<u>DEPARTMENT'S POSITION</u>: The Department of Human Services (DHS) appreciates the intent and supports the bill. It is consistent with the Department of Health's administration proposal HB 2371.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: The purpose of the bill is to create an Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Medicaid Waiver Administrative Claiming special fund.

The Medicaid program is administered and overseen by the Med-QUEST division (MQD) of DHS. We delegate the operations for the 1915(c) Medicaid Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) Waiver to serve people with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) to the Department of Health, Developmental Disabilities Division (DOH-DDD). Because they are operating on our behalf - the Medicaid agency, DOH-DDD may claim the 50% federal Medicaid administrative match. HB 538 HD1 requests the legislature's approval of the establishment of a special fund for deposits from this Medicaid administrative claiming to administer the HCBS I/DD waiver.

Currently, any administrative claiming Medicaid funds are deposited into the general fund. However, this has resulted in limiting the DOH-DDD's ability to implement many new major federal requirements that required sweeping changes to implement the waiver.

We confirm that implementation of these requirements and operations of quality services requires an adequate infrastructure that includes ongoing monitoring and training for staff, families, waiver participants, and providers. Specifically, per DOH DDD program, the monies from the fund would be used for:

- (1) Payment for fiscal management services of the Hawaii section 1915(c) Home and Community-Based Services for Persons with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities waiver;
- (2) Training of staff, waiver providers, waiver participants, their families, and their legal representatives, and community stakeholders;
- (3) Quality management activities for operating the Hawaii section 1915(c) Home and Community-Based Services for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities waiver;
- (4) Ongoing operations and maintenance of the information technology system;
- (5) Conducting rate methodology studies to define rates for the Hawaii section 1915(c)

 Home and Community-Based Services for People with Intellectual and Developmental

 Disabilities waiver; and
- (6) Assessment services for determining I/DD Waiver participants' level of support needs.

We further confirm that all of these activities are both increasing and necessary. DOH-DDD has been operating the I/DD program very efficiently and effectively up to this point; they have been collaborative partners with us in operating the Medicaid program; and we support their efforts to leverage the Medicaid dollars more effectively so that they can build additional and necessary infrastructure as listed above.

- 1 **Fiscal Implications:** The proposed Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) Medicaid
- 2 Waiver Special Fund, upon approval from the Legislature, is expected to receive reimbursements

- 4 1903(a)(7) of the Social Security Act, federal payment is available at a percentage of amounts

The Arc in Hawaii strongly supports the Proposed HB538 HD1, concerning the Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Medicaid Waiver Administrative Claiming Special Fund.

The Arc in Hawaii, a private non-profit agency, provides services to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (ID/DD) and their families across Oahu. Together with its national and neighbor-island Arc affiliates, The Arc in Hawaii promotes and protects the rights of people with ID/DD and actively supports their right to be included and fully participate in the community throughout their lifetime.

The federal government has issued new requirements that make extensive changes to implementation of the Home and Community Based Service (HCBS) Waiver program. HB538 will authorize the establishment of a special fund to support necessary compliance requirements, including payment for management, training, quality assurance, assessment, technology and methodology services needed for their implementation.

Crucially, proposed HD1 adds this Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Medicaid Waiver Administrative Claiming Special Fund to the list of special funds not subject to a 5% deduction that would go to the General Fund. This addition is critical, especially now, with so many new federal requirements for the waiver program.

The Arc in Hawaii is committed to providing high quality waiver services to our participants. We embrace the person-centered philosophy that undergirds the changes that are happening in the Waiver

Program. New and different programs, however, will require changes both to our operations, and those of the Hawaii Department of Health Developmental Disabilities Division.

Switching to a new paradigm will be a huge task that will not come without a cost. DOH DDD's ability to provide training and quality management services to Hawaii's already overstretched waiver services providers will be crucial to doing so successfully.

