Title of Bill: SB 2387 RELATING TO THE HAWAII FARM TO SCHOOL

PROGRAM.

Purpose of Bill: Authorizes the Department of Education to establish a farm to school

program. Requires the farm to school coordinator in the department of agriculture to work in collaboration with the department of education on any farm to school program. Establishes two FTE farm to school staff positions within the department of education. Appropriates funds.

#### **Department's Position:**

The Department of Education (DOE) supports the bill to establish two FTE farm to school staff positions within the DOE. Since this is a priority for the DOE, the Board approved budget included four farm to school positions and \$228,672 and the Governor's budget request in front of the legislature for consideration includes two farm to school positions and \$114,336.

Currently, the School Food Services Branch (SFSB) has made good progress in implementing the Farm to School Program. However, the ability to grow the program, which includes increasing the consumption of local fruits and vegetables, procurement, developing school gardens, meal planning and providing the curriculum and training is currently beyond SFSB current capacity and capabilities. These additional positions will assist SFSB's ability to move in a more efficient manner in increasing the Farm to School Program.

Furthermore, the result of having these two positions will not just impact the health of children; it will also impact the health of senior citizens that SFSB serves through its vended meal program. It will result in helping the economy through local agriculture growth as well as the local communities in which the schools and senior centers reside.

The Hawaii State Department of Education seeks to advance the goals of the Strategic Plan which is focused on student success, staff success, and successful systems of support. This is achieved through targeted work around three impact strategies: school design, student voice,

The Hawaii State Teachers Association <u>supports SB 2387</u>, relating to the farm to school program.

We need to restore the balance in our public educational system in Hawaii. Hawaii's Career and Technical Education programs need to be expanded to provide greater opportunity to prepare young people to design their own futures. What better way than to support and expand our farm to school program? Not only will this program be helping to provide fresh and locally grown food for our students, but this bill will also expand the development and use of school gardens to provide hands-on experiences for our students to understand agriculture and sustainability more.

Passage of this bill would help coordinators within the DOE to work with the agricultural community to provide teachers with the knowledge they need to incorporate agricultural career paths into their curriculum using school gardens, and farm to table programs with their students, while also incorporating the importance of nutrition and the value of fresh produce served for their school lunches.

## SENATE BILL NO. 2387 RELATING TO THE HAWAII FARM TO SCHOOL PROGRAM

Chairperson Kidani, Chairperson Gabbard and Members of the Committees:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 2387. The purpose of this bill is to establish a farm to school program in the Department of Education with dedicated farm to school staff positions to work with the Farm to School Coordinator in the Department of Agriculture, to grow and sustain the Hawaii Farm to School Program. The Department of Agriculture supports this measure.

When the legislature established the Hawaii Farm to School Program in the Department of Agriculture with Act 218 (SLH 2015), the Farm to School Coordinator began working with Department of Education to "address the issues of supply, demand, procurement, and consumption of Hawaii-grown foods in state facilities" (HRS §141-11(b)), as well as accelerate school garden and farm based education, and expand the relationships between public schools and agricultural communities (HRS §141-11(a)). This measure supports the necessary coordination between the Department of Education and the Department of Agriculture for farm to school success.

Through the leadership of the Office of the Lieutenant Governor, the Department of Education's School Food Services Branch (HIDOE-SFSB) has implemented the 'Aina Pono farm to school initiative, to develop more scratch cooked meals for students and source more locally grown foods for new recipes. In support of these efforts, the



Department of Agriculture has developed the "Hawaiian Harvest of the Month" with stakeholders, as a farm to school promotion and outreach program to connect inseason Hawaii –grown food to school cafeterias, student education activities, recipe development, and farmer outreach. We have seen some success with December's local beef month and are eager to continue working through seasonal items with HIDOE-SFSB.

The Department of Agriculture is encouraged by the increased purchases of locally grown food the Department of Education has been procuring from local vendors, and supports their continued efforts to work with our local producers. Establishing a Farm to School Program with dedicated coordinators within the Department of Education will provide the critical support to build on the momentum of the current initiative and institutionalize a program with protocols that should work for the Department of Education.

