#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TECHNOLOGY.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that to be successful in
- 2 the twenty-first century global economy, Hawaii must position
- 3 itself as a leader in technology development, transfer, and
- 4 commercialization. Significant progress has been made in past
- 5 years through programs supported by federal and state
- 6 initiatives, such as programs administered by the high
- 7 technology development corporation, Hawaii strategic development
- 8 corporation, and the Hawaii technology development venture, but
- 9 more is required to move Hawaii's technology industry to achieve
- 10 local technology commercialization. Innovation in science and
- 11 technology fields will not only enable the State to succeed in
- 12 the global marketplace, but will also support the State's
- 13 sustainable economic development goals to include a viable and
- 14 vibrant technology and manufacturing labor force.
- 15 The purpose of this Act is to establish the Hawaii
- 16 innovation and technology research corporation to:

Chair Johanson and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments.

This bill establishes a new Hawaii Innovation and Technology Research Corporation (Corporation) headed by a board of directors.

The purpose of the Corporation is "the promotion, development, and expansion of Hawaii's innovation and technology industry." This purpose is very similar to that of the existing Hawaii Technology Development Corporation (HTDC), whose purpose is "to facilitate the growth and development of the commercial technology industry in Hawaii," pursuant to section 206M-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS). It is also similar to the purpose of the existing Hawaii Strategic Development Corporation (HSDC), whose purpose is "to encourage economic development and diversification in Hawaii through innovative actions in cooperation with private enterprises," pursuant to section 211F-2, HRS. To avoid unnecessary duplication of resources and programs, as well as potential conflict between the proposed Corporation and HTDC and HSDC, we recommend that the purpose and functions of the new Corporation be amended to be clearly distinguishable from HTDC and HSDC.

In addition, page 4, lines 6-12, of this bill provides that the members of the board of directors "shall be appointed by the governor, senate president, and speaker of the house of representatives for a term of four years; provided that membership on the board shall not exceed eight consecutive years; provided further that each member

shall hold office until the member's successor is <u>appointed and qualified</u>." (Emphasis added).

First, "appointed by the governor, senate president, and speaker of the house" is inexact, as the rest of the bill makes clear that the Governor shall appoint the members, albeit from lists of names submitted by the Senate President and Speaker of the House.

Second, providing for a term of four years, not to exceed eight consecutive years, is unnecessary, as section 26-34, HRS, already contains these provisions.

Third, the holdover wording of this bill is not in conformance with section 26-34, HRS, which provides:

(b) Any member of a board or commission whose term has expired and who is not disqualified for membership under subsection (a) may continue in office as a holdover member until a successor is <u>nominated and appointed</u>; . . . (Emphasis added).

Because section 26-34, HRS, contains the holdover provision in subsection (b), additional holdover wording is not necessary.

To avoid a conflict between statutes and unnecessary verbiage, we recommend that page 4, lines 6-12, of this bill be amended to read as follows:

(1) The members shall be appointed by the governor as provided in section 26-34.
