Testimony in SUPPORT of S.B. 2654 SD2 HD1 RELATING TO CHAPTER 245, HAWAII REVISED STATUTES

- 1 Fiscal Implications: The Department of Health (DOH) defers to the Department of Taxation
- 2 (DOTAX) for fiscal implications of implementation and to the Department of the Attorney
- 3 General (AG) for fiscal implications for enforcement.
- 4 **Department Testimony:** The DOH supports Senate Bill 2654, Senate Draft 2, House Draft 1
- 5 (S.B. 2654 SD2 HD1) as a measure to protect the public's health. The bill makes unlawful the
- 6 shipping of tobacco products and prohibits the remote sale and distribution of cigarettes and
- 7 tobacco products, including electronic smoking devices (ESD), to consumers except for licensed
- 8 wholesalers or dealers. It provides for the inclusion of e-liquid in the definition of tobacco
- 9 products, the imposition of an excise tax, the requirement for licensing and permitting fees, and
- increase in licensing and permitting fees. It increases the excise taxes on cigarettes and tobacco
- products by unspecified amounts. The DOH defers to DOTAX for implementation, and to the
- 12 AG regarding the enforcement of the shipping regulations.

Despite tremendous progress in reducing smoking, tobacco use is still the leading cause of preventable illness and death in the United States and in Hawaii.¹ It is crucial that the progress made in reducing cigarette smoking among youth and young adults not be compromised by the initiation of e-cigarettes. In 2017, 8.1% of high students were regular

cigarette users, but when it came to e-cigarettes, an alarming 25% were regular users, and 42%

had tried them.² Several studies have shown that youth who use e-cigarettes are more likely to

3 use regular cigarettes.^{3,4,5}

The DOH supports the restriction of shipping tobacco products to anyone other than a licensed wholesaler/dealer, that is engaged in the business of selling tobacco products and is on the DOTAX authorized list. This will strengthen protections for youth and young adults.

Hawaii is among five states (including California, Oregon, New Jersey, and Maine) having the strongest age laws in the country that prohibit the sales of tobacco products to any person under the age of twenty-one years. Such legislation specifically addresses face-to-face transactions and is meant to prevent youth access and initiation of tobacco use. However, the acceleration of online tobacco product sales has created a dangerous loophole, undermining efforts to protect public health, by providing an appealing option for underage smokers. In the current unregulated online market, youth easily, and often, circumvent the age verification process for purchasing tobacco. In some transactions age verification simply requires the consumer to acknowledge that a person is over the legal age to purchase by clicking the word, "agree," to advance the transaction.

The Internet Tobacco Vendors Study (ITV), supported by the National Cancer Institute and the United States Food and Drug Administration (USFDA) Center for Tobacco Products, has monitored the online tobacco industry for over fifteen years, to assess sales practices and public health impacts. In 2016, its study found that minors were successful in buying ESDs online 93% of the time despite age restrictions and another study found that ESDs were often shipped from internet vendors without instructions or health warnings. Due to the easy access for minors

through online marketing, researchers recommend more vigorous policies to prohibit sales to minors.^{6,7}

Unregulated online access provides a way for the purchaser and tobacco industry to avoid federal and state taxes, resulting in loss of revenue and evasion of an important public health tool for prevention. Youth are price sensitive and online purchasing options are a less expensive method for acquiring tobacco products including ESDs. Hawaii has seen ESD use by youth and young adults increase at an alarming rate. ESDs are now the most commonly used tobacco product among youth in the nation, and in Hawaii. The electronic cigarette industry is growing rapidly, with retail and online sales of electronic smoking devices projected to reach \$10,000,000,000 in 2017. The pricing, marketing, and variety of youth-friendly flavors are contributing to the increased use of ESDs. 14

The DOH supports the proposed amendment in the measure to require wholesalers and retailers of e-liquids to obtain the applicable license or permit. Currently, all that is required of these vendors is a General Excise License. A statewide survey conducted by the University of Hawaii Cancer Center identified more than 100 e-cigarette establishments (vape shops) as separate from tobacco retail outlets. However, this cannot be considered an accurate assessment, since no specific database exists from the DOTAX regarding the number of vendors. Licensure and retail permitting would bring e-liquid vendors in alignment with the traditional tobacco

- 1 retailers and would provide accurate data for compliance surveillance and working with the
- 2 vendors to educate and enforce current tobacco laws.