#### American Heart Association in SUPPORT of SB 2387, "Relating to the Hawaii Farm To School Program"

The American Heart Association supports SB 2387, Relating to the Hawaii Farm to School Program.

The Farm to School Program helps students develop a rich understanding and appreciation for fresh fruits and vegetables, making it easier to continue practicing healthy eating habits at home.

Obesity is an epidemic in Hawaii, with adult rates more than doubling since the mid-1990s. Additionally, about one in every three children entering kindergarten in our state is already overweight or obese. The danger is that obesity can lead to chronic diseases later in life, such as diabetes, heart disease and some cancers. It is also costly to our society; each year, Hawaii spends roughly \$427 million obesity-related health care costs.

Staying active and eating healthy food are the two main ways to prevent obesity and reduce the risk of chronic disease. Establishing healthy behaviors at an early age can help to prevent the onset of many of the common chronic diseases. The American Heart Association estimates that 80 percent of heart disease and stroke is preventable through improved lifestyle habits.

Eating a variety of fruits and vegetables may help control both weight and blood pressure, and they contribute a number of important nutrients that most people don't get enough of, including folate, magnesium, potassium and dietary fiber, as well as vitamins A, C, and K. And they are naturally low in saturated fat and calories. The American Heart Association recommends eating eight or more fruit and vegetable servings every day. An average adult consuming 2,000 calories daily should aim for 4.5 cups of fruits and vegetables a day. Also, variety matters, so it's important to eat a wide range of fruits and veggies.

Teaching our keiki from a young age the value of healthy, fresh, and local foods can establish in them healthier eating habits that will continue through their lifespan. The American Heart Association encourages legislators to support SB 2387.

Thank you for taking the time to read my testimony.

My name is Amanda Rieux and I am with MÄ• la'ai: The Culinary Garden of Waimea Middle School on Hawaii Island. We are a non-profit working in partnership with Waimea Middle School on Hawaii Island. I am writing today in strong support of SB2387 relating to the Hawaii Farm to School Program.

I am testifying in support of SB2387 for several reasons.

There is tremendous and building momentum in the farm to school movement in Hawaii. Around the state, school-by-school, we have built this movement over the last decade.

At this time 87% of our public schools have school gardens. These gardens are have been developed by educators, parents, nonprofits and volunteers all over the state as a grassroots effort to provide what our school children need most. School gardens provide hands-on real-world learning environments and direct connection to healthy food and activity. These learning gardens engage our students in learning and will impact their ability to make healthy choices and take care of themselves in the future. (Health issues relating to food and physical activity are at an epidemic level for the population of students at the Waimea Middle School. For example, given their demographics, statistically 2 out 3 of our students will develop Adult Onset Diabetes during their lifetime.)

School gardens are a foundational part of the Farm to school movement and they are already in over ¾ of the schools. With allocated positions to work in concert with the DOA to build our state's Farm to School program, our Hawaii DOE could begin to provide institutional support for this huge movement that is already taking place in schools.

A robust Farm to School Program will:

- Create reliable markets for farmers encouraging diversified agriculture
- Encourage young people to learn about farming and food systems and to become involved in our food system as farmers, food purveyors etc.
- Increase our capacity to grow our own food in the state

- Spend money locally instead of importing food from out of state
- Provide nourishing meals for our school children

This program will benefit our state economically, move us toward sustainability, and critically, provide nourishing, delicious meals for the children in our state, especially the most vulnerable ones.

I urge you to support SB2387 for the benefit of our farmers, our schools, our children and our ability to build a sustainable future for the state of Hawaii.

Aloha Chair Kidani, Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Kahele, Vice Chair Riviere, and Members of the Committees:

I am Randy Cabral, President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,900 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau supports SB 2387, which establishes a farm to school grant pilot program within the Hawaii department of agriculture to provide grants to schools, early care and education centers, nonprofits, soil and water conservation districts, and food producers participating in the Hawaii farm to school program, requires the Hawaii farm to school coordinator to submit a report to the legislature, and makes appropriations for continuance of the Hawaii farm to school program and coordinator position.

