Chairperson Creagan and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 454 which will provide enforcement responsibility associated with the ability of the Department, or others associated with invasive pest species control, to access private property and engage in eradication of invasive species found on that property. The Department supports this measure.

The control and eradication of invasive species is crucial to our State in order to minimize the impact of those invasive pest species on our environment, our agriculture, and our natural resources. The legislature is seeing many bills this session that address invasive species management. However, this particular bill provides the State government, and/or the Island Invasive Species Committees, a legal mechanism which will assist in the destruction and/or eradication of invasive pest species that are identified on private property. In some cases, this will be the only way to employ timely eradication methods before there is additional spread of any invasive species identified on private property.

In consideration of HOUSE BILL 454 RELATING TO INVASIVE SPECIES

House Bill 454 proposes to authorize departments to require landowners to control or eradicate an invasive species on private property and impose a fine for noncompliance. **The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this initiative.**

The Department is the administrative host of the Hawaii Invasive Species Council (HISC) and administers Chapter 194, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS). The Department notes that Section 194-5, HRS, already authorizes members of the HISC to require private property owners to control or eradicate invasive species, provided that the species was knowingly or intentionally introduced to the property in question. This measure would expand the circumstances under which this authority could be utilized to include instances where an invasive species has spread to a private property from adjacent lands and entry onto the property has been refused. This measure also establishes a fine for noncompliance. The Department notes that voluntary cooperation with private landowners is always preferred, but that the authorities provided in this measure may be useful in successfully controlling or eradicating invasive species.

The Nature Conservancy of Hawai'i is a private non-profit conservation organization dedicated to the preservation of the lands and waters upon which life depends. The Conservancy has helped to protect nearly 200,000 acres of natural lands in Hawai'i. We manage 40,000 acres in 14 preserves and work in 19 coastal communities to help protect the near-shore reefs and waters of the main Hawaiian Islands. We forge partnerships with government, private parties and communities to protect Hawai'i's important watershed forests and coral reefs.

The Nature Conservancy supports H.B. 454 requiring landowners to control invasive species on their land if they do not permit entry to a relevant government agency to for that purpose.

Invasive weeds, insects, diseases, snakes, and other pests are one of the greatest threats to Hawaii's economy, agriculture, natural environment, and the health and lifestyle of its people. With favorable conditions and limited competition, non-native species arrive in the Hawaiian Islands to find an easy environment in which to thrive.

The <u>Hawai'i Interagency Biosecurity Plan</u>—prepared by the Department of Agriculture with the support of its many government and non-government partners—addresses the full range of invasive species prevention, early detection, rapid response, control, research, and outreach priorities across the state. The Biosecurity Plan notes the ability to enforce biosecurity rules on private land as a critical issue. In many instances, private properties are adjacent to public lands and other private properties, including important natural and agricultural areas, where the efforts of public and private land managers to control invasive species may be frustrated or even negated if a neighboring private land owner cannot or will not take similar measures.

Authority to require private property owners to control invasive species on their land when they will not permit access to a relevant government agency would assist in the timely and effective containment and control of newly introduced and more established invasive species.

The Hawaiian Electric Companies are submitting this written testimony in strong support of HB 454.

HB 454 authorizes departments that are members of the invasive species council to require landowners with land that contains invasive species to control or eradicate the invasive species, and imposes fines for noncompliance. The Hawaiian Electric Companies support the bill for the following reasons:

- Albizia trees are a hazard to public safety and critical infrastructure.
- Stands of brittle, invasive Albizia trees up to 250 feet tall grow on many public and private properties. Tropical Storm Iselle brought down many Albizia trees, blocked roadways, and caused millions of dollars in damage to homes and important electric utility lines. Broken tree trunks continue to send out new growth creating even more unstable conditions, while seedlings are rapidly germinating in disturbed areas.
- There are many landowners that either refuse or fail to respond to repeated notices to control or eradicate invasive species on their property.
- The ability to require landowners to control or eradicate invasive species on their property, and provide for fines if there is non-compliance, is essential to mitigating issues caused by invasive species like the Albizia tree, and ensures that Hawai'i's public safety and critical infrastructure needs are met.

Comments: It is unclear what is meant by "invasive species" as used in this bill. The provision defines "invasive species" as any species so identified by the Invasive Species Council. the current draft of HB1013 provides a definition that is extremely broad. I cannot support such an unclear and poorly drafted bill that gives the public little indication of what the "department" will be doing. "Department" is defined broadly in Chapter 194, HRS, as "any entity that is a member of the invasive species council." It would help the public to understand what the bill does if "department" were more clearly defined. At the very least, please exempt dogs and cats from the definition of "invasive species" and consider making the definition more exact and specific. Many people are currently working very hard to spay, neuter, and manage (feed, water, and provide veterinary care) outdoor cats - feral and owned - at no cost to the government. Thank you for the opportunity to testify as an individual in <u>support</u> of this important measure. The purpose of this measure authorizes departments that are members of the invasive species council to require landowners with land that contains invasive species to control or eradicate the invasive species if the landowner does not permit the department to enter the land. Imposes fines for noncompliance.

I strongly <u>support</u> this measure for the following reasons:

- 1. By amending, section 194-5, Hawai'i Revised Statutes to read, Entry; Private Property and adding language to help the department follow through with more authority.
- 2. Whenever an invasive species is identified by the council for control or eradication is found on "Private Property" the department is allowed to enter and take control after reasonable notice given to the owner. In many instances notices are sent to the property owners, tenants, in some instances mailed if owner resides out of state or a notice is posted on the house.
- 3. Now, the department may instead order the owner to control or eradicate the invasive species if it is was intentionally or knowingly established by the owner or if they refuse to allow the department to enter the property.

- 4. Fines of violations shall be fined not more than \$5000.00 for each separate offense. Each day shall constitute a separate offense.
- 5. If state or county law enforcement is needed for the warrant, the department may recover expenses incurred or fines shall be imposed as a result of its order from any owner who failed to comply.

For the foregoing reasons, I strongly <u>support</u> this measure.
