- 1. Molokai continues to have one of the highest unemployment rates in the State of Hawaii. The island has suffered from tumultuous economic downturns due to the closing of the pineapple plantations, the closing of the Kaluakoi Resort, the relocation of large scale agricultural production to Oahu, the closure of Molokai Ranch, and now the impending shutdown of Mycogen Seeds. Action must be taken to prevent an additional downturn.
- 2. With the impending closure of Mycogen, approximately 82 displaced workers will add to the already high unemployment rate. These funds will help mitigate impacts by supporting collaboration among multiple entities to provide innovative solutions.
- 3. It is impractical for many Molokai residents to relocate for employment, and options for inter-island transportation are limited. This bill will assist to create opportunities for residents of the island.

- 1. Mycogen will be closing their Molokai operations in March affecting 82 families. This is the latest economic crisis befalling our residents over the years. First the pineapple plantations close and over the years we've endured the closure of the Sheraton Kaluakoi Resort, the loss of large scale farming that pulled up roots and moved to Oahu, then Molokai Ranch shuttered their island operations and now Mycogen.
- 2. When the pineapple plantations closed, the legislature responded with Act 387 SLH 1988 to provide funding for an agricultural loan program to bolster our economy by providing loans to our residents to stimulate agricultural production.
- The various agencies of the County of Maui along with the State continue 3. to work collaboratively to determine how best to assist our soon to be displace workers.

For the foregoing reasons, I **support** this measure.

For the foregoing reasons, I support this measure.



My name is Dayton M. Nakanelua, State Director of the United Public Workers, AFSCME, Local 646, AFL-CIO. The UPW is the exclusive bargaining representative for approximately 12,000 public employees, which include blue collar, non-supervisory employees in Bargaining Unit 01 and institutional, health and correctional employees in Bargaining Unit 10, in the State of Hawaii and various counties. The UPW also represents about 1,500 members of the private sector.

In 2008 concerned community leaders and members of the island of Molokai with assistance from many other caring contributors plotted their vision for the beautiful island they called home. They stated what their cultural traditions are, what their hopes and their dreams are for the future of their island, and most importantly, what kind of future they want for their children. Thank you for the opportunity to testify in <u>support</u> of HB 2671 HD1. With Mycogen leaving Moloka'i, as many as 80-90 temporary agricultural workers will lose their jobs. This further aggravates the economic plight on Moloka'i. The College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources believes that with the collaboration of the diverse agencies mentioned some retraining and creative job deliverance is possible that not only will help some portion of the soon to be unemployed, but also increase the agricultural production of the island.

Honorable COMMITTEE ON FINANCE Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen and Committee Members:

As a representative organization of the neighbor-island of Molokai with dozens of members who employ hundreds of our neighbors, friends and families, we are respectfully submitting testimony in **SUPPORT** of HB 2671 HD1.

Agriculture is the backbone of Molokai and the largest private employer is the commercial agriculture sector, which includes Mycogen Seeds. The pending ceasing of their operations is of great concern to not only our agriculture sector, but to our families who will be impacted and our greater Molokai business community.

The loss of 82 jobs on Molokai is equivalent to losing 15,700 jobs on Oahu. And this is compounded by the following:

Molokai traditionally suffers from the highest unemployment rate in Hawaii which is usually two to three times greater than any other island and the Statewide average, and with the loss of this many jobs it will likely quadruple or more. Additionally over 35% of our residents are on government assistance programs. Our electricity and fuel are the most costly in the State and the extra leg of shipping required to obtain our basic goods drives up the cost of living to a level that is challenging for many of our families to manage, without livable wages.

Add to this the upcoming closure of Mycogen Seed's operations and its clear that Molokai and our working families will shoulder this tremendous burden with few places to turn for help, resources and most importantly, employment.

In past company closures there were always other industries and sectors to absorb the employees and help share in the burden, but currently there are no other industries that can absorb a shift of this magnitude.

You have the ability to get in front of this. We ask that you as legislators be bold in your thinking and strong in your commitment in addressing and ending the chronic needs of our island.
