HB2508 RELATING TO CHARTER SCHOOLS

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Administration will recommend that the Board of Trustees <u>SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS</u> HB2508, which would provide funding to the State Public Charter School Commission for charter schools' infrastructure costs, rental or lease of facilities, and repair and maintenance of network infrastructure. This measure would help alleviate the unique financial burdens borne by start-up public charter schools in meeting their basic facilities needs.

Addressing public charter schools' facilities needs has been a critical and longstanding issue in the charter school community. Currently, start-up charter schools must pay for their substantial facilities costs using their already-stretched operational funds. This is a cost that is not borne by conversion charter schools, or schools under the Hawai'i Department of Education.

Significantly, the State Board of Education (BOE) has recognized the importance of our public charter schools, as an integral component of our public education strategy. On December 6, 2016, the BOE approved an updated State Education Strategic Plan for 2017-2020, which describes "the shared objectives for equity and excellence for every child across Hawai'i's nearly 300 public schools, including our public charter schools and Hawaiian language medium schools"; the Plan includes the objective that "Hawai'i public schools will foster innovation and the expansion of existing public school 'Bright Spots,' which includes learning from charter schools that were established as innovation labs" (emphasis added).

Hawai'i's public charter schools are indeed deserving of equity, and have already demonstrated their potential for innovation and excellence notwithstanding their unique financial challenges. Most recently, public charter schools have achieved high rankings in the latest Strive HI SY 2016-2017 performance scores, with certain public charter schools even dominating in certain indicators; lessons learned in such high-performing charter schools can benefit students and schools throughout our public education system. To fully realize the potential for innovation in charter schools that may in turn foster greater student success in our public school system as a whole, it is critical that public charter schools receive adequate appropriations for facilities funding. HB2508 will help bring equity to charter schools and address the longstanding problem of financing charter schools' facilities.

As this measure notes, Act 234, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015, authorized a framework for providing facilities funding and support for public charter school facilities with adequate

prioritization, oversight, and accountability by the charter school facilities funding work group convened by the state public charter school commission.

However, it has recently been brought to OHA's attention that provisions of Act 234,now codified in HRS §302D-29.5(a), which provide that legislative appropriations and bond authorizations related to charter school facilities are for the "design, planning, construction, repair, and maintenance of public charter school improvements to address issues of health, safety, and legal compliance; expand or improve instructional space; provide for food services; or provide restroom facilities[,]" may not currently authorize funding for rental or lease of charter school facilities, a major facilities cost for start-up schools. Accordingly, OHA recommends that HB2508 be revised to add a new section amending HRS §302D-29.5(a) to better accomplish this measure's intent of allowing funding for rental or lease of facilities.

OHA further recommends that self-referential language be deleted from HRS §302D-29.5(a) for clarification purposes. In particular, HRS §302D-29.5(a) states in part: "The appropriation and bond authorization for charter schools shall be separate from, and in addition to, any appropriation made to charter schools pursuant *to this section and* section 302D-28" (emphasis added). OHA notes that section 302D-28 pertains to per-pupil funding, which is distinct from facilities funding. However, OHA respectfully submits that the language in section 302D-29.5 requiring appropriations under that section to be kept separate from appropriations pursuant to the same section is confusing and recommends its removal.

Accordingly, OHA recommends the inclusion of an additional Section in this measure, to be appropriately inserted and to read as follows:

"SECTION 2. Section 302D-29.5 is amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

"(a) Beginning with the 2016-2017 fiscal year, and each fiscal year thereafter, the legislature shall consider making an appropriation and bond authorization to the commission for the design, planning, construction, repair, and maintenance of public charter school improvements to address issues of health, safety, and legal compliance; expand or improve instructional space; provide for rental or lease of facilities; provide for food services; or provide restroom facilities. The appropriation and bond authorization for charter schools shall be separate from, and in addition to, any appropriation made to charter schools pursuant to [this section and] section 302D-28. These amounts shall be prioritized for allocation by the charter school facilities funding working group."

