Title of Bill: HB 2225, HD1 RELATING TO INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY.

Purpose of Bill: Provides the Chief Information Officer with full discretion to require

independent verification and validation of the information technology projects if certain criteria are met. Requires certain information technology projects to adhere to statewide information technology governance and provides a review process developed by the Chief Information Officer for the information technology project. (HB2225

HD1)

Department's Position:

The Department of Education (Department) understands the intent of HB 2225, HD1 and appreciates the value of independent verification and validation (IV&V) of IT projects to ensure the transparency and quality of technology in the State of Hawaii.

We strongly recommend that technology audit approaches follow best practices for audits and ensure general separation of duties. Specifically, audits should be conducted by a separate organization reporting to the senior-most level available. Similar to how financial audits should not be conducted under the direction of the Chief Financial Officer, technology audits should not be conducted under the direction of the Chief Information Officer. This would include the separate auditing organization having the authority to identify IT projects for IV&V based on a standard list of criteria.

The state established a separate governance model for the Department through the establishment of a Board of Education to meet the unique needs of a K-12 educational system. This model currently provides transparent and public information on the Department's operations, including technology, in a manner to meet the needs of education.

The current organizational model gives the Department's chief information officer the responsibility for monitoring, oversight, and accountability over its Information Technology (IT)

resources, systems, and services. The Department therefore already has a model in place that ensures independent verification and validation of technology initiatives, separation of duties, audit best practices, and transparency to the public, through reporting by the Department's Office of Internal Audit to the Board of Education's Audit Committee. An overlapping IV&V/audit process would be duplicative in public resources and cost to both the Department and to the State Chief Information Officer.

The Hawaii State Department of Education seeks to advance the goals of the Strategic Plan which is focused on student success, staff success, and successful systems of support. HOUSE BILL NO. 2225 HD1 RELATING TO INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Dear Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen and members of the committee:

I am Todd Nacapuy, Chief Information Officer for the State of Hawai'i and head of the Office of Enterprise Technology Services (ETS), testifying **in support, with comments,** of HB. 2225 HD1, Relating to Information Technology, which provides the Chief Information Officer discretion to require independent verification and validation of information technology projects, and require certain information technology projects to follow statewide information technology governance review processes.

This bill amends Section 27-43 to include the mandatory governance process for information technology (IT) programs and projects that is now in place for the Executive Branch. During the past year, this IT governance process has demonstrated its value to maximize IT resources, increase efficiency, reduce waste, and improve transparency and accountability. The methodical reviews and monitoring processes ensure those projects achieve intended objectives and provide clear return on investments.

The bill further emphasizes the importance of third party, independent verification and validation (IV&V) reviews, where appropriate, to ensure that State modernization projects are successful. ETS is presently coordinating several IV&V contracts with departments, as required under Section 27- 43.6 that became effective on July 1, 2017.

The current statute is silent about who funds and accounts for IV&V costs. To correct this ambiguity, we request the committee consider adding the language below to clarify that when departments know that IV&V will be required, they include estimated IV&V costs in their budget and spending requests:

(b) If the chief information officer identifies an information technology project for independent verification and validation, the sponsoring department or agency shall <u>budget for and pay the</u> <u>independent verification and validation costs and</u> cooperate with the chief information officer and the independent verification and validation contractor during the independent verification and validation process. <u>The chief information officer is responsible for procuring, administering, and managing the IV&V services.</u>

This will more accurately depict and record total costs of large IT projects.

Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen, and Committee Members:

My name is Christine Sakuda and I serve as the executive director of Transform Hawai'i Government (THG), a coalition of organizations and individuals who believe in improving government services for every Hawai'i resident on every island. THG supports House Bill 2225 HD1, Relating to Information Technology, which provides the Chief Information Officer (CIO) with full discretion to require independent verification and validation (IV&V) of state information technology (IT) projects if certain criteria are met.

THG was established to promote an open, transparent and responsive Hawai'i government. We advocate improving government business practices through technology to ensure government employees, residents and businesses have convenient and secure access to reliable information and data on demand. Our goal is to have government services streamlined, integrated and delivered in ways that exceed the expectations of the public and the needs of Hawai'i businesses.

We therefore support the passage of HB 2225 HD1 to enhance statewide IT governance processes launched by the CIO in 2015 and strengthened over subsequent years.

More recently, in passing <u>Senate Bill 850 HD2 CD1</u> (Act 37, SLH 2017), the Legislature last year acknowledged the importance of third-party, independent reviews, where appropriate, to ensure state IT modernization projects succeed. THG agrees with legislators that IV&V plays a critical role in the effective execution of complex modernization initiatives, as well as the unique position the CIO may serve in ensuring IV&V assessments remain independent, as an industry best practice.

This bill provides clarity by identifying criteria under which the CIO may determine what projects will need IV&V.

To provide further clarity in the area of budgeting, we urge the committee to consider additional proposed language to specify that the sponsoring department or agency shall cover the IV&V cost as part of the respective project's appropriation.
