Prevention Advisory Committee, which works collaboratively to address water safety.

For these reasons, HTA believes that there are more appropriate ways than the TSF to fund the hiring of additional lifeguards to monitor state and county beach parks without impeding the State's ability to attract and retain visitors. Thus, HTA proposes the bill be amended to allocate monies from TAT revenues, instead of from the TSF.
