Chairperson Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

Thank for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 891 HD1 Proposed SD2, which appropriates funds for the Department, in collaboration with the Agribusiness Development Corporation and the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources (CTAHR) at the University of Hawaii, to conduct crop test trials on State agricultural lands of the top imported foods crops. The Department supports the intent of this bill provided it does not impact the Department's priorities listed in the Executive Budget.

The Department supports this measure as it looks to increase local food production and reduce the imported crops coming into the State. Hawaii's top 10 imported commodities include potato, onion, berries, carrot, orange, grapes, spinach, melon, mango, and cucumber (HDOA/NASS Hawaii, 2016). With State land resources and CTAHR's expertise, there is potential to perform crop trials to determine the suitability to crop each of these top imported commodities. Because this bill has not defined the parameters of the test trials, collaboration efforts to fill in the specifics of such a project are necessary.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Keith-Agaran, and Members of the Committee:

I am Randy Cabral, President of the Hawai'i Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,900 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau supports of HB 891, HD1, PROPOSED SD2, which requires the department of agriculture, in coordination with the agribusiness development corporation and University of Hawaii college of tropical agriculture and human resources, to conduct crop performance testing trials on state agricultural lands of Hawaii's most highly imported food crops.

Hawaii's agricultural industry has undergone a great change. Hawaii's agriculture industry once dominated by sugarcane and pineapple, has transitioned to a more diversified agricultural model. With much of the food consumed in Hawaii produced elsewhere, there is growing concern about the state's high dependency upon outside sources. Hawaii is located approximately 2,500 miles from the continental United States. As the most geographically isolated state in the country, Hawaii imports approximately ninety-two per cent of its food. While interest in local food production is growing, Hawaii farmers face keen competition from imports abroad. Today, the vast majority of the food consumed in the Islands is supplied by the U.S. Mainland, which is Hawaii's chief source of competition.

Currently, Hawaii has an inventory of fresh produce that would supply consumers for no more than ten days. Ninety per cent of the beef, sixty-seven per cent of the fresh vegetables, sixty-five per cent of the fresh fruits, and eighty per cent of all milk purchased in the State are imported.

Import replacement is a huge opportunity for our farmers. In a global market place, new products give our local farmers an edge. In turn, replacing high risk imports will mean less risk for invasive species introduction. The high rate of new pests into the islands is a challenge to not only agriculture but the environment. We need to focus on import replacement. What do people buy every day? Can we grow it? More importantly, can we grow it competitively and profitably? Trials by HDOA, ADC and CTAHR on Hawaii's most highly imported food crops can help identify the best crops for Hawaii's farmers to produce.

To the Honorable Donovan M. Dela Cruz, Chair; the Honorable Gilbert S. C. Keith-Agaran, Vice-Chair, and Members of the Committee on Ways and Means:

Good morning. My name is Melodie Aduja. I serve as Chair of the Oahu County Committee ("OCC") on Legislative Priorities of the Democratic Party of Hawaii. Thank you for the opportunity to provide written testimony on **HB891 HD1 SD2** relating to Agriculture; Local Food Production; Imported Food Crops; Crop Performance Testing Trials; and an appropriation.

The OCC Legislative Priorities Committee is in favor of **HB891 HD1 SD2** and supports its passage.

HB891 HD1 SD2, is in alignment with the Platform of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i ("DPH"), as it requires the Department of Agriculture, in coordination with the Agribusiness Development Corporation and University of Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources, to conduct crop performance testing trials on state agricultural lands of Hawaii's most highly imported food crops and makes an appropriation.

Specifically, the DPH Platform states, "[a]griculture in our state must be preserved and its future strengthened. Sufficient prime agricultural lands must be maintained for the health, economic well-being and sustenance of the people. We believe in an integrated approach to agricultural innovation and sustainability. We encourage the responsible development of ocean resources in order to achieve sustainability of our marine resources, and ensure and improve the health of our reef and marine life.

This approach includes, but is not limited to, the adoption of the native Hawaiian concept of ahupua'a, an integrated approach to land management. This could also include development of economic, land and ocean use policies that foster sustainable crops both for local consumption and for export, policies to foster agriculture-related

infrastructure at shipping points, and increased inspection to protect against invasive species and to encourage reduced holding times.

We will promote ethical and safe production of livestock, dairy products, poultry and eggs. (Platform of DPH, P. 2, Lines 76-88 (2016)).

As an island state, securing affordable food for all is a priority. We support healthy, sustainable, and diversified local food production, and "Buy Local" strategies to assure greater food security and food safety.

We recognize the essential link between the availability of adequate and affordable water and low-cost electrical power as essential components of viable agricultural businesses.

We support land use planning and infrastructure development to support sustainable diversified agriculture, including low cost inter-island transportation of agricultural products. We likewise support publicly funded research and development for agricultural diversification and value-added products.

We support the designation of Important Agricultural Lands as a step towards preserving high-grade productive lands for current and future needs. (Platform of DPH, P. 2, Lines 97-110 (2016)).

Given that **HB891 HD1 SD2** requires the Department of Agriculture, in coordination with the Agribusiness Development Corporation and University of Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources, to conduct crop performance testing trials on state agricultural lands of Hawaii's most highly imported food crops and makes an appropriation, it is the position of the OCC Legislative Priorities Committee to support this measure.