Therefore, OHA urges the Committee to <u>PASS WITH AMENDMENTS</u> HB2508. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify on this important measure.

Chair Woodson, Vice Chair Kong, and members of the Committee:

The State Public Charter School Commission ("Commission") appreciates the opportunity to submit this testimony in **SUPPORT of HB 2508**, which would provide facility funding to charter schools for infrastructure costs, the rental or lease of charter school facilities, and the repair and maintenance of network infrastructure.

Facilities costs for charter schools is one of the greatest unaddressed challenges for Hawaii's chartering system. Facilities funding has been and continues to be a long-standing issue for charter schools.

In school year 2016-2017, charter schools expended approximately \$10.4 million for rent/lease payments, repair and maintenance, and utilities payments. The needs of each individual charter school vary greatly as evidenced by the range of facility-related expenses, which start at about \$41,000 to a high of \$1.3 million. The reasons for this wide disparity can be attributed to the wide range of facilities that charter schools operate in, which include former Department of Education schools, unused state facilities, private buildings, and new campuses built from scratch.

Any support provided by this committee and the Legislature would go far in addressing the challenge that charter schools have faced in regards to facilities funding.

On behalf of the Hawaii Public Charter School Network (HPCSN), I respectfully submit our testimony for HB 2508, Relating to Charter Schools.

HPCSN strongly supports this bill to appropriate funds for infrastructure costs, the rental or lease of charter school facilities and the repair and maintenance of network infrastructure of charter schools. Passing this bill represents a significant step toward providing equity for all Hawaii public school students.

Both conversion and start up charter schools receive the same level of per pupil funding to provide for its instructional operations, but most public schools, there is no separate facilities budget for start-up charter schools or additional capital budget for conversion charter schools. So, if a conversion charter school—a former DOE schools whose facilities maintenance and repair costs continue to be provided the state—decides to build on to or modernize its existing facilities, that new capital, equipment and future maintenance cost now becomes a new financial obligation that school must secure. This is a problem because facilities are a major expense for charter schools and represent the biggest gap in equity for public charter school students.

Many of Hawaii's charter schools pay for facilities and maintenance costs from a per pupil allocation --\$7383/student in SY17-18--that is intended for instructional needs. Median facilities costs, not including repair and maintenance, are about nine percent of a charter school's annual budget. However, facilities, repair and maintenance, can costs vary widely and sometimes are as high as 30 percent of the per pupil allocation. This means charter schools may lose anywhere from 10 to 30 percent of its per pupil instructional dollars. This also means that limited per pupil dollars must stretch further to pay for salary increases and

any bonuses required by state collective bargaining contracts, curriculum and programs, equipment and supplies, utilities, any school meal or transportation costs provided, and a mountain of other expenses required to run a school.

Research shows a significant relationship between the condition of school facilities and student performance. It's true there is a great variance in the condition of facilities from charter school to charter school. U.S. Department Agriculture below-market interest loans and other federally subsidized charter school facilities loans have underwritten the costs to build several charter schools over the years. But some charter schools now are still lacking even the most basic needs like classrooms with walls, flooring, windows and doors; plumbed bathroom facilities; school kitchens and cafeterias; and other weather-proofed spaces we would typically see in a public school. HPCSN believes every student is deserving of safe public school facilities including those who chose to enroll in public charters. For these reasons, we advocate for the equitable treatment of all public school students and humbly ask your support for this bill to appropriate facilities funding for charter schools.

Mahalo for your consideration. HPCSN works to improve the operation and governance of public charter schools in Hawai'i and to be a voice for children and families that seek choices and quality in an independent public-school setting.

Chair Woodson and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii State Teachers Association <u>supports HB 2508</u>, relating to charter schools.

