Subject: HB 2229, Relating to Intoxicating Liquor Hearing: Thursday, February 1, 2018, at 2:00 pm

This testimony is to convey my strong support for HB 2229. On November 1, 2017, the Honolulu City Council unanimously adopted Resolution 17-274, which urged the Legislature to enact legislation found in HB 2229. This measure will address several intractable problems currently affecting our communities and are areas where we need to improve the enforcement powers of the Honolulu Liquor Commission and Honolulu Police Department.

It may come as a surprise to many that liquor establishments in Hawai'i are not required by law to ask for a person's official state driver's license or other form of personal identification prior to selling him or her liquor. By the same token, law enforcement is unable to require a person to present identification solely due to the fact that he or she is consuming alcohol at an establishment. Consequently, even if a person who appears to be under 21 is consuming liquor, law enforcement is unable to force that person to present identification and in many cases, that person will simply say that he or she forgot her identification at home.

The "Identification required" amendments in this bill will help curb underage drinking. It requires licensees to check a person's identification prior to selling that person liquor, and in turn, requires a person consuming liquor at a licensed establishment to carry identification. The responsibility to check for proper identification unambiguously lies with the establishment, and it is the responsibility of those wishing to consume liquor to carry identification. These safeguards will deter those under 21 from illegally consuming liquor.

In addition to the existing hurdles associated with enforcing underage drinking, law enforcement faces additional hurdles with people drinking on private property that is accessible to the public. There are reportedly many instances where people are congregating and drinking on a business' private property after hours. However, there are no ramifications for these actions unless the property owner asks law enforcement to trespass them. In many cases, the owner refuses to trespass them in fear of retaliation.

The "Posting of license" and section 281-78(a)(5) amendments in this bill will help eliminate the problem of people congregating and drinking in a licensed establishment's parking lot after hours. It unambiguously requires that there be express written consent by the licensee, placing

the burden on those consuming liquor on the licensed premises. Additionally, this law has some "teeth," clearly stating that a person found to be in violation will be guilty of a misdemeanor.

Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to submit testimony. For the foregoing reasons, I respectfully request your passage of HB 2229.

RESOLUTION

URGING THE LEGISLATURE TO ENACT LEGISLATION PROHIBITING THE CONSUMPTION OF LIQUOR ON THE PREMISES OF LICENSED LIQUOR ESTABLISHMENTS AFTER HOURS AND REQUIRING THE CARRYING OF IDENTIFICATION BY, AND CHECKING THE IDENTIFICATION OF, PERSONS BUYING OR CONSUMING LIQUOR ON THE PREMISES OF LICENSED LIQUOR ESTABLISHMENTS.

WHEREAS, the regulation of the consumption of alcoholic beverages in public is necessary to preserve the public's health, safety, and welfare; and

WHEREAS, nuisance activity involving the public consumption of alcoholic beverages, underage drinking, loitering, and disturbing the peace, has been observed within the parking lots of establishments licensed to sell liquor after such establishments have closed; and

WHEREAS, Section 281-78(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes, provides that establishments licensed to sell liquor shall not permit any liquor to be consumed on the premises of the licensee or on any premises connected therewith, except as permitted by the terms of the establishments' licenses; and

WHEREAS, however, such establishments may be unstaffed during their hours of closure and lack viable means by which to manage and control nuisance activity on their properties after business hours; and

WHEREAS, the enactment of legislation to address the consumption of alcohol on the premises of licensed liquor establishments after hours of operation is needed; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City and County of Honolulu that this body urges the Hawaii State Legislature to enact legislation, as proposed in Exhibit A attached to this resolution, that would prohibit the consumption of liquor on the premises of licensed liquor establishments after hours and require persons consuming liquor on the premises of licensed liquor establishments to carry identification and the staff of the establishments to check identification prior to serving such persons with or selling them liquor; and



.B. NO. 1 2 3 4 A BILL FOR AN ACT 5 6 RELATING TO INTOXICATING LIQUOR. 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII: 8 SECTION 1. Section 281-71, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 9 amended to read as follows: 10 "§281-71 Posting of license. Every license issued and in 11 effect under this chapter shall at all times be conspicuously 12 posted and exposed to view, convenient for inspection, on the 13 licensed premises. The licensee shall also post a copy of the 14 license where it will be clearly visible to persons in any 15 parking lot immediately adjacent to the licensed premises. The 16 licensee shall post, adjacent to the posted copy of the license 17 and in any other parking lot under the control of or operated in 18 conjunction with the licensed establishment, a notice that the 19 provisions of section 281-78(a)(5) are applicable. - 7 (4) Possess or keep, while on any sidewalk or common area

Subject: House Bill No. 2229, Relating to Intoxicating Liquor

I am Gordon Lum Kee, Acting Major of District 6 (Waikiki) of the Honolulu Police Department, City and County of Honolulu.

The Honolulu Police Department supports House Bill No. 2229, Relating to Intoxicating Liquor. The passage of this bill would require personal identification for any person consuming liquor on any licensed premises and would require licensees to be responsible for checking the personal identification of any person wishing to purchase liquor.

In addition, it would require the licensee to post a copy of their license in any parking lot under the control of or operated in conjunction with the licensed establishment. It would prohibit anyone from consuming liquor on such premises after their hours of operation, without the express written permission of the license. The intent of this bill is good as it would give enforcement powers to law enforcement to address persons consuming liquor on the private property of the licensee while not open for business. Recommend amending some of the language in the HRS section 281-71 in order to provide more clarity in order to assist with enforcement efforts.

Comments on HB 2229, Relating to Intoxicating Liquor

Dear Chair Takumi, Vice Chair Ichiyama, and Members:

The Liquor Commission, City and County of Honolulu (Commission), appreciates the opportunity to submit testimony providing comments on House Bill 2229, relating to Liquor.

This bill requires that identification be carried by those persons consuming liquor on any licensed premises, and requiring the licensees to check the identification of persons wishing to purchase liquor, prior to the selling or serving of liquor to that person.

The Commission strongly supports this portion of the bill as it will clearly impact the ability of a minor to purchase or to be served liquor in a licensed establishment. While existing laws prohibit the sale or furnishing of liquor to a person under the age of 21 years old, there is no legal requirement for that individual purchasing the liquor to provide proof of age when purchasing. There is also no present legal requirement to check or verify the identification of a person buying or consuming liquor is the age of 21 or older.

In addition, the Commission would like to include the following language:

This provision does not apply if a person is under the age of twenty-one, with parental authorization, is participating in a controlled purchase as part of a law enforcement activity or a government authorized statistical study under the direct Committee on Consumer Protection & Commerce Thursday, February 1, 2017 2:00 PM; Room 329 Page 2

the age of twenty-one.

The Commission fully supports the amendments to HRS 281-71 with language on page 3, paragraph 5, line 9, regarding "any parking lot immediately adjacent to the licensed premises" removed.
