In Consideration of SENATE BILL 2123 MAKING AN APPROPRIATION TO STUDY ALTERNATIVES FOR THE REHABILITATION AND RENOVATION OF THE STATE CAPITOL REFLECTING POOL

Senate Bill 2123 proposes to make an appropriation of \$100,000 to the Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS) to conduct a study of various alternatives for the rehabilitation and renovation of the state capitol reflecting pool. The **Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) acknowledges the intent of this measure and provides the following comments.**

As noted in Senate Bill 2123, the State Capitol is a historic building listed in the Hawaii Register of Historic Places, as well as the National Register of Historic Places. It is an iconic structure unique among all state capitol buildings. The Department recognizes the importance of preserving the reflecting pools as they are among character defining features of the building, part of what makes the State Capitol iconic, while at the same time ensuring that they are functional and ensure the integrity of the State Capitol itself.

Should this measure get enacted, the Department looks forward to collaborating with DAGS to ensure that the requirements Chapter 6E, Hawaii Revised Statutes are satisfied and that the recommendations made conform to the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for rehabilitation of historic properties.