- The proposed increases in licensure and permitting fees are long overdue. They have remained unchanged since 1995, despite high tobacco taxes and ever-increasing tobacco industry expenditures in marketing and advertising. Tobacco licensing is an effective tool for limiting the negative public health consequences of tobacco use by ensuring that wholesalers and retailers comply with responsible sales practices. The proposed licensing would apply to those who sell e-liquids.
 - The DOH supports S.B. 2654 SD2 HD1 as a multifaceted public health measure to help prevent access to e-liquid, e-cigarettes, cigarettes and tobacco products among youth and young adults and to encourage users to quit.

The Department of Taxation (Department) offers the following comments on S.B. 2654, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, for the Committee's consideration.

S.B. 2654, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, makes unlawful the transport of tobacco products ordered through remote sale to any address other than that of a tobacco wholesaler or dealer. S.B. 2654, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, also expands the tax on tobacco products to include e-liquid used in electronic smoking devices. Under this bill, wholesalers and dealers of e-liquid would be subject to a tax of an unspecified percentage of the wholesale price of the e-liquid, and wholesalers, dealers and retailers of e-liquid would be required to secure licenses and retail permits annually. S.B. 2654, S.D. 2, H.D. 1, also increases the annual fee for a tobacco license from \$2.50 per year to \$250 per year, and the annual fee for a tobacco retail permit from \$20 per location to \$50 per location. Lastly, this measure amends the tax rate on cigarettes and little cigars to an unspecified amount per cigarette or little cigar on or after November, 2018, and amends the rate on tobacco products other than large cigars to an unspecified percentage of their wholesale price on or after July 1, 2018. The bill has a defective effective date of July 1, 3000.

The Department notes that it is able to administer the changes in this measure.

SUBJECT: TOBACCO, Prohibits shipment of tobacco products, adds electronic smoking devices, hikes rates and fees

BILL NUMBER: SB 2654, HD-1

INTRODUCED BY: House Committee on Health & Human Services

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: Prohibits shipment of tobacco products to anyone other than a licensee. Includes e-liquid within the definition of "tobacco products", as used in the cigarette tax and tobacco tax law, thereby making all provisions of the cigarette tax and tobacco tax law that relate to tobacco products applicable to e-liquid as well. Increases the license fees and taxes on cigarettes and tobacco products.

SYNOPSIS: Adds a new section to chapter 245, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to prohibit certain transport of tobacco products other than to a tobacco licensee, unless either (1) the tobacco products are exempt from tax, or (2) the packaging includes a notice to the effect that the State bans the sale of tobacco products to individuals under 21, and that the recipient is legally responsible for all applicable unpaid taxes on the shipped products. Unlawful shipment of tobacco products is a misdemeanor. Provides that any person or entity that purchases, uses, controls, or possesses any tobacco products for which the applicable tax has not been paid, shall be liable for the taxes, plus penalties and interest as provided for by law.

Adds a new definition to HRS section 245-1 of "e-liquid."

Amends the definition of "tobacco products" in HRS section 245 to include e-liquid.

Amends section 245-2, HRS, to raise the annual tobacco license fee from \$2.50 to \$250.00.

Amends section 245-2.5, HRS, to raise the annual retail tobacco permit fee from \$20 to \$50.

Amends section 245-3, HRS, to raise the tax on cigarettes or little cigars from 16 to ____ cents per stick, and to impose an excise tax on other tobacco products other than large cigars in the amount of ____% of the wholesale price.

EFFECTIVE DATE: July 1, 3000.

STAFF COMMENTS: The question that should be asked is the purpose of the tobacco tax. If the goal is to make people stop smoking by making it cost-prohibitive to smoke, then (a) it's working, as hikes in the cigarette tax have begun to exert downward pressure on collections not only locally but also nationally, but (b) it shouldn't be expected to raise revenue, because of (a). If the goal is really to stop the behavior, why are we not banning it?

As the Foundation's previous President, Lowell Kalapa, wrote in the Tax Foundation of Hawaii's weekly commentary on October 28, 2012:

Lawmakers seem to have a simplistic reaction to solving problems the solution to which plagues their constituents – tax it.

