SB 2210 RELATING TO VOTING

Senate Committee on Transportation and Energy

The Department of Transportation (DOT) respectfully submits comments regarding S.B. 2210.

The DOT has concerns relating to Sections 2 and 3 of S.B. 2210 with respect to the requirement that the examiner of drivers electronically transmit information required by Section 11-15, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the clerk of the county identifying all "qualified" applicants who properly complete and submit an application for a driver's license or a civil identification card. The term "qualified", which appears to be related to voting qualifications, appears in the following specific locations of the bill:

- Section 2, page 3, line 10; and
- Section 3, page 4, line 11.

Examiners of drivers and the clerks who process driver's license and civil identification card applications are not able to determine which applicants are "qualified" in terms of meeting requirements to vote. Determining which applicants are so "qualified" is more properly a function of the Office of Elections (OOE). DOT's concern about this bill could be remedied by deleting the word "qualified" where this word appears as specified in the bullet points above.

On this point, the DOT and the OOE entered into a Memorandum of Agreement in August 2017 identifying a process that satisfied both parties regarding the electronic transmission of information to OOE under which there is no need for the examiner of drivers to determine which applicants are "qualified." OOE agreed that its staff, who are extensively trained in voter registration rules, will review the qualifications of individual applicants before updating the OOE's voter registration database.

The DOT and OOE also worked to amend the driver's license and civil identification card application forms in accordance to the requirements of Act 167 of the 2016 Legislative Session.

The amended driver's license and state civil identification card application forms were ordered in a quantity of approximately one-year supply and purchased by DOT and OOE for the county operations where driver's licenses and civil identification cards services are handled. Any legislation that would require the modification of any voter registration requirements would affect the current supply of driver's license and civil identification card application forms.

Chair Inouye and Chair Nishihara and members of the Senate Committee on Transportation and Energy, and the Senate Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs, thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of Senate Bill No. 2210. The purpose of this bill is to automatically register to vote any applicant for various motor vehicle licenses and permits, including limited purpose licenses and permits, and identification cards, subject to the applicant being able to affirmatively opt-out within twenty-one days of receiving a mailing from election officials, if they are not eligible or choose not to be registered to vote.

We support automatic voter registration because it removes barriers to the electoral process and maximizes voter registration. The National Voter Registration Act of 1993 (NVRA) provides that applicants for a driver license simultaneously be allowed to register to vote. Currently, applicants must sign to indicate that their applications be transferred to the Clerk's Office to register to vote. In this bill, applicants would be automatically registered until they make a determination to opt-out.

However, we propose removing all reference to limited purpose driver's license, limited purpose provisional license, and limited purpose instruction permit as it cannot be used to establish eligibility for voter registration pursuant to HRS §286-104.5(c).

Aloha Chairs Inouye and Nishihara, Vice Chairs Espero and Wakai, and members of the Committees.

On behalf of our 20,000 members and supporters, the Sierra Club of Hawai'i, a member of the Common Good Coalition, **strongly supports SB 2210**, which would automatically register to vote those eligible individuals applying for certain licences, with the option to opt out within 21 days.

The Sierra Club of Hawai'i is committed to ensuring a fair, open, and transparent democratic process. We encourage our members and supporters to actively engage in protecting their right to vote, have their voices heard in government, increase effective partnerships across communities and organizations and consistently engage in civics. SB 2210, if enacted into law, would make these efforts just that much easier for many residents. Voting should not be something we require people to opt in to, indeed it should be something they can opt out of.

We must protect the right to vote and ensure a fair and open democracy. Across the nation we've seen active voter suppression, but we should not tolerate this in Hawai'i. Our residents deserve better. Automatic Voter Registration, is one step in ensuring a fair and accessible democratic process for all. (Other initiatives include expanding voting hours, increasing volunteer poll workers, making sure elections run smoothly, early voting, vote by mail, and restoring the right to vote for individuals with past felony convictions). There is still much to be done, and SB 2210 is a great first step!

We offer the following comment pertaining to creating an electronic system:

 The Department of Transportation and the Office of Elections are currently working on a new system to share information electronically, which eliminates the need to create an electronic transfer system, which SB 2210 currently stipulates. We suggest that language from SB 2232 be inserted to instead.

This measure *strengthens our democracy*, increases the security of our elections, and is simply more cost effective than paper applications. An opt-out Automatic Voter Registration system gives us the opportunity to modernize our elections so that they work for *all* eligible residents of

Hawai'i, particularly for working families, military families who move frequently, homebound seniors, students, and voters in rural areas.

