The YWCA O'ahu supports House Bill 2389 HD1 SD1, which would make money available upon release.

This bill appropriates funding for "gate money", which although a small amount at \$200, will help people get from the gate to their first paycheck. People leave incarceration with nothing. If they were lucky enough to work while incarcerated, their meager 25 cent an hour earnings have likely been absorbed through restitution collection, purchasing necessary items, and expensive phone calls to maintain connections with family and friends. A small amount of money to get someone through their first few days is vital.

The YWCA O'ahu respectfully requests that this committee report favorably on House Bill 2389 HD1 SD1.

SUPPORT HB 2389 HD1, SD1 - THE "DON'T BLAME US" HPA BILL

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran and Members of the Committee!

My name is Kat Brady and I am the Coordinator of Community Alliance on Prisons, a community initiative promoting smart justice policies in Hawai`i for more than two decades. This testimony is respectfully offered on behalf of the families of **ASHLEY GREY, DAISY KASITATI, JOEY O`MALLEY, JESSICA FORTSON AND ALL THE PEOPLE WHO HAVE DIED UNDER THE "CARE AND CUSTODY" OF THE STATE** as well as the approximately 5,500 Hawai`i individuals living behind bars or under the "care and custody" of the Department of Public Safety on any given day. We are always mindful that approximately 1,600 of Hawai`i's imprisoned people are serving their sentences abroad thousands of miles away from their loved ones, their homes and, for the disproportionate number of incarcerated Kanaka Maoli, far, far from their ancestral lands.

Community Alliance on Prisons supports gate money along with resources and a reentry plan for those exiting incarceration. This bill does nothing, except to put in statute that the reason that no gate money is provided to individual's exiting incarceration is that the legislature never appropriated money for that purpose.

In our recollection, the Hawai'i Paroling Authority has never asked for an appropriation for gate money. Therefore, this bill is to hold them blameless for not providing gate money when they *could* and *should be* asking for an appropriation to help facilitate reentry.

Mahalo for this opportunity to testify.