Probably the best example is what people like to call sin taxes, those excise taxes that are levied on tobacco and alcohol products. After all, smoking causes cancer and alcohol causes all sorts of problems including driving under the influence. Lawmakers and community advocates shake their heads and push for higher tax rates, arguing that making these products more expensive will deter folks from using these products.

The problem is that lawmakers also like the revenues that are generated from the sales of these products and, in some cases, they have tried to link the use and sale of these products with noble causes such as the funding of the Cancer Research Center that is currently being built. Again, the argument is that smokers should pay for programs and projects which seek to cure the related ill which in this case is cancer caused by smoking.

The irony is that arguments to increase the tax on tobacco and, more specifically, cigarettes, is a goal of getting smokers to quit while depending on the revenues from tobacco and cigarette taxes to fund an ongoing program, in this case the Cancer Research Center. So, which is it folks, stop smokers from smoking and if successful, there won't be any revenues to fund the Cancer Research Center?

The fact of the matter is that it appears that both locally and nationally, higher taxes on cigarettes is having an effect on smokers as, for the first time, tax collections on the sale of cigarettes have fallen below the previous year's tax collections. Certainly some of the decline is due to smokers actually quitting, but to some degree one has to suspect that some purchases were made via mail order from exempt Indian reservation outlets while others may be what is called gray market purchases, that is from sources outside the country.

What should come as a surprise is that most of the folks who have quit are of some means as they are more likely to recognize the health hazard caused by use of this product. That means most of those who are still smoking are among the lower-income members of our community. Thus, the tax is regressive, generating less and less collections from middle and higher-income individuals.

As predicted, programs that have been fed by earmarks from the tobacco tax, like the Cancer Research Center, have become a victim of the success of tobacco cessation programs and publicity. Revenues produced by the tobacco tax have been in steady decline over the past few years, and hoisting the smoking age to 21 in the 2015 session certainly didn't reverse the trend.

Do we really need an elaborate study to tell ourselves that fiscal reliance on earmarked funds from a sin tax is inadvisable or outright dangerous?

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in <u>STRONG SUPPORT</u> of SB 2654 SD2 HD1 which restricts the shipment of tobacco products to anyone other than a licensee, includes e-liquids in the definition of tobacco products, thereby establishing a tax on e-liquids and requires wholesalers and retailers to obtain a tobacco permit and license, and increases the tax on cigarettes.

The Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawai'i (Coalition) is a program of the Hawai'i Public Health Institute (HIPHI) that is dedicated to reducing tobacco use through education, policy, and advocacy. With more than two decades of history in Hawai'i, the Coalition has led several campaigns on enacting smoke-free environments, including being the first state in the nation to prohibit the sale of tobacco and electronic smoking devices to purchasers under 21 years of age.

1. Electronic smoking devices and all of its components and parts, including e-liquid are tobacco products.

- As defined in Hawaii Revised Statues §328J-1: "Electronic smoking device" means any electronic
 product that can be used to aerosolize and deliver nicotine or other substances to the person
 inhaling from the device, including but not limited to an electronic cigarette, electronic cigar,
 electronic cigarillo, electronic pipe, hookah pipe, or hookah pen, and any cartridge or other
 component of the device or related product, whether or not sold separately.
- As defined federally by the FDA^I in 2016: "FDA now regulates the manufacture, import, packaging, labeling, advertising, promotion, sale, and distribution of Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems (ENDS), including components and parts of ENDS but excluding accessories. Examples of components and parts of ENDS include: E-liquids, A glass or plastic vial container of e-liquid, Cartridges, Atomizers, Certain batteries, Cartomizers and clearomizers, Digital display or lights to adjust settings, Tank systems, Drip tips, Flavorings for ENDS, and Programmable software."

2. A tax should be established on all e-liquids, whether or not they contain nicotine for public health concerns.

There is no public health reason to exempt nicotine-free e-liquids from any tax. In a 2015 study
 of more than 58 million e-cigarette units found that 99% of these contained nicotine, whether or

- not they were labeled as zero nicotine or nicotine-free. This is evidence that we cannot rely on self-reported information on nicotine content alone. Placing a tax on all e-liquids will also allow the Department of Taxation to administer the tax using the current systems without the burden of having to test whether or not e-liquids are in fact nicotine-free.
- Electronic smoking devices (ESDs) are the only tobacco product without a tobacco tax. In a pollⁱⁱ conducted by Ward Research Inc. for the Coalition in November 2018, 81% of registered Hawai'i voters were in support of taxing e-cigarettes at the same rate as cigarettes or other tobacco products. Because ESDs are not subject to current State tobacco tax laws, they are seen as lower-priced tobacco alternatives with virtually no restrictions that can be appealing to the youth.