Dear Chairs Inouye and Nishihara, Vice Chairs Espero and Wakai, and members of the Committees:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in SUPPORT of **SB 2210**, which would automatically register eligible citizens who apply for or renew their Hawaii Drivers' License or State ID unless they choose to opt out.

"Hawaii ranks dead last in voter turnout for 2016 election," blared a *Star-Advertiser* headline on March 16, 2017. The logistical barriers to voting are higher for our low-income neighbors, since they are less likely to be able to leave work to vote as well as work far from their homes and polling places. Automatic Voter Registration (AVR) would remove the first barrier to voting for them – getting registered at all.

With an AVR system, information would be electronically transferred from the licensing agency to election officials, ensuring the registration process is convenient, accurate, and secure. Implementing AVR would:

- Help the State and Counties would achieve increased processing efficiency, saving staff from manually inputting data, allowing staff to execute other duties. It costs almost 30 times more to process a paper application versus an electronic one.
- Make elections would secure with frequent updates to the voter rolls, and by using an encrypted system to transfer data rather than paper forms. Additionally, voter eligibility would be verified twice--once by the licensing agency and once by election officials.
- Incur minimal implementation costs because AVR can be integrated with Hawai'i's existing online voter registration system, creating one unified database.
- Help ensure that voting isn't needlessly difficult for working and military families who move frequently, as well as homebound seniors, students, and voters in rural areas.

We need to do more to get more than 43 percent of our eligible voters to the polls on election day. AVR would be a good start.

We appreciate your consideration of this testimony.

Updating and modernizing our system will lead to increased processing efficiency and productivity.
- Save money. States that have switched to electronic systems have reported that it costs about 30 times less to process an electronic application than a paper application.
- Elections will be more secure. Due to the increased accuracy of voter rolls—thanks to real time data transfers, fewer typos, fewer duplicate records, no more lost forms, etc. the chances of voter fraud will be reduced. The use of an encrypted system rather than paper forms to transfer data will also make our elections more secure.
- Privacy and the right to choose to participate is assured, as those who do not want to register to vote can opt-out and their information will not be shared with the Office of Elections.

Chairs Inouye and Nishihara, Vice-Chairs Espero and Wakai and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters of Hawaii strongly supports this bill that will help modernize our voting system by implementing automatic voter registration: when eligible voters obtain or renew a driver's license or obtain or update a state identification card they will be automatically signed up to vote unless they decline.

This simple reform will improve access to the electoral system for eligible voters. The Center for American Progress projected in 2017 that if Hawaii adopted an effective system like that used in Oregon, more than 145 thousand people in Hawaii would join the voter rolls in the first year of the program alone. These new voters would then be poised to participate in making political decisions. About 62 thousand of these new voters are unlikely to have become registered without the convenience of Automatic Voter Registration (AVR). ¹

AVR will also improve the accuracy of voter records because it will be easier for a voter to update their personal information. It will cut down on the cost of handling extra paper records, while providing convenience for Hawaii's busy citizens.

The League respectfully requests one amendment to this bill to protect individuals who are ineligible to register but accidentally register." Unless an ineligible applicant willfully and knowingly completes the portion of the application related to voter registration despite knowing that the applicant is not eligible to vote, the record and signature of an in eligible applicant that is knowingly transmitted

electronically or by facsimile transmission by an examiner of drivers to a clerk shall not constitute a violation of section 19-3.5. The name of any ineligible applicant that is incorrectly registered in the general county register because the applicant completed the portion of the application related to voter registration shall be removed from the registration pursuant to section 11-23."

We were delighted to learn that last August the Office of Elections and Department of Transportation entered into a Memorandum of Agreement allowing the Office of Elections to access the driver license and state identification databases, administered by the Department of Transportation and maintained by the City and County of Honolulu. It is also our understanding that no appropriation is required to implement this bill. These circumstances should make it possible for the effective date of the bill to be January 1, 2019.

The League thanks all voting and transportation officials who have cooperated to help implement this new approach to voter registration. We urge you to support this important measure.

TESTIMONY / STRONG SUPPORT with Amendments Corie Tanida, Executive Director, Common Cause Hawaii

Dear Chair Inouye, Chair Nishihara, and members of the committees:

Common Cause Hawaii strongly supports SB2210 with amendments which would automatically register eligible citizens, who apply for or renew their driver's license or identification card, to vote; unless they decline. It also establishes an electronic data transfer system between licensing and elections officials for voter registration purposes.