HFB strongly supports increased use of locally grown agricultural products, fruits, vegetables, meats, dairy and poultry products in our schools and other public institutions. This will truly be a significant step towards increasing our levels of self- sufficiency. HFB also believes that learning where food comes from is an important part of our children's education. Agriculture education involves more than just learning the basics of food production, it provides the opportunity for our children to understand and appreciate the importance of agriculture.

Many formal and informal studies have been done addressing farm to school programs. Our farmers and ranchers have tried to work with the procurement system and can speak about the challenges of the system. For example, supplying a school or schools within a geographic area is feasible, but providing to the entire school system is not. Focus should now be on working with the procurement system to make institutional markets accessible

while considering the capacity of farmers and ranchers in Hawaii. Assistance to farmers on how to navigate the system should be a priority.

HFB recognizes the need and importance of agricultural education and school farm programs, and as a farm organization we would like to see increased emphasis of agriculture in schools. We believe that school farms serve multiple purposes. They serve not only to educate students on how to grow crops but also what it takes to turn a farm into a successful business enterprise that can be a career choice. Agronomy, economics, science, business planning, entomology, pathology and various technologies including programming, navigation and robotics are some of the courses that can evolve around the farm. Programs that teach the principles behind good agricultural practices - steps that must be taken that protect the environment, product, and worker are critical components of a school farm. The purpose of the farm should be to educate and expose students to a career choice.

Developing and maintaining an agricultural workforce should be a vital component of this program. A trained workforce with various skills is necessary to any agricultural operation. This need has to be addressed along with generating interest in our youth to pursue the various careers and to become our future leaders in Hawaii agriculture. HFB supports programs and initiatives such as the FFA, 4-H, and Farm to School programs because they help to educate and reconnect our children with agriculture. Through agricultural education programs, our children will gain an understanding and appreciation for agriculture which will result in healthier eating habits, stronger support for Hawaii's agriculture industry and will contribute to Hawaii's food security.

This should be viewed is an investment in Hawaii's future to develop well-informed consumers and supporters of our local agricultural industries.

Aloha Senators,

Kōkua Hawai'i Foundation **STRONGLY supports SB2387**, which will create a Farm to School program in the Department of Education (DOE) and provide funding for two Farm to School staff positions.

The Kōkua Hawai'i Foundation is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization founded in 2003 to support environmental education in the schools and communities of Hawai'i. One of our programs is 'ĀINA In Schools, a farm to school initiative launched in 2006 that connects children to their local land, waters, and food to grow a healthier Hawai'i. In addition to encouraging the use of locally grown fruits and vegetables in school meals and snacks, the program includes a standards-based nutrition, garden, and compost curriculum that empowers children to grow their own food, make informed food decisions, and reduce waste. 'ĀINA In Schools also promotes field trips to local farms, chef cooking demonstrations in classrooms, as well as waste reduction, garden, and cooking educational opportunities for families and community members. We work directly with 23 O'ahu elementary schools that have implemented the program school-wide. We have also trained an additional 472 educators from over 239 schools and organizations from across the state in the use of our 'ĀINA garden, composting, and nutrition curricula.

**SB2387** is essential to expanding Farm to School statewide, providing necessary support to the Department of Education to improve school food environments, incorporate school garden programs in the school curriculum, and work with stakeholders to increase educational opportunities and the procurement of locally grown produce in school cafeterias.

With more than 85 percent of Hawai'i youth attending public schools, Farm to School within the DOE would bring parents, students, teachers, and farmers together to strengthen what is grown and consumed in our state. More importantly, students who participate in Farm to School activities are more likely to be familiar with, prefer, and consume fruits and vegetables at school and at home. It is never too early to establish healthy behaviors to prevent unhealthy weight gain, tooth decay, or Type 2 diabetes, which are often associated with unhealthy dietary behaviors. Please see the attached document from the National Farm to School Network, "The Benefits of Farm to School" for specific examples and statistics of how farm to school programs benefit students, schools, and local economies.

