I would like to provide the following comments in support of HB 584 HD1.

That Hawaii state goal of achieving 100% renewable energy by 2045 will be very difficult to achieve unless a diverse portfolio of technologies is fostered in the state. In addition, we recommend that the state needs renewable firm power which biomass energy generation provides, and we support the addition of biomass technology into this bill.

Biomass generation facility adds to the resiliency and redundancy of power generation that will be crucial for citizens and ratepayers in the event of a natural or manmade disaster. Our approach is thoughtful and meaningful especially in the sustainability of feedstock. The feedstock is a renewable source that is grown, harvested and replanted to provide for sustainable supply of renewable fuel. We are also doing R&D to utilize invasives such as Albizia for feedstock which will help the community and the environment.

A biomass energy generation facility will also create positive economic impacts for our state. It is an endeavor that costs millions of dollars to develop. Much of this money will be invested in the area and will create a ripple effect in the community. Creating jobs is a challenge in economically depressed areas such as Pepeekeo. Once a thriving area, it has gone into decline with the demise of the sugar industry. A biomass facility is anticipated to create 200 jobs in the construction phase and 30 high paying jobs to run the facility for the next 30 years. These jobs will require a high level of education as well.

We have done extensive outreach in the community and have engaged many stakeholders who support this type of economic driver in the area.

We stand in strong support of HB 584 HD1.

I strongly support HB 584 SD1.

I am Warren Lee and a long-time resident of Hawaii Island. I have held various positions on the island, including President of Hawaii Electric Light Company, and Director of Public Works for the County of Hawaii.

I know firsthand the difficulty of creating a viable economic engine in economically depressed zones. The island of Hawaii has five Enterprise Zones, and in 2015 Governor Ige approved the 20-year redesignation of three new Hawaii County Enterprise Zones: Hamakua, Hilo-Puna, and Kau.

There are not many eligible business activities that qualify for the Enterprise Zone designation. There are no renewable energy electricity production technologies that are eligible for this qualification except wind energy production. Biomass energy is renewable, sustainable electric power generation that is worthy of being designated an eligible business activity because of jobs created where they are most needed. The decline of jobs along the Hamakua coastline has devastated the community and the surrounding areas, and a biomass facility can help to stimulate business activity in that area and revitalize a depressed zone. Currently, the employment rate for the Hamakua area is an astonishing 43%.

Besides economic advantages, the biomass facility will also be contributing to the state's goal of 100% renewable energy by providing renewable firm power to the electric grid.

This bill is being amended in order to provide preferential treatment for a specific project that has gone over budget, missed deadlines, and has been in varying stages of construction since 2010; all by their own mismanagement.

This biomass scheme is funded by well financed mainland investors and continues to be fast tracked because they intend to qualify for the Federal Investment Tax (ITC) at the end of 2018, in the amount of 100 million dollars. And now they are looking at the opportunity of "harvesting" additional tax credits from our State, subsidized by the same people they claim to be helping.

Dear Legislators,

I stand in strong opposition to HB584 HD1.

As a Pepeekeo business owner, homeowner and resident, I am strongly opposed to this bill. This bill is being introduced so that the Honua Ola power generating facility (aka Hu Honua Bioenergy) will qualify for the 100% GET exemption as well as an 80% non-refundable State income tax exemption, and a 3-year exemption from any increase in property tax in Hawaii County.

The objective of this bill would be misapplied in that this company has already stated for the last 10 years that they would hire 30 employees. This bill does nothing to encourage the creation of additional jobs with this incentive. Take a look at the biennial Hawaii state reports for the Hawaii Enterprise Zone Program. The studies indicate that wind energy has not reported very many jobs. You should expect the same from biomass, especially since it is not a very popular means of creating energy and is still a very controversial issue in regards to greenhouse gas emissions.

Also, take into consideration the fact that unemployment for Hawaii County is at 2% and remains near a 10-year low.

Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen, and Members of the Committee.

The Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism (DBEDT) supports the intent of House Bill 2547, HD1, provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact the priorities indicated in the Executive Budget. HB2547, HD1, establishes the Hawaii Sustainability Act, including an office of sustainability, and a state sustainability special fund. DBEDT offers the following comments and amendments.

DBEDT supports the development of a legal framework to serve as a foundation for the State of Hawaii's sustainability practices, in addition to the Hawaii State Planning Act's sustainability priority guidelines and principles set forth in Hawaii Revised Statutes §226-108. HB2547, HD1, also establishes an Office of Sustainability with seven permanent positions within DBEDT and appropriates \$2 million in general funds to be deposited in a state sustainability special fund.

If the committee intends to move this measure forward, DBEDT suggests the following **amendments**:

1) Establishing the Office of Sustainability to be a part of the Department of Business and Economic Development, and Tourism for administrative purposes, using the following language to amend subsection (a), page 6, of HB2547, HD1:



- (a) There is established within the department of business, economic development, and tourism, an office of sustainability, for administration purposes, to increase economic development, while developing and protecting resources in a manner that enables individuals to meet current needs and ensures that future generations can also meet their needs, from the joint perspective of environmental, economic, and community objectives through collaboration and cooperation between the public and private sectors.
- 2) Clarifying the appointment process for the director of the office of sustainability, under subsection (b), page 7, of HB2547, HD1:
  - (b) The director shall be <u>nominated</u> by the governor <u>and</u>, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, appointed by the governor without regard to chapter 76 and shall be compensated at a rate determined by the governor. The director shall report to the director of business, economic development, and tourism, and shall not be required to report directly to any other principal executive department.
- 3) Allowing the office of sustainability to create rules subject to Chapter 91 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes.

The office of sustainability shall adopt, amend, or repeal rules relating to matters within its jurisdiction in the manner prescribed in chapter 91.

- 4) Deleting the establishment of the State Sustainability Special Fund, while allowing the office to collect of investment earnings, gifts, donations, other income, rebates, grants, incentives, and capital appropriations. We note that if funds are made available to the office of sustainability, the office may administratively establish a new account or fund pursuant to HRS §37-40 and §37-52.5.
- 5) Suggesting that the positions and operating costs be General Funded rather than Special Funded to save on personnel costs.