Automatic Voter Registration (AVR) has been and remains one of our top legislative priorities, as AVR will make our elections more secure, efficient, and accessible. AVR is a key reform to modernizing our elections and a common-sense solution that could help increase voter turnout. With Hawaii having the lowest voter turnout in the country for the last 20 years, we must do all we can to turn this around.

However, we note that during the interim, the Office of Elections and the Department of Transportation entered into a memorandum of agreement allowing for the electronic transfer of information for voter registration purposes, to ensure the integrity of our voter rolls. Our understanding is that officials are currently working on this new data system. Thus, the current version of SB2210 is no longer applicable and we ask that you **insert the language from SB2232**.

Like SB2210, SB2232 also changes voter registration at our DMVs, from an opt-in to an opt-out system. However, it also adds additional protections to safeguard our privacy and data, and better clarifies implementation than SB2210.

We commend your consideration of this important step to use existing technology and pathways to improve the process for registering eligible voters and urge you to continue reducing barriers to voting by moving forward on this bill.

Chairs Inouye and Nishihara and Committee members:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on Senate Bill 2210 that would create an automatic voter registration program for driver license applicants. We support the intent of this bill but express additional concerns.

The measure presents considerable recurring costs to the County Clerks in the form of contacting all persons serviced at drivers licensing offices (i.e. mailing of opt out notices). For Honolulu, we would anticipate spending over \$75,000 annually to mail "opt out notices" to an estimated 150,000 persons serviced at drivers licensing offices each year.

We question the assignment of financial responsibility (for sending the required notices) to the Counties for what appears to be a State drivers licensing/voter registration initiative. However, we acknowledge that counties should have a role in processing any returned opt-out responses from applicants as part of its voter registration processing responsibilities.

Additionally, while the measure acknowledges startup costs for the Department of Transportation, it does not provide any funding to the State and County election offices to modify the State voter registration system to enable processing the data transmitted from the drivers licensing offices.

We also express the following technical concerns for the committees' consideration:

1. The bill appears to stipulate automatic voter registration action for only driver license applicants that "are not currently registered" (Page 2, line 15). If the intention is that all driver license applicants be registered or re-registered (address updates, name changes, etc.) we recommend a clarification to expand automatic voter registration to all transactions.

2. The county clerk is tasked with determining eligibility to register to vote, specifically "...whether the applicant is... a citizen of the United States." (Page 2, line 9-10).

Our understanding is that drivers licensing may collect documents to verify citizenship and residency as part of compliance with the Real ID Act. This documentation is not made available to election offices and we would be unable to perform an eligibility check without requesting that applicants once again provide that documentation. We believe that a presumption of eligibility should suffice in lieu of receiving an affirmative opt out response from the applicant and recommend removal of the eligibility verification provisions.

We also highlight that this measure would apply automatic voter registration to individuals seeking the various types of limited purpose driver's licenses. It is our understanding that a portion of this category of applicant may not meet eligibility requirements for registering to vote.

3. The measure requires the assignment of a transaction number and registration of the voter after the expiration of a 21-day opt out period (page 2, lines 19-21, page 3 line 1).

This appears to suggest that applications will be held in a queue for processing only after the 21-day opt out period has expired. This provision may conflict with the federal National Voter Registration Act that presumes registration to be the date the registrant appeared at the drivers licensing office.

We recommend removing this provision to allow the election offices to develop an appropriate processing procedure. The procedure becomes especially relevant closer to the election during peak activity periods (i.e. absentee voting, pollbook printing, etc.). The details of these processes might be more appropriately addressed via the promulgation of administrative rules.

If the Legislature desires to move forward with automatic voter registration at drivers licensing policy, we would be most willing to assist with drafting a comprehensive and cohesive measure that can be implemented by both drivers licensing and election offices.

I strongly support efforts to make it easier for Hawaii residents to vote and believe this bil is likely to boost turnout by a small amount.

It is appropriate for the state to keep a database of people who are pre-qualified to vote in our elections, whether the person wants to be included or not.

However, in Hawaii, there are a number of people, particular some Native Hawaiians, who do not regard themselves as "Americans" and would resent being forced to have their names listed on what is, essentially, a roll of citizens of the state of Hawaii. In addition, there may be residents who are not convinced voting is an effective activity and may want to avoid being included on the voter roll in order to avoid the nuisance of being contacted by campaigns who work off of voter lists.

I believe in response to these two concerns, it is appropriate for the state to allow people to opt out of inclusion on the list.
