The Office of the Auditor **has no position** regarding H.C.R. No. 3, which requires us to conduct a study of the relevancy of the Certificate of Need (CON) process under Chapter 323D, Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS). **However, we offer the following comments.**

H.C.R. No. 3 requires us to conduct a study of the relevancy of the CON process under Chapter 323D, HRS, with respect to:

- (1) The role of the CON Program;
- (2) The effects of the CON law on:
 - (A) Improving the health of residents within a health service area;
 - (B) Increasing the accessibility and quality of health services;
 - (C) Containing health care costs;
 - (D) Preventing unnecessary duplication of health services; and
- (3) Whether certain facilities, types of facilities, or services should be exempt from the CON process.

The resolution also requires us to report our findings and recommendations, including a recommendation to eliminate or modify the CON process, to the Legislature no later than twenty (20) days before the 2019 legislative session.

Our Office generally conducts performance/management and financial audits. Studies of this nature are not part of the typical work we perform. Furthermore, the study requested may be beyond our expertise and require us to procure a consultant to assist us in performing the study.

Dear Chair Mizuno, Vice Chair Kobayashi, and members of the House Committee on Health and Human Services

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in opposition to HCR 3.

Nationally, the Certificate of Need (CON) law's usefulness is often debated and many studies have been undertaken. In 2004, the big three automakers all compared costs in CON vs non-CON states, and found that states with substantial CON programs had significantly lower health care costs. Chrysler found that their per-employee health care costs were substantially lower in CON states than in non-CON jurisdictions, with costs as much as 164% lower in CON states.

GM found its health care costs were nearly a third less in CON states in a similar analysis.

In 2009, the big three auto makers also did a study that found that the cost per covered life for CT scans was 67% higher in states without CON due to higher utilization and cost per scan and the cost per covered life for MRI was 20% higher in non-CON states. A 2002 study published in JAMA found that the quality of outcomes in coronary artery bypass surgery was directly linked to the CON process.

Most of the other states criticize their CON process for being too cumbersome. In Hawaii in 2015, the average CON processing time was 27 days from the date the applicant submitted their complete application to the date the of the Agency's decision.

Since the passing of ACT 139 in 2016, the State Health Planning and Development Agency (SHPDA) has worked closely with the Department of Human Services, the Hawaii Employee-Union Health Benefits Trust Fund, the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs' Insurance Division, the Department of Budget and Finance, the Attorney General Office and the University of Hawaii to create the foundation/ rules/ momentum to build an "all payer claims data warehouse". The APCD collection of healthcare claims reports will enhance the Certificate of Need applicants with their understanding of Hawaii's historical healthcare costs, population health conditions, and healthcare disparities. Once the claims data is analyzed, SHPDA will begin to conduct studies regarding the causes of healthcare costs. These reports will shape future health policies and purchases. The CON process along with analyzed healthcare costs.

The Agency supports the certificate of need process and we believe in the CON's effectiveness.

The Hawaii CON process serves as an essential check and balance on market forces. Your denial of this resolution is greatly appreciated.

Specifically, the Platform of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i provides that "[a]ccess to health care is a basic human need. Our citizens and visitors have an

inherent right to high quality, high standard health care. The state legislature and the federal government should take all appropriate steps to create and support a health care system of public, for-profit, and nonprofit hospitals and other medical facilities that follow best practices to enhance and protect and preserve life."