3. ESD and vaping among youth in Hawaii are at an all-time high with up to 50.7% in Maui County and 42.3% statewide.

According to the 2017 Hawai'i Youth Risk Behavior Survey –

- Because they remain unregulated, e-cigarette companies have aggressively marketed their products by glamorizing their use, using celebrities and young adults as endorsers, and making false health claims.
- A 2016 report by the Surgeon General concluded that e-cigarettes are dangerous and a health threat to youth and young adults^{iv}.

4. Hawai'i has one of the lowest tobacco license and retailer fees in the nation.

• The license fee for wholesalers and dealers is only \$2.50 a year, while retail tobacco permit fees cost only \$20 a year. Nationally, license fees in 38 states range from \$200 to \$1500. Permit fees in 32 states range from \$20 to \$1,000. The Coalition supports increasing the wholesaler and dealer license fee to \$250.00 and the retail tobacco permit fee to \$50.00. In comparison with other fees, the annual wholesale liquor license for the City and County of Honolulu is \$2,640.

5. ESD are currently not required to obtain a tobacco permit or license in order to sell these products.

 Currently, there is no database that tracks who is selling ESDs in the state, making it difficult for state agencies to educate merchants and enforce our Tobacco 21 law, which includes prohibiting the sale of ESDs to anyone under the age of 21. Without permitting and licensing, store density and distribution of these products will only continue to grow.

6. This measure corrects the loophole in our minimum age selling and tax laws.

Online ESD sellers simply ask users to click a button to verify their age – a process that is both
ineffective and inadequate. This measure helps to correct this loophole by requiring that ESD
products be shipped to a registered and licensed seller allowing the State to enforce current
tobacco selling and taxation laws.

7. The Coalition further recommends that a portion of the revenue collected from ESD and e-liquid taxes be dedicated to tobacco prevention and quit programs.

• The same statewide poll found that 89% of registered Hawaii voters overwhelmingly agree that it is important for the State to earmark some of the revenue to programs aimed at preventing tobacco use among kids and to helping smokers quit. Currently no revenue from cigarette or OTP taxes is appropriated for tobacco prevention and cessation. When the price of tobacco increases, more people seek help to quit and we need to ensure programs are available and accessible by the public to help them quit.

The U.S. Surgeon General issued an immediate call to action for all local and state government to enact policies that address the harmful impact of e-cigarettes. Hawai'i has already made enormous progress on tobacco control and we ask the legislature to take the necessary steps to reduce the negative health impact made by e-cigarettes and other emerging tobacco products.

Part II

The Coalition also supports Part II of this bill, which was inserted in the House Health and Human Services Committee. Part II of the bill increases the tax on cigarettes by an unspecified amount. Raising taxes is a proven strategy to reduce consumption on tobacco products for both adults and youth. The Coalition notes that there has not been an increase in taxes on cigarettes and little cigars in the last seven years and for other tobacco products, other than large cigars, the last tax increase occurred in 2009.

Majority of registered Hawai'i voters support an increase in cigarette taxes (76%). In addition, the Coalition requests that a portion of the proposed revenue be dedicated to the Department of Health for tobacco cessation programs and education. Currently no money from tobacco taxes are allocated towards tobacco prevention and control. Populations at risk that continue to experience higher rates of smoking would be the primary beneficiaries of these education and cessation activities, helping to provide them with the resources needed to quit smoking and to help curb the high costs associated with tobacco use.

Raising tobacco taxes encourages people to quit smoking and regulating vaping will help to prevent youth and young adults from using tobacco products. Hawai'i has been leading the way in tobacco control, and this bill will continue to champion our efforts in reducing tobacco use and reducing youth ecigarette rates across the state.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify. We strongly support SB2654 SD2 HD1 and respectfully ask you to pass this measure out of committee.