Facilities funding is a long-standing issue for charter schools. In Hawai'i, start-up charter schools have paid the costs of their facilities from operational funds. In 2013, however, lawmakers authorized the Hawai'i State Public Charter School Commission to request facilities funding as part of its annual budget request Later, in 2015, legislators called for a working group to establish a framework for providing facilities funding and support for public charter school facilities with adequate prioritization, oversight, and accountability.

Today, amounts received by charter schools fail to keep pace with the cost of providing and quality instruction and maintaining adequate facilities. Charter schools receive \$7,323 per-pupil, most of which is disbursed toward operational expenses, often leaving charters to rely on private donations to fund facilities and rent. Charter schools' per-pupil operating funds cover items like salaries, collective bargaining costs, curricula, school supplies, equipment, and utilities, but do not encompass the facilities and maintenance costs that comprise approximately 10 percent of charter school budgets, according the Hawai'i Public Charter Schools Network.

Poorly funded charter schools are sometimes forced to hold classes in unstable temporary structures to the detriment of their students' learning and safety.

Accordingly, we urge the committee to approve additional state funds for the repair, maintenance, acquisition, and rental of charter school facilities. We also encourage your committee to consider ways of improving charter school facilities funding over the long-term, rather than through one-year legislative add-ons, to ensure that our state's charter school students have the opportunity to receive instruction in $21^{\rm st}$ Century facilities that prepare them for today's cutting-edge workplace.

To provide charter schools with the funds they need for their students to succeed, the Hawaii State Teachers Association asks your committee to **support** this bill.

Honorable Chair Woodson and committee members:

I am Kris Coffield, representing IMUAlliance, a nonpartisan political advocacy organization that currently boasts over 400 members. On behalf of our members, we offer this testimony in support of House Bill 2508, relating to charter schools.

Public charter schools serve as sources of scholastic innovation. While many charter schools operate in urban areas, others meet the academic needs of remote areas lacking comprehensive public school facilities and programming. Additionally, many charter schools provide immersive instruction in Native Hawaiian culture and language. Yet, charter schools receive inadequate funding to support student learning. While traditional DOE schools receive \$12,855 per-pupil each year, charter schools receive \$7,323 per-pupil, out of which must be paid operational costs including curricula, salaries, and school supplies, leaving little for facilities, maintenance, and rent. Although the Hawai'i State Public Charter School Commission may request facilities funding as part of its annual budget request, amounts received in recent fiscal years have not satisfied the rising cost of providing and maintaining quality facilities. In turn, charter schools that lack adequate building space are forced to conduct class outdoors, on covered lanais, or in unsafe provisional structures.

To compensate for insufficient facilities funding, charter schools often seek revenue from nongovernmental, nonprofit, and corporate entities. While all charter schools in Hawai'i are required to operate as public schools, forcing charter schools to rely on nongovernmental funding sources increases private involvement in charter school programming, which undermines public accountability of the state's charter school network. Furthermore, reliance on private funding by public charter schools could generate

efforts to establish private charter schools and private charter school authorizers in Hawai'i, which would transfer control of public education to private entities and erode available resources for traditional public schools. To maintain the public status of charter schools, then, lawmakers should appropriate additional public funds to allocated by the HSPCSC based on need and financial performance.

Aloha Esteemed Representatives,

I am writing in support of HB 2509 to provide equitable funding for charter schools to provide adequate facilities, meal service, and transportation. The inequity in funding of our public schools is extreme! In addition to the already substantial difference of about \$2k per pupil between the Weighted Student Formula (WSF) funding provided to Department schools, and the Per Pupil (PPA) funding provided to public charter schools, Department schools do not have to pay for facilities, meals, transportation, and several other line items out of their own budgets as each of these are handled by a different office in the Department of Education.

