



Dear WAM Chair, Vice Chair and members,

I am a Master Gardener in the CTAHR Master Gardener program. I am in strong support of SB2115 for a number of reasons.

This bill will allow more Hawaii keiki to take part in gardening and food-related activities. Hawaii is sorely in need of more vegetable and fruit farmers. If children participate in gardening activities from a young age, they are more likely to select farming as a career or choose to have a home garden when they get older, both of which will increase sustainable agriculture in our state.

When children learn to recognize fruits and vegetables while gardening, they are more likely to incorporate these healthier foods into their diets. These new habits can and do carry over to their home life as well.

Working outside in a garden adds healthy physical activity to a child's day. This is of utmost importance in helping to curb the epidemic of obesity and chronic diseases (diabetes, heart disease) in children and young adults. Mental health is also benefitted by activities in nature.

Children working in gardens learn the values of recycling and caring for the land. Many of our keiki have little exposure these days to the importance of caring for the soil, valuing fresh water and being mindful of all living things in our ecosystem.

All of these benefits go home with the children at night and can have positive effects on Hawaii families, not to mention the increased food sustainability for our state.

Please support and adequately fund HB2115 this year to move the needle forward on sustainable agriculture in Hawaii. Investing in our youth in this way will pay off in the long run.
