Testimony COMMENTING on SB2474, SD2 RELATING TO NOISE CONTROL

- 1 **Fiscal Implications:** The Department of Health appreciates the intent of this measure but defers
- 2 to the priorities set forth in the Executive Budget.
- 3 **Department Testimony:** This measure requires the Department of Health (DOH) to conduct a
- 4 study on the impacts of aviation noise on the residents in the Puna district and surrounding areas
- of the Hawaii Volcanoes National Park and report its findings and recommendations, including
- 6 any proposed rule adoption and legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to
- 7 the convening of the regular session of 2019.
- 8 The Governor and Legislature have already appropriated funds to the State Department of
- 9 Transportation (DOT) in Act 049 for the purpose of planning noise monitoring and noise
- compatibility studies for fiscal years 2017-2018 and 2018-2019. While the Department of
- Health (DOH) could provide a noise study of the area, we would be ill-equipped to adopt new
- rules or recommend legislation to address aircraft noise because the regulation of Hawaii's
- airspace in general, and the management of flight paths in particular, in addition to the noise of
- an aircraft at its source, are governed exclusively by federal law (the Aviation Safety and Noise
- Abatement Act of 1979) and are under the purview of the Federal Aviation Administration
- 16 (FAA). Consequently, any undertaking by DOH to regulate in these areas would be subject to
- federal preemption and would likely be invalidated. In addition, the intent of HRS Chapter 342F
- and HAR 11-46 was to regulate noise emanating from stationary equipment, and equipment

- 1 related to agricultural, construction, and industrial activities. These types of sources are either
- 2 fairly constant in it nature, stationary or restricted to a certain location. Finally, it is our
- 3 understanding that under certain circumstances the proprietor of an airport has some discretion to
- 4 address local concerns regarding aircraft noise without violating federal law. Therefore, we
- 5 suggest the Legislature continue working with DOT to explore ways in which DOT, as an airport
- 6 owner/operator, in concert with the FAA, may be able to address the concerns of the
- 7 communities impacted by aircraft noise.

I support SB 2474, SD 2, and thank you for giving it a hearing.

SB 2474, SD 2 would require that the Department of Health conduct a study on the impact of aviation noise on residents of the Puna District and surrounding areas of the Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park. It also appropriates unspecified funds to the Department of Health to conduct the study.

I know that funding is tight, but this noise issue is one of the most vexing that we face. Helicopters have been a source of endless complaints from communities that lie in the flight path to HVNP, and there should be no doubt that noise can constitute both a nuisance and a health hazard, especially in otherwise tranquil rural areas.

Tour companies that bear the brunt of the public's ire could also benefit from such a study, if positive suggestions and/or compromises emerge from the study's findings.

I have met with tour operators and asked them to develop a plan to address noise issues. They have taken some initial steps, and I commend them for that. Moreover, I am hopeful that tour operators and community members can work together. Having the study called for in SB 2474, SD 2 would be a positive way of moving the process forward.