As Principal of The Volcano School of Arts & Sciences, I do not value charter schools over DOE schools or vice versa. Rather, I believe in providing options with diverse learning environments for the diverse students in our communities. I agree whole-heartedly with Keoni Jeremiah (DOE Ka'u-Kea'au-Pahoa Complex Area Superintentent) when he says, "they are all our kids." Providing equitable funding for public charter schools is simply the minimum necessary to meet our students' needs while they are with us. Equitable funding for charter schools helps all children, and helps Hawai'i!

Ke Kula 'o Samuel M. Kamakau **strongly supports** the appropriation of funds for infrastructure costs, the rental or lease of charter school facilities, and the repair and maintenance of network infrastructure of charter schools for the following reasons-

- 1. Funding is an important issue, as charter schools struggle to meet our many expenses with the modest per-pupil funding and no food, transportation or facilities support. Public charter schools receive inadequate funding to support student learning and NO funding to support the rising costs to develop, repair and maintain our public school facilities.
- 2. Hawai'i Charter Schools are PUBLIC schools in the State of Hawai'i. Our students deserve access to safe and high-quality charter school facilities. While we have developed our campus with the support of our non-profit organization through a USDA loan, other charters are still operating under tents and portable toilets on a daily basis.
- 3. Kamakau is currently working on five capital improvement projects to expand our campus as our enrollment increases in specific grade levels. Our project for a permanent Hale 'Aina (cafeteria/school gathering site) is on-going and pending further fundraising from the school and our Governing Board. This structure will directly address the health and safety of our students by removing them from consuming their lunch in the existing muddy area on picnic tables during rainy days. This is a priority of the Governing Board but also depends heavily on receiving adequate funding to support our programs.

Once again, we are in STRONG SUPPORT of HB2508 to appropriate charter school facilities funding. In closing, we would like to thank the House Committee on Education for this opportunity to share our mana'o.

Our local public charter schools provide many different models for learning, including: project-based learning, arts integration, Hawaiian culture, Hawaiian language immersion, voyaging, a focus on sustainability and the environment, and blended in-person and online learning, to name just a few.

Unfortunately, many of these public schools are on unequal footing when it comes to basic facilities support, making it much more difficult for educators to focus on providing the best possible education for students. Even successful school leaders have described facilities costs as "crippling," and many schools have reported spending significant portions of their budget on facilities - funds that could be going directly to enhancing student learning. While traditional Department of Education public schools receive more than \$12,500 per student and do not have to pay for facilities or utilities, charter schools get by with just over \$7,000 per pupil while paying for facilities, utilities and repairs in one of the most expensive real estate markets in the nation.

We all want to see kids in our public schools succeed, so we should ensure that all of these schools are equipped with the fundamental resources they need to provide an excellent education.

In fiscal year 2008 our per pupil allocation was at about \$8500. Ten years later, it has not even kept up with the cost of living increases. We as charter school students are not given the equal funds as those who attend D.O.E. schools. A question asked by students at my school is, "Why can't we use this facility?" It saddens me deeply to hear young kids at my school ask their teachers such questions. Charter school teachers and students alike find ways to fundraise just enough money to pay for half of what is needed. The rest is out of pocket. On the other hand, D.O.E. schools get the funds they need for their facilities, sometimes more. Yet both D.O.E. schools and charter schools are held to the same standards. I ask you, how is this fair?

My school runs from Pre-K up to 12th grade. All ages at some point in the day are made to sit outside on old, mud-encrusted picnic tables under a tent for lunch. Which is sometimes taken down because of the windy conditions in Kaneohe. And depending on the weather is sometimes muddy and slippery. It's a health and a safety hazard. We've tried temporary solutions, but they seem to fade away because of the that rain washes the hay away or because we can't afford the mats we need. We have two other facilities on the campus that aren't in use because we can't afford to set up the water system and electricity. If we're given the funds we need, we won't be forced to worry about possibly injuring ourselves or being unable to focus because of the uncomfortably crammed class sizes. I hope you folks take into consideration the equally important and very well underfunded charter schools' needs. Thank you for your time.