American Heart Association testimony in SUPPORT of SB 2654, SD2, HD1 Relating to Chapter 245, Hawaii Revised Statutes

The American Heart Association <u>supports</u> SB 2654, SD2, HD1 which makes unlawful shipment of tobacco products to anyone other than a licensee, includes e-liquid within the definition of "tobacco products," as used in the cigarette tax and tobacco tax law, and increases the license fee for wholesalers or dealers and the retail tobacco permit fee. The AHA also recommends that a significant portion of the increased revenue from the addition of e-liquid to the state's tobacco tax be earmarked to support State-funded tobacco prevention, education and cessation programs, which the Department of Health recently reported have saved the state \$1 billion over the last 20 years.

While Federal law already prohibits the delivery and shipment of cigarettes to individuals, adding a state restriction on the direct delivery and shipment of electronic smoking devices to consumers would help to close the online sales loophole of those products and help to protect Hawaii's youth from unscrupulous marketers of those products.

Internet sales of tobacco products and e-cigarettes are a significant public health concern because they evade state taxes and significantly undermine tobacco control efforts. In Hawaii, it is currently illegal to sell tobacco products, including e-cigarettes, to those under the age of 21. Hawaii's age to 21 law plays a critical role in preventing youth initiation and addiction to tobacco products, yet internet sellers can circumvent this restriction by providing easy access to these products.

E-cigarettes are now the most popularly used tobacco product among Hawaii's youth. According to recent Department of Health data, almost half of Hawaii's youths have tried e-cigarettes, and 25 percent are now regular users. Those levels mirror youth cigarette use at its peak in Hawaii. This is concerning because e-cigarettes not only often contain nicotine and serve as a gateway to traditional cigarette use, but recent studies also indicate that e-cigarette aerosol (whether or not it contains nicotine) produces fine particulate matter that leads to similar cardiovascular and respiratory risks as traditional cigarettes.

By adding e-liquid within the definition of the state's "tobacco products" it would apply the tobacco tax to those products. This would have the greatest impact on reducing smoking rates among the lower income and youth markets, which are more price sensitive, and which are the most highly targeted by tobacco industry marketing and advertising. Those groups also suffer the most from tobacco product use and will, consequently, benefit the most from any effective new measures to reduce tobacco use.

Their health problems caused by tobacco use also disproportionally affect Medicaid costs to the state.

The AHA also supports the Part 2 section of the bill added in HD1. A one-time sizeable cigarette tax increase would have a greater impact on reducing smoking rates, especially on the lower

income and youth markets, which are more price sensitive, and which are the most highly targeted by tobacco industry marketing and advertising.

Because smoking levels are highest among people with low incomes, the cigarette companies will try to argue that cigarette tax increases are regressive taxes that fall disproportionately hard on lower-income families and communities. But this argument turns reality upside down. These are the same companies that have been preying on low-income and poor communities for decades. The cigarette companies have no problem with levying new charges on low-income smokers when it increased their own profits. They only oppose the new charges when someone else (like a state government) gets the new revenues, instead. In fact, when the federal government implemented a new increase on cigarette taxes the cigarette companies wasted no time immediately after the law passed hiking the prices on their products to profiteer on the increase during the interim period between passage of the law and its implementation.

The fact that smoking rates are highest among lower-income groups means that lower-income families and communities currently suffer the most from smoking and will, consequently, benefit the most from any effective new measures to reduce smoking, including increased state cigarette taxes. Their health problems caused by tobacco use also disproportionally affect Medicaid costs to the state.

Smokers who do not reduce their smoking because of a cigarette tax increase will also still benefit economically, along with every other state taxpayer. In Hawaii alone, tobacco use claims 1,400 lives each year and creates \$526 million in annual health care costs directly caused by smoking (\$141.7 million of that is covered by the state Medicaid program). Hawaii residents' state & federal tax burden from smoking-caused government expenditures is \$836 per household. Hawaii's estimated tobacco tax and license revenue, estimated to be almost \$138.8 million does not come close to offsetting the losses to the state caused by tobacco use. Smoking declines caused by state cigarette tax increases directly reduce these smoking-caused economic burdens for all taxpayers, and Hawaii businesses which bear the brunt of employee healthcare costs in our state.

