Thank you for this opportunity to testify in SUPPORT of SB2549.

The purpose of this bill is to require the liquor commission to streamline procedures to provide for the issuance of temporary licenses for the sale of liquor for a period not to exceed one day for fundraising events by nonprofit organizations.

Currently in Maui County, there is a very onerous process for non-profit organizations to get a one day special liquor license for their fundraising events. It has been so difficult that several large events were either cancelled or were unable to serve liquor which cost them 5 digits of income.

I would also like to suggest that there be language to allow the non-profits to offer at live or silent auction the ability to auction off liquor (closed bottles/cans) or services that provide liquor, i.e. whale watch cruises that provide liquor as part of the tour. Currently several non-profits were denied that option and, again, lost several dollars in income.

I strongly urge you to pass SB2549.

Comments on SB 2549, Relating to Liquor Licenses

Dear Chairs Baker and Taniguichi, Vice Chairs Tokuda and Rhoads, and Members:

The Liquor Commission, City and County of Honolulu (Commission), appreciates the opportunity to submit testimony providing comments on Senate Bill 2549, Relating to Liquor Licenses.

The Commission fully supports legislation that legitimately reduces the application burden for certain types of licensees but also gives reasonable flexibility to regulators in addressing oversight and compliance requirements. That said, we submit comments on Sections 1 and 2 of Senate Bill 2549 for the purpose of clarifying the desired impact of the proposed measure.

1. Creating a New Type of Temporary License for Nonprofit Fundraising Events.

Prior to the 2008 repeal of Section 281-32.3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as amended, it was the Commission's practice to administratively approve applications for nonprofit fundraising events (Nonprofit Special License), with the reduced submission requirements dictated by HRS Section 28-32.3. Following the inclusion of the Nonprofit Special License into the "standard" Class 10 Special license section, the Commission continued its practice of administrative approvals and reduced submission requirements for Nonprofit Special License applications, with the rare exception of applications with the potential for heightened public impact, which Commission administration would

refer back to the Commission at a public hearing. Therefore, the proposed measure would not impact City and County of Honolulu applicants for Nonprofit Special Licenses, as the Commission does not subject the application process to increased requirements.

2. Elimination of Commission Discretion for Certain Applications.

In this section, the proposed measure would eliminate the Commission's discretion in instances where an applicant is applying for a license for a premises or building location that had previously been denied, refused, or withdrawn. The Commission is given broad discretion at the initial application stage. Therefore, it is unclear why said discretion would be eliminated when reviewing a subsequent application for a premises or building location already unsuccessful in becoming a licensed premises. If the purpose of this proposed elimination is to efficiently evaluate a "second chance" application, Commission discretion in this area should be retained.

The Liquor Commission appreciates the opportunity to provide testimony on Senate Bill 2549, Relating to Liquor Licenses.

Senators Baker and Tokuda:

I am writing in support of SB 2549. In my practice I assist numerous non-profits. I also currently or in the past have served on the boards of the following community and non-profit organizations:

- 1. Kula Community Association
- 2. Haleakala Waldorf School, past president
- 3. Pacific Cancer Foundation, past president
- 4. Nā Keiki o Emalia
- 5. Maui Economic Opportunity, Inc., vice president

With the exception of the Kula Community Association, each of the above organizations has held events where liquor is served. Most of the above entities, like nearly all non-profits, operate on shoe-string budgets. One-day fundraising events are not the same as a commercial business that operates 365 days per year, and the licensing requirements should reflect this. Applying commercial requirements to such organizations and events is unreasonably burdensome both in time and money. That time and money comes out of, and detracts from the vital mission of the organization. The executive director of one organization I serve recently spent upwards of 80 hours, including six (6) separate meetings with liquor department personnel in order to obtain a license for an event that has occurred at the same location for the past decade. Staff time alone cost the organization thousands of dollars.

Furthermore, many fundraisers are held in private homes where clearances that might be applicable to commercial venues are not relevant. It can and has led to confusion, delay, and increased expense in attempting to "prove" to a liquor department that other departments/agencies simply do not regulate a place or activity.

The one-day licenses for non-profit organizations must be streamlined to reflect the value of the missions of non-profits, the fact that these are not commercial operations that will sell liquor on an ongoing basis, and that both the time and expense of obtaining a license should be minimized or eliminated.