Additionally, the expenses associated with providing services increase year after year. Periodic rate studies using appropriate methodologies will be imperative to ensure that rates paid to service providers allow both for the deliverance of quality services and the sustainability of the organizations providing them.

We're doing our part as a waiver provider, but we are relying on DOH DDD to provide the additional training, monitoring and support services we will need in this new environment. We urge the passage of HB538 HD1 to provide adequate financial resources for DOH DDD as we all move forward.

Comments:

While we have no particular objection to the creation of this special fund and do believe it would be useful to the DD Division, the Committees might want to ask the Department why it has not pursued administrative claiming previously. According to Section 1 of this measure the answer is because the money is deposited into the general fund as opposed to a special fund for the Department.

If that is true, then that appears to be a very "bureaucratic" way of looking at the overall issue of state finances. According to their testimony, this effort can generate approximately one million dollars. The Department's position appears to be that they are happy to pursue that so long as it will benefit their program- but if it is merely going to benefit the state revenue picture then it is "not worth their effort".

We would think that the Committees might have a more "holistic" view of the state's economy. We share that perspective as well and so if millions of dollars have been lost to the state because the Department did not bother to pursue this previously, then we submit that they have some explaining to do to. Perhaps it might be appropriate to consider requesting the Legislative Auditor to undertake a Financial and Management Audit of the Developmental Disabilities Division.

Additionally, in the past year, our office has received a huge increase in the number of complaints about the DD Division. The nature of the complaints range from concerns about the restrictive eligibility policies as well as an intake system that is very unfriendly to the consumers. Parents have experienced lengthy delays in the processing of applications and it appears that the Division's Compliance Office has manipulated every possible legal technique to thwart requests for openness and information.

Last week, in response to these concerns Rep. Mizuno convened a meeting at the request of several parents. The DD Division was in attendance as was HDRC. There was some consensus that it would be very helpful if the legislature could convene a Work Group to evaluate some of these problems and propose solutions. It was also suggested that a "vehicle" be found so that this could be formalized in some legislation this session.

Given the broad title of this measure as well as the fact that it already deals with the Developmental Disabilities Division, HB 538 appears to be an ideal bill into which this provision could be inserted. For that reason we respectfully request that the Committees amend the bill to add a Part which creates this Work Group to be composed of the DD Division, the DD Council, parents of children with developmental disabilities, the HDRC, and members of the legislature.

Catholic Charities Hawai'i (CCH) is a tax exempt, non-profit agency that has been providing Home and Community-based Medicaid Waiver services for individuals with developmental disabilities/intellectual disabilities since 1995.

CCH supports HB538, HD1, which would establish the "Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Medicaid Waiver Administrative Claiming Special Fund" so that funds from Medicaid administrative claiming can be used for specified purposes in support of waiver services rather than being deposited to the General Fund. The bill also adds this new Special Fund to the list of Special Funds not subject to the 5% assessment to the General Fund.

In particular, CCH hopes that this Special Fund will be used for the following purposes:

- Increased and enhanced training opportunities There have been significant recent changes in waiver services, largely to comply with new federal requirements. In order to provide quality of care for individuals served by the waiver, a significant amount of training is necessary for Department of Health/Developmental Disabilities Division (DOH/DDD) staff, for waiver provider agencies, for consumers (and their guardians), and other community stakeholders. As a waiver service provider, CCH is doing its best to adjust to the many new changes in requirements and welcomes the support of DOH/DDD in the form of ongoing, timely and relevant training.
- **Regular rate review** –periodic rate studies, using industry based methodologies, are needed to ensure that payments to providers are fair, and in keeping with the rising cost of doing business and the changing demands of government requirements.



By creating a Work Group made up of a variety of people who can bring to the table experiences from across the state we can help our legislators to better understand the needs of families with who children and adults with disabilities and must care for them on an ongoing basis. We are faced with the life long task of "forever" taking care of our children in a way that is unlike any other faced by typical parents.
