DLIR <u>supports the intent</u> of this measure provided it does not conflict with the Governor's budget priorities.

With the passing of this legislation and funds appropriated to the department, DLIR would provide assistance with basic educational and vocational training to better prepare affected populations on the island of Molokai for potential job opportunities. Thank you for the opportunity to testify in <u>support</u> of HB 2671 HD1. With Mycogen leaving Moloka'i, as many as 80-90 temporary agricultural workers will lose their jobs. This further aggravates the economic plight on Moloka'i. The College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources believes that with the collaboration of the diverse agencies mentioned some retraining and creative job deliverance is possible that not only will help some portion of the soon to be unemployed, but will also increase the agricultural production of the island.

While the bill is not specific as to the solutions, the immediate need for resources to support economic development is real; and retraining as well as equipment support will certainly be necessary and will not easily wait until next year. For these reasons we support the bill and are available to provide our input to determining what solutions are applicable toward the benefit of the citizens of Moloka'i.



- 1. Mycogen will be closing their Molokai operations in March affecting 82 families. This is the latest economic crisis befalling our residents over the years. First the pineapple plantations close and over the years we've endured the closure of the Sheraton Kaluakoi Resort, the loss of large scale farming that pulled up roots and moved to Oahu, then Molokai Ranch shuttered their island operations and now Mycogen.
- 2. When the pineapple plantations closed, the legislature responded with Act 387 SLH 1988 to provide funding for an agricultural loan program to bolster our economy by providing loans to our residents to stimulate agricultural production.
- 3. The various agencies of the County of Maui along with the State continue to work collaboratively to determine how best to assist our soon to be displace workers.

My name is Dayton M. Nakanelua, State Director of the United Public Workers, AFSCME, Local 646, AFL-CIO. The UPW is the exclusive bargaining representative for approximately 12,000 public employees, which include blue collar non-supervisory employees in Bargaining Unit 01 and institutional, health and correctional employees in Bargaining Unit 10, in the State of Hawaii and various counties. The UPW also represents about 1,500 members of the private sector.

HB2671, HD1 appropriates funds to several state agencies to collaboratively develop and implement solutions to assist dislocated workers and address the overall continued availability of gainful employment on the island of Molokai. According to the 2018 Molokai Health Center report, "Molokai has an unemployment rate of 15%, more than two times higher than the State average. The "not employed" rate includes those who are unemployed but not receiving unemployment benefits is estimated to exceed 19.5%." It is estimated that about 38% live outside the social service network and depend upon subsistence farming, hunting and fishing. A limited number of state government jobs are advertised for Molokai General Hospital, the Queen's Medical Center and Aloha Care. However, more job opportunities are needed.

The UPW **strongly supports** HB2671, HD1.

Mahalo for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of HB2671 HD1. My two business partners and I operate and own Kealopiko Inc. a small clothing company on Molokai specializing in the production and sale of Hawaiian culturally based clothing, using natural dyes and inks. We have been in business for 12 years and do a majority of our manufacturing on Molokai.

Kealopiko makes the choice to manufacture on Molokai and to provide jobs (3 full time, 2 part-time) to this small, Hawaiian community. It is important for our company to put our investmenst back into our communities, ones that need it most. It would be a more cost effective model if we did our production overseas or in Honolulu, but we choose to support the Molokai community. Kealopiko would like to bring more of its manufacturing to Molokai (increasing to 7 full time, 5-7 part-time), but need help with workforce development in funding an in-house training program to increase the level of skills needed within the Molokai community.

I strongly support the state leading and providing the necessary resources to collaborate and to create partnership to assist displaced workers, generate workforce development opportunities and to address the overall availability of employment on Molokai. It is my hope that through this process the State and others can help improve Molokai's social and economic wellbeing as well as move the island towards a more sustainable future.