Those who stop smoking in response to cigarette tax increases will greatly improve their own health, which could also significantly reduce their healthcare costs. Because of their higher rate of illness and disability, smokers have substantially higher annual and lifetime healthcare costs than nonsmokers or former smokers (despite living shorter lives).

Those who quit smoking as a result of a tax increase would also then have additional money to spend on taxable products that don't result in over a \$500 million in healthcare costs to the state. The money doesn't go up in smoke; instead it will likely be spent on more productive things that can benefit the smokers' families and our state.

Hawaii has made great strides in reducing tobacco use, but despite these advances, tobacco use remains the leading cause of preventable death in our state and challenges to tobacco control still exist. Hawaii's current adult smoking prevalence (13%) remains higher than the national Healthy People 2020 target of 12%. Moreover, our low smoking rates can conceal the fact that

smoking continues to disproportionately affect populations and community groups by race and ethnicity, income and education, mental health and substance abuse, and lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) orientation.

In Hawaii alone, tobacco use claims 1,400 lives each year and creates \$526 million in annual health care costs (\$141.7 million of that is covered by the state Medicaid program). Hawaii residents' state & federal tax burden from tobacco-caused government expenditures is \$836 per household. Hawaii's estimated tobacco tax and

license revenue, estimated to be almost \$138.8 million does not come close to offsetting the losses to the state caused by tobacco use. Smoking declines caused by state taxes directly reduce these smoking-caused economic burdens for all taxpayers, and Hawaii businesses which bear the brunt of employee healthcare costs in our state.

The tobacco industry spends an estimated \$25.5 million each year marketing its products in Hawaii. Hawaii's \$5.3 million investment in tobacco prevention, control and cessation programs pale in comparison, and fall well short of the Centers for Disease Control's (CDC) best practice recommendation of a \$13.7 million annual investment. Allocating revenue generated from taxing both e-liquid and cigarettes to community prevention, education and cessation programs would help to increase the desired impact of this legislation by further reducing the use of these products by our youth and the state's most health vulnerable populations.

The American Heart Association urges you to correct the loophole in our state's age restriction, taxation, and public health laws. It is imperative to continue to curtail tobacco use in any form, especially among our youth, if we are to control our state's healthcare costs and keep its Pre-Paid Healthcare law sustainable.

Please support SB2654, SD2, HD1.

Good afternoon, my name is Melodie Aduja. I serve as Chair of the Oahu County Legislative Priorities Committee of the Democratic Party of Hawaii. Thank you for the opportunity to provide written testimony on **SB2654 SD2 HD1** relating to the Unlawful Shipment and Transport of Tobacco Products; Electronic Smoking Devices; Eliquid; Tax; Permit; License; and Excise Tax.

The OCC on Legislative Priorities is in favor of **SB2654 SD2 HD1** and supports its passage.

SB2654 SD2 HD1 is in accord with the Platform of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i ("DPH"), 2016, as it prohibits the shipment of tobacco products, and the transport of tobacco products ordered or purchased through a remote sale, to anyone other than a licensee; makes all provisions of the cigarette tax and tobacco tax law that relate to tobacco products applicable to e-liquid; increases the license fee for wholesalers or dealers and the retail tobacco permit fee; amends the taxes on cigarettes and tobacco products; increases the excise tax for each cigarette or little cigar sold, used, or possessed by a wholesaler or dealer; increases the excise tax on the wholesale price of each article or item of tobacco products, other than large cigars, sold by the wholesaler or dealer.

Specifically, the DPH Platform provides that "[w]e support the development of long-term care financing solutions, better pay and working conditions for all health care providers, parity of mental and physical health coverage, and appropriate regulation of health care delivery systems. We also support the development of empirically validated prevention programs targeted at major public health issues." (Platform of the DPH, P. 7, Lines 361-369, (2016)).

We support community health initiatives that provide opportunities for the overall health of communities through strategic projects and programs focusing on increased interaction and physical activities among all age groups, as well as on better nutrition. (Platform of the DPH, P. 7, Lines 378-380, (2016)).