Having spent the last 12 years working to advance Farm to School in Hawai'i and serving as Core Partner (state-level representative) to the National Farm to School Network, Kōkua Hawai'i Foundation is highly invested in this movement. We offer our strong support for this measure and look forward to continued and expanded partnerships with the DOE to implement Farm to School in Hawai'i. We strongly urge you to vote in support of SB2387.

# THE BENEFITS OF FARM TO SCHOOL

#### What is Farm to School?

Farm to school enriches the connection communities have with fresh, healthy food and local food producers by changing food purchasing and education practices at schools and early care and education sites. Farm to school empowers children and their families to make informed food choices while strengthening the local economy and contributing to vibrant communities. Farm to school implementation differs by location but always includes one or more of the following three core elements:

**Procurement:** Local foods are purchased, promoted and served in the cafeteria, as a snack or in classroom taste-tests.

**Education:** Students participate in education activities related to agriculture, food, health and nutrition.

**School gardens:** Students engage in hands-on, experiential learning through gardening.

#### Why Farm to School?



#### KIDS WIN

Farm to school provides all kids access to nutritious, high-quality, local food so they are ready to learn and grow. Farm to school activities enhance classroom education through hands-on learning related to food, health, agriculture and nutrition.



#### **FARMERS WIN**

Farm to school can serve as a significant financial opportunity for farmers, fishers, ranchers, food processors and food manufacturers by opening doors to an institutional market worth billions of dollars.



#### **COMMUNITIES WIN**

Farm to school benefits everyone from students, teachers and administrators to parents and farmers, providing opportunities to build family and community engagement. Buying from local producers and processors creates new jobs and strengthens the local economy.

#### **Job Creation and Economic Activity**

- Creation and maintenance of jobs in the community and in the state; for every job created by school districts purchasing local foods, additional economic activity creates another 1.67 jobs. 40,55
- Increase in economic activity in the community and in the state. 40,49,50,55
- Each dollar invested in farm to school stimulates an additional \$0.60-\$2.16 of local economic activity, in one case resulting in \$1.4 million overall contribution to the state.<sup>40</sup>
- Strengthen connections within the state's food economy.<sup>40</sup>
- Increase in student meal participation from 3 percent to 16 percent (average +9 percent), generating increased revenue for schools through meal programs.<sup>8-9,20-21,23-25,36,41,49,58</sup>

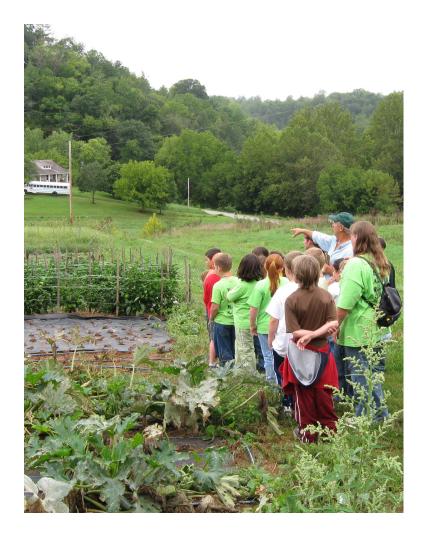
- Increase in local procurement as farm to school programming matures, with documented local sourcing reaching up to 50 percent of all produce purchases in season.<sup>7-9,20,22-23,25,36-37,39</sup>
- Average 5 percent increase in income from farm to school sales and establishment of a long-term revenue stream for individual farmers. 7,9,20,22-23,36,39,55
- Increase in market diversification and economic growth opportunities for farmers; positive relationships for farmers with school districts, parents and community members; farmers contracted to plant crops for schools; opportunities to explore processing and preservation methods for institutional markets; establishment of grower collaboratives or cooperatives to supply institutional markets.<sup>36-37, 68</sup>

#### **Public Health**

Farm to school is a community-based strategy that includes a focus on creating a healthy school food environment.¹ Farm to school activities support development of healthy eating habits for children while improving family food security by boosting the quality of school meal programs.²-5

