Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen, and Members of the House Committee on Finance.

The Office of Planning (OP) supports House Bill 2547, HD 1, provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact the priorities indicated in the Executive Budget. HB 2547, HD 1 establishes the "Hawaii Sustainability Act," including an office of sustainability, and a state sustainability special fund. HB 2547, HD 1 establishes a legal framework to serve as a foundation for the State of Hawaii's sustainability practices in addition to the Hawaii State Planning Act's sustainability priority guidelines and principles set forth in HRS § 226-108. HB 2547, HD 1 also establishes an office of sustainability within DBEDT and appropriates \$2 million in general funds to be deposited in a state sustainability special fund.

Pursuant to Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) § 226-108 and the Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2016, the Office of Planning recently filled a new sustainability coordinator position in 2017 to establish statewide sustainability planning and implementation of our state's sustainability goals and policies.

The Office of Planning supports the development of a legal framework and foundation to assist the development and implementation of sustainability planning, practices, and projects statewide.

The Office of Planning notes that the introducer's intentions were to establish this proposed office as an attached agency to the department, and offers the following amendments:

1) Establish the office of sustainability to be a part of the department of business, economic development, and tourism, for administrative purposes.

Require the director's appointment to be nominated by the governor and, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, by clarifying the appointment process for the director of the office of sustainability, under subsection (b), page 7, lines 6-17 of HB 2547, HD 1:

The director shall be nominated by the governor and, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, appointed by the governor without regard to chapter 76 and shall be compensated at a rate determined by the governor. The director shall report to the director of business, economic development, and tourism, and shall not be required to report directly to any other principal executive department.

3) Allow the office of sustainability to create rules subject to HRS Chapter 91 by adding:

The office of sustainability shall adopt, amend, or repeal rules relating to matters within its jurisdiction in the manner prescribed in chapter 91.

- Deleting the establishment of the State Sustainability Special Fund, while allowing the office to collect of investment earnings, gifts, donations, other income, rebates, grants, incentives, and capital appropriations. Should these funds be made available to the office of sustainability, the office may administratively establish a new account or fund pursuant to HRS § 37-40 and § 37-52.5.
- 5) Suggesting that the positions and operating costs be General Funded rather than Special Funded to save on personnel costs.

Chair Luke and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments on this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to create the Office of Sustainability (Office), and to increase economic development, while developing and protecting resources in a manner that enables individuals to meet current needs and ensure that future generations can also meet their needs, from the joint perspective of environmental, economic, and community objectives through collaboration and cooperation between the public and private sectors.

This bill appears to duplicate some of the functions of the Office of Planning (OP), which is established under chapter 225M, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), and is authorized to assist the Governor and the Director of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism in maintaining an overall framework to guide the development of the State through a continuous process of comprehensive, long-range, and strategic planning to meet the physical, economic, and social needs of Hawaii's people, and provide for the wise use of Hawaii's resources in a coordinated, efficient, and economical manner, including the conservation of those natural, environmental, recreational, scenic, historic, and other limited and irreplaceable resources that are required for future generations. To avoid unnecessary duplication of services and programs, as well as potential conflict between the proposed Office and OP, this bill should establish the Office in purpose and programs clearly distinguishable from OP.

We respectfully ask the Committee to consider these comments.

House Bill No. 2547, H.D. 1, establishes the following: the Hawaii Sustainability Act; the Office of Sustainability; and the State Sustainability Special Fund (SSSF). The measure also appropriates \$2,000,000 in general funds for FY 19 to be deposited into the SSSF to be expended on seven positions (six of which are newly authorized and one to be transferred from the Office of Planning) and to fund the operations of the new office.

The Department of Budget and Finance, as a matter of general policy, does not support the creation of any special fund which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS. Special funds should: 1) serve a need as demonstrated by the purpose, scope of work and an explanation why the program cannot be implemented successfully under the general fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries or a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue; 3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. In regards to House Bill No. 2547, H.D. 1, it is difficult to determine whether the proposed special fund would be self-sustaining.

The Nature Conservancy of Hawai'i is a private non-profit conservation organization dedicated to the preservation of the lands and waters upon which life depends. The Conservancy has helped to protect nearly 200,000 acres of natural lands in Hawai'i. We manage 43,000 acres in 14 preserves and work in 19 coastal communities to help protect the near-shore reefs and waters of the main Hawaiian Islands. We forge partnerships with government, private parties and communities to protect Hawai'i's important watershed forests and coral reefs.

The Nature Conservancy supports HB 2547 HD1 with the following comments and recommendations.

In recent years, we have supported having a State Sustainability Coordinator position and we are grateful that the Legislature reestablished and funded the position for the FY18-19 biennium. We continue to support having that position in State government, including an appropriate operational budget to facilitate collective efforts and progress amongst government and private sectors on achieving shared sustainability goals.

Many of the State's and partners' goals for such things as clean energy, education, local agriculture production, economic and workforce development, and natural resource protection have been established and funded with important directive, authority and resources from the Legislature. We agree that having a position that opens lines of communication and collaboration amongst government agencies and into the private sector to facilitate sustainability actions and keep track of results can be very beneficial. This position can work across levels of government and the private sector to advocate for government and non-government efforts and help implement a consistent set of metrics we all can use as common measures and benchmarks toward individual and collective sustainability goals.