Our organization provides services and support and improves treatment for Hawaii's people affected by Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD), more commonly known as emphysema, chronic bronchitis and similar conditions. COPD and other respiratory conditions are the third leading cause of death in the US. Over **46,000 Hawaii adults (4.4%) have been told they have COPD, emphysema and/or chronic bronchitis.** It is estimated that at least an equal number of Hawaii adults remain undiagnosed while suffering from COPD. **COPD is responsible for over \$55 million in emergency and hospital charges each year.** Tobacco smoking is the major cause of these health conditions. For more information and Hawaii Department of Health's Burden of COPD in Hawaii 2010 Report to go http://hawaiicopd.org.

The Hawaii COPD Coalition *strongly supports* SB2654,SD2, HD1 raising taxes on other tobacco products, including all electronic smoking devices. The tax increase will bring in greatly needed revenue and reduce tobacco use, particularly in our youth who are especially sensitive to price and discourage youth from experimenting with these products. These funds can help increase tobacco prevention and cessation efforts, since so many want to quit and need services to help them. Youth use of smokeless products is rising in both high and middle school students. We currently own and operate 13 locations statewide and employ over 80 full-time workers to support sales of our products not only here in Hawaii, but to all 50 states as well as over 30 International countries. We stand in opposition to SB 2654 SD2 HD1 for the following:

- Vapor products contain NO tobacco, and often times contain NO nicotine, and ultimately emit NO smoke. Nonetheless, SB 2654 SD2 HD1 aims to unfairly classify all vapor products as "Tobacco Products" and deceptively refers to them as "Electronic Smoking Devices" as a way to deceive the public and to create a false perception that vapor products are the same as tobacco products in an effort to bring vapor products into the same regulatory framework as traditional tobacco cigarettes for the purposes of taxation. This will adversely effect the vapor industry in Hawaii resulting in unintended economic and health consequences as detailed below.
- SB 2654 SD2 HD1's justification states that the use of vapor products, specifically "E-Liquid", carries similar health risks to that of tobacco. However, recent studies have also shown vapor products to be as much as 95% less toxic than traditional Cigarettes.

- The most Recent CDC report has shown e-cigarettes have supplanted all other traditional nicotine replacement therapies and are now the most commonly used product by tobacco users to quit using traditional tobacco cigarettes. Access to these products should be improved not restricted further if it is the states goal to further reduce smoking rates.

- SB 2654 SD2 HD1 states in its justification that the bill is needed to curb youth usage. However, it fails to reference the most recent CDC report and data that shows youth use of tobacco products are at the lowest levels ever and continue to fall. Also, youth use of vapor products has been reported to be in decline since 2015 and recent studies have shown that the majority of youth who have reported using e-cigarettes are not using e-liquids that contain nicotine further suggesting that youth who do use e-cigarettes are doing so to replace the use of traditional tobacco cigarettes.

- SB 2654 SD2 HD1 would not successfully remove vapor products from the Internet. It would simply restrict local based businesses from competing with businesses from the



49 other states that would not be subject to this regulation and would result in massive job and revenue loses in the state.

- Age restriction technologies are already available and can be used to prevent youth access to these products. The alcohol industry has been successful with existing technologies and something as simple as age verification or signature verification through any major shipping provider could be a workable solution that has been completely overlooked in this bill.
- Internet sales provide access to vapor products for many local customers who live in remote locations. By restricting local Internet retailers, those purchases would simply be sent to mainland-based suppliers.
- Most troubling is the fact that by subjecting vapor products to this proposed tax, the additional costs to consumers will likely result in the state seeing less tax revenue, and even worse, former smokers returning to tobacco use. The tax will result in current vapor users purchasing from online vendors who would not be subject to state taxes. Local manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers would be put at a massive competitive disadvantage and most retail customers would send their money out-of-state effectively lowering the tax revenue already being generated by sales of vapor products here in the state. We would be unable to compete in other out-of-state and international markets with competitors who are not subjected to the same tax, which would put our local operations in severe jeopardy meaning an immediate loss of jobs and existing revenues. This bill would also effectively reduce access to a modified risk product that has been a public health win and would simply prop up and protect the proven deadly tobacco market.

<u>I strongly support SB2654, SD2, HD1</u>, which would regulate e-liquids and electronic smoking devices (ESDs) as tobacco products through taxation, shipment, and licensing and permitting.