#### **Student Nutrition Behaviors**

- Improvement in early childhood and K-12 student health behaviors, including choosing healthier options at school meals, consuming more fruits and vegetables through farm to school meals and at home (+0.99 to +1.3 servings/day), consuming less unhealthy foods and sodas, reducing screen time and increasing physical activity. 6-31,43-46,49,51,53,57,61-64,67,68
- Increase in fruit and vegetable consumption among those with the lowest previous intake.<sup>51</sup>
- When schools offer school gardens, 44.2 percent of students eat more fruits and vegetables; when schools serve local food, 33.1 percent of students eat more fruits and vegetables.<sup>46</sup>
- Demonstrated willingness to try new foods and healthier options (in early childhood and K-12 settings).<sup>7,20-22,30-33,45,47</sup>



- Tripled amount of fruit and vegetable consumption when students participate in hands-on, food-based activities.<sup>47</sup>
- Minimized diet-related diseases in childhood such as obesity and diabetes through the promotion of eating fresh fruits and vegetables, specifically for high-risk, low-income students.<sup>50,59,61</sup>

#### **Knowledge, Attitudes and Access**

- Improvement in nutrition habits, environmental awareness and health-related knowledge.<sup>57,61</sup>
- Increase in willingness to try and consumption of fruits and vegetables at an older age due to gardening at a young age.<sup>60</sup>
- Increase in access to fruits and vegetables; increase in planning and preparing meals at home. 57,61-64

I am professor and director of Public Health at the University of Hawai'i, testifying as an individual. Research shows that Farm to School programs help children, schools, and farmers. For example, farm to school programs increase students' fruit and vegetable intake, improve students' attitudes towards and willingness to try fruits and vegetables, and increase their knowledge related to nutrition and agriculture. They also learn about composting.

This measure is essential to expanding Farm to School statewide, providing necessary support to the Department of Education to improve school food environments, incorporate school garden programs in the school curriculum, and work with stakeholders to increase educational opportunities and the procurement of locally grown produce in school cafeterias.

Ulupono believes that self-sufficiency is essential to our future prosperity and will help shape a future where economic progress and mission-focused impact can work hand in hand.

**Ulupono** <u>strongly supports</u> **SB 2387**, which establishes a farm to school program and two critical positions within the Department of Education, because it aligns with our goal of creating more locally produced food.

This program incorporates more locally grown scratch-cooked meals into our public school cafeterias and is a win for all parties involved. This effort started decades ago with passionate advocates, was test trialed in the last year at the Kohala school complex via funding by private sector and non-profit foundation grants, and resulted in adoption by the Department of Education after demonstrating initial success thru data. The results were encouraging, including greater meal participation, less food waste, far higher local food and fresh food content, and, bottom line, lower cost per meal eaten. Aloha Chair Kidani and Members of the Committee:

My name is Carrie Archibald. I am a teacher and parent at James Campbell High School in Ewa Beach on Oahu, where my son is a senior. I am also a community member in Aiea. I am submitting testimony in support of SB 2922 to increase funding for public schools.

Our children are our future. When teachers instruct their students, they build the foundation for equality and prosperity for tomorrow's generations. Every dollar invested in our community's public schools yields exponential returns, not just for our economy, but for the promise of a more open and democratic society.

We need additional funding for our public schools, at my school we lose almost 20 teachers per year when the demands of the profession aren't aligned with the compensation they can get from other career options. In some cases we have long term substitutes, or worse, rotating by week or even day, temporary substitute teachers responsible for a teaching line for as long as an entire school year. There are also a variety of facilities available by campus when it should be more consistent and equal (i.e. some schools have auditoriums for band and drama programs, some have ample athletic facilities, but not all). Educational research expects more collaboration, planning, technology, student support, and therefore time, that teachers take away from their time with their families and personal responsibilities, to manage.

I have worked as a garden educator with k-12 students (and now with university students) and can attest to the positive benefits of the outdoor garden classroom for behavioral issues as well as to supplement what is being learned in the indoor classroom. Different students learn in different ways. We can't expect all students to thrive within the indoor classroom. A farm-to-school program would not only teach students the importance of plants and the foods they eat (not to mention, students are more likely to eat healthy foods if they've taken part in growing them) but also provide a means of hands-on, experiential learning to make what they're learning more tangible and relevant.
