TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL NO. 2592, RELATING TO NURSE AIDES.

TO THE HONORABLE JOSH GREEN, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

The Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs ("Department") appreciates the opportunity to testify on S.B. 2592, Relating to Nurse Aides. My name is Lee Ann Teshima, and I am the Executive Officer of the Nurse Aide Program under the Department's Professional and Vocational Licensing Division. The Nurse Aide Program opposes this bill and provides the following comments.

This bill amends the current recertification requirements for certified nurse aides employed in a state-licensed or state-certified health care setting by allowing an individual certified nurse aide to complete eight hours of dementia training and pass a competency examination on dementia training in lieu of a comprehensive competency evaluation approved by the Department of Human Services. Completing and passing an eight-hour course is not equivalent to a comprehensive competency evaluation. I have attached the Department of Human Services' Nurse Aide Competency/Proficiency Evaluation form for your perusal. The activities listed on this form far exceed the completion of one course in a specific topic.

DCCA does not oppose any dementia training for health professionals who care for individuals with dementia, we do oppose any compromise to requirements that ensure that all

certified nurse aides maintain the competency and proficiency to take care of our vulnerable or elderly residents.

RE: SB 2592 – NURSE AIDES; RECERTIFICATION Testimony in STRONG SUPPORT

On behalf of the Alzheimer's Association, Aloha Chapter, we STRONGLY SUPPORT SB 25592 that adds the option of 8-hours of competency training relating to assisting with activities of daily living and dementia, for the recertification of nurse aides working in non-Medicare/Medicaid health settings.

This bill addresses unfair nurse aide recertification requirements for those that do not work in medicare or medicaid certified nursing facilities. Even if they do not work in medicare or medicaid certified health setting, the requirement is to work in a medicare or medicaid facility for 8 hours during the past 24 month period or they would need to complete a 24-hour competency/proficiency program. In contrast, nurse aides that work in medicare or medicaid certified nursing facilities only have the 8-hour work requirement and do not need to complete a 24-hour competency/proficiency program.

The Alzheimer's Association has met with representatives from DCCA and DHS on this issue. For individuals that do not work in Medicare/Medicaid health settings we are requesting the deletion of the recertification requirement to work eight hours in a Medicare/Medicaid facility during the past 24 months; and instead substitute the requirement that individuals provide a DHS competency evaluation signed by an Registered Nurse and complete 8 hours of approved training in topics specified in Hawaii Administrative Rules, DHS, Chapter 1445, relating to competency in assisting with activities of daily living.

For nurse aides that do not work in Medicare/Medicaid facilities the current requirement is an undue hardship as it requires them to pay for a 24-hour training program, while suffering a loss of wages to attend the training. This requirement results in nurse aides allowing their certification to lapse, due to the cost and lost wages to take the training program. The public suffers when nurse aides are not recertified as these individuals can continue to work in non-Medicare/Medicaid health settings without any assurance as to their ongoing competency.

This change would provide nurse aides the incentive to get recertified. There is a severe shortage of nurse aides and the demand for nurse aides is increasing due to the need to assist increasing numbers of individuals with dementia and Alzheimer's Disease. The Kupuna Caregiver Program would also benefit by this bill as there would be a need to maintain and increase the supply of nurse aides due to the probable high demand for nurse aides generated by the program.

We urge you to pass SB 2592.

Testimony in STRONG SUPPORT

On behalf of the Alzheimer's Association, Aloha Chapter, we STRONGLY SUPPORT SB 2592 that adds the option of 8-hours of dementia training and a competency exam, for the recertification of nurse aides working in state-licensed or state-certified (i.e., non-Medicare/Medicaid) health care settings.

This bill addresses inequitable nurse aide recertification requirements for those that do not work in medicare or medicaid certified nursing facilities. Nurse aides that work in medicare or medicaid certified nursing facilities are only required to have a performance review, in-service training, and an 8-hour work requirement. In contrast, nurse aides in state-licensed or state-certified health care settings are additionally required to complete a 24-hour competency/proficiency program.

For individuals that work in state-licensed or state-certified health care settings we are requesting the option that instead requires individuals to submit a DHS competency evaluation, complete 8 hours of approved dementia training and an 8-hour work requirement.

For nurse aides that do not work in Medicare/Medicaid facilities the current requirement is an undue hardship as it requires them to pay for a 24-hour training program, while suffering a loss of wages to attend the training. This requirement results in nurse aides allowing their certification to lapse, due to the cost and lost wages to take the training program. The public suffers when nurse aides are not recertified as these individuals can continue to work in non-Medicare/Medicaid health settings without any assurance as to their ongoing competency.

This change would provide nurse aides the incentive to get recertified. There is a severe shortage of nurse aides and the demand for nurse aides is increasing due to the need to assist increasing numbers of individuals with dementia and Alzheimer's Disease. The Kupuna Caregiver Program would also benefit by this bill as there would be a need to maintain and increase the supply of nurse aides due to the probable high demand for nurse aides generated by the program.

Testimony in STRONG SUPPORT

I am pleased to testify in full support for SB2592, which adds dementia training as an option for recertification for nurse aides.

My wife was diagnosed with Alzheimer's dementia in 2012. To help me care for her, I used home health aides from a professional care provider whenever I had to leave the house occasionally for appointments or meetings. When my own doctor recognized that I needed more help to care for my wife because of my own health issues, she recommended that we find and assisted living facility "sooner rather than later." I'm glad we did because my wife now receives personal care from nurse aides/assistants in our facility for most of her activities of daily living (ADLs). Fortunately, my wife's Federal Long-Term Care Insurance has paid for all of the ADL care she received since 2012.

Here in Hawaii, more than 27,000 individuals live with Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia. In addition to such, there are over 66,000 unpaid family caregivers within our state. And the numbers will grow exponentially as our population ages.

As the numbers of people affected continue to grow, so will the need for services such as inhome care, adult day care, care homes and assisted living facilities.