However, we are concerned with this bill's proposal for a rather large initial staff and budget for the sustainability office, particularly if it would negatively impact the resources and staffing necessary to implement other agencies' sustainability programs, including those of DBEDT and the Departments of Agriculture, Health, Transportation, Education, and Land & Natural Resources amongst others.

We recommend starting with more modest resources and later evaluating the effectiveness of the sustainability office and the appropriate capacity needed to achieve its coordination and facilitation role.

The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) supports the intent of House Bill 2547, HD1, provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact the priorities indicated in the Executive Budget. HB2547, HD1, establishes the Hawaii Sustainability Act, including an office of sustainability, and a state sustainability special fund. DBEDT offers the following comments and amendments.

DBEDT supports the development of a legal framework to serve as a foundation for the State of Hawaii's sustainability practices, in addition to the Hawaii State Planning Act's sustainability priority guidelines and principles set forth in Hawaii Revised Statutes §226-108. HB2547, HD1, also establishes an Office of Sustainability with seven permanent positions within DBEDT and appropriates \$2 million in general funds to be deposited in a state sustainability special fund.

If the committee intends to move this measure forward, DBEDT suggests the following **amendments**:

 Establishing the Office of Sustainability to be a part of the Department of Business and Economic Development, and Tourism for administrative purposes, using the following language to amend subsection (a), page 6, of HB2547, HD1:

- (a) There is established within the department of business, economic development, and tourism, an office of sustainability, for administration purposes, to increase economic development, while developing and protecting resources in a manner that enables individuals to meet current needs and ensures that future generations can also meet their needs, from the joint perspective of environmental, economic, and community objectives through collaboration and cooperation between the public and private sectors.
- 2) Clarifying the appointment process for the director of the office of sustainability, under subsection (b), page 7, of HB2547, HD1:
 - (b) The director shall be <u>nominated</u> by the governor <u>and</u>, by <u>and with the advice and consent of the senate</u>, appointed by the governor without regard to chapter 76 and shall be compensated at a rate determined by the governor. The director shall report to the director of business, economic development, and tourism, and shall not be required to report directly to any other principal executive department.
- 3) Allowing the office of sustainability to create rules subject to Chapter 91 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes.

The office of sustainability shall adopt, amend, or repeal rules relating to matters within its jurisdiction in the manner prescribed in chapter 91.

- 4) Deleting the establishment of the State Sustainability Special Fund, while allowing the office to collect of investment earnings, gifts, donations, other income, rebates, grants, incentives, and capital appropriations. We note that if funds are made available to the office of sustainability, the office may administratively establish a new account or fund pursuant to HRS §37-40 and §37-52.5.
- 5) Suggesting that the positions and operating costs be General Funded rather than Special Funded to save on personnel costs.

In SUPPORT of HB2547 Relating to Sustainability

Aloha Chairwoman Luke, Vice Chair Cullen, and members of the Finance Committee,

On behalf of our 20,000 members and supporters, the Sierra Club of Hawai'i, a member of the Common Good Coalition, **supports the intent of HB2457**, establishing a new office of sustainability. We offer the following suggestions for improving this proposal.

The Sierra Club exists to ensure we establish and enforce protections for the natural environment, ensuring our water is clean, our air is pure, and our soil is healthy.

To this end we support the intent of this bill to create "a stronger policy framework for advancing Hawai'i's sustainability goals," as articulated in Act 181, SLH 2011. However, the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism is not the best fit for housing this office. According to their website, DBEDT's mission is to achieve:

a Hawaii economy that embraces innovation and is globally competitive, dynamic and productive, providing opportunities for all Hawaii's citizens. Through our attached agencies, we also foster planned community development, create affordable workforce housing units in high-quality living environments, and promote innovation sector job growth.

While this is an extremely important mission, it does not indicate any expertise in the sustainability goals and needs of the state of Hawai'i. We recommend establishing such a coordinating functioning in the Office of Environmental Quality and Control, the Department of Land and Natural Resources, or perhaps in a new agency created to better protect our environment.

In 1976, LRB published possible frameworks for the Government Reorganization Commission to consider. While the report noted that environmental protect was an "emerging concern of

government that might well be institutionalized with a single department embracing these programs."

In 1985, LRB published "The Feasibility of Environmental Reorganization for Hawai'i." This report identified many problems with the current structure including failure to prioritize environmental policies, lack of statewide planning and coordination, and inadequate funding resources. The report concluded that:

a separate department should eventually be established, not because of coordination needs, but because the State must place greater emphasis on pollution control programs to be prepared for contamination problems of the future. ... A new department should help to develop this approach by bringing together the necessary expertise to examine problems from a total environmental perspective.²

In 1996, the Office of the Governor published "Restructuring State Government Services: Findings and Recommendations" in response to Act 297, SLH 1996. This report analyzed an overall reorganization of all state agencies for efficiency and effectiveness. Even in this report not focused on environmental concerns, the report authors identified the need to "restructure the State's role in environmental protection and resource conservation and stewardship."³

Most of the factors informing the various recommendations to centralize environmental protection efforts into one agency over the last 40 years remain true today, if only more intense. The challenges of the climate crisis and instability at the federal level executive branch makes the case for a re-alignment of agency mission and task to protect our environment all the more urgent.

For these reasons, we strongly urge this committee to amend and pass HB2457.
