

Hawaii Fish Company (HFC), a family-owned North Shore Oahu aquaculture farm, testifies in strong support of HB 2610 HD2 which would appropriate funds for the continuation of the Hawaii manufacturing development grant program administered by the High Technology Development Corporation (HTDC). HFC is currently researching and developing manufactured aquafarm products with support one USDA/SBIR Phase I feasibility research grant and two USDA/SBIR Phase II research and development grants and a Hawaii SBIR matching grant for each.

Once our current SBIR R&D efforts are complete, we will move forward with Phase III commercialization. This will include the development of manufacturing equipment and infrastructure for the preparation and manufacture of aquaculture and aquaponic products. The continuation of this supportive manufacturing development grant program would provide HFC an important cost sharing opportunity to enable our small, family-owned, multigenerational company to take this important commercialization step which, in turn, will enable us to support job retention, increased rural employment, seafood and aquaponic supply production, and sales.

In summary, the manufacturing support potentially available to our company through this HTDC program has already been successfully provided to many other local manufacturing companies for the past three years. With the manufacturing development grant program's positive track record, HFC feels strongly that this program is worthy of continued State support. As such, we strongly support HB 2610 HD2.

Hyperspective **supports HB2610**, **HD2** that appropriates funds to HTDC for continuance and administration of the manufacturing development program.

Hyperspective is a digital creative agency, focused on developing cutting edge technology for communications and products within the State of Hawaii for global export. As a technology company, Hyperspective benefits from programs like the manufacturing program in-directly through services provided to companies that are awarded support and through the economic ecosystem these companies are a part of. This program supports the growth of an ecosystem of companies that attract large-scale business, talent and investments to Hawaii.

According to the Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii, Hawaii has over 1,000 active manufacturers employing approximately 17,000 workers and Hawaii's manufacturing industry helped the local economy by exporting nearly \$570 million in manufactured goods in 2012.

The program limits reimbursement to 20% of qualified expenses capped at \$100,000. The program shows the State's support for local manufacturers willing to make the commitment to growing their businesses in Hawaii and growing the industry.