I support this bill <u>because of our findings from research with Hawaii adolescents and adults</u> conducted over the past 4 years. These studies have shown that e-cigarette use is quite prevalent among Hawaii middle and high school students; in recent years over 40% of high school students have used e-cigarettes. Even at younger ages, the prevalence among middle school students can be 15-20% of the school population.

In addition to showing that e-cigarette use is prevalent among Hawaii school students, our studies have shown that e-cigarette use is linked to several adverse outcomes. Notably, <u>using e-cigarettes is related to initiation of cigarette smoking among previous nonsmokers</u>, hence is contributing to adverse outcomes. Our findings from Hawaii have been reported in national and international scientific journals such as JAMA Pediatrics and have been confirmed in several different US sites as well as in Britain, Canada, Finland, and Mexico.

Our research has also shown that e-cigarette use is related to a higher likelihood of symptoms of respiratory disease (asthma and COPD) among Hawaii adolescents and adults. This has recently been reported in the scientific journal Preventive Medicine; our findings on asthma have now been confirmed in two Hawaii studies and two mainland studies. Recent studies have also reported that e-cigarette use is related to higher likelihood of symptoms of cardiovascular disease including chest pain and myocardial infarction (PLoS ONE 2017, Tingting Yao, first author and SRNT 2018, Talal Alzahrani, first author). Thus there is evidence that e-cigarette use may be linked to adverse health consequences as well as adverse behavioral consequences.

I note that recent testimony to the Senate Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health has made several assertions that are counter to scientific evidence. For example there was testimony maintaining that e-cigarettes are safe because they emit no smoke. This is not true; a number of laboratory studies have shown that e-cigarette vapor contains high levels of ultrafine particles, the same toxic agent linked to disease risk from air pollution. This testimony also cites a 2015 report by Public Health England asserting e-cigarettes are "95% safer than cigarettes." This conclusion has been widely criticized because it was not based on scientific evidence but rather on the opinion of a few people, who admitted there was no scientific evidence for it. The assertion is counter to the recent conclusions of comprehensive reports by the US Surgeon General (published in 2016) and the US National Academy of Sciences (published in 2018) as well as scientific reviews recently published in American Journal of Physiology: Lung, Cell, and Molecular Physiology (Lauren Chun, first author) and Current Allergy and Asthma Reports

(Ilona Jaspers, corresponding author). Both papers summarize evidence from laboratory studies showing e-cigarette vapor linked to adverse pulmonary consequences at the cellular and immunological level. Also, a recent paper in Pediatrics (Mark Rubinstein, first author) reported that levels of several toxic volatile organic chemicals that are carcinogenic are elevated in the urine of adolescent e-cigarette users.

Testimony has also misquoted the Public Health England report as saying that vapor products are shown to be 95% less toxic than cigarettes. In fact, the 2018 update has abandoned their original assertion and now simply states that saying so is "a good way to communicate" about the risk of e-cigarettes before going on to admit "this does not mean that e-cigarettes are safe" (p. 20). Another misleading assertion is that a large number of smokers are reducing their risk by completely substituting e-cigarettes for combustible cigarettes. In fact, papers in the February 2018 issue of American Journal of Preventive Medicine clearly show that use of e-cigarettes inhibits smoking cessation (Margarete Kulik, first author) and that the great majority of cigarette smokers do not switch to e-cigarettes but remain dual users (Gabriella Anic, first author), conclusions supported by a number of other studies documented in the 2018 issue of the Annual Review of Public Health (Stanton Glantz, first author). Finally, the testimony uses the faulty "cherry picking" logic often used to justify e-cigarettes by noting that CDC reports show youth use of tobacco products currently at a low level. This is true but the decline in US youth tobacco use began in 1998, 10 years before e-cigarettes were marketed in the US, and thus cannot logically be linked to e-cigarette use. Rather, the decline has been linked to regulations that increase the price and decrease the availability of cigarettes, exactly the kind that are proposed in this bill.

We have observed that e-cigarettes are aggressively marketed to Hawaii youth in television, print media, radio, and point-of-sale advertising venues. Without regulation, e-cigarette manufacturers will continue to aggressively market their products by using young adults and celebrities as endorsers, glamorizing its use, promoting deep discounts, and offering popular local e-liquid flavors such as Kona coffee, Maui mango, and pineapple.

Because of the adverse consequences known to be related to e-cigarette use, I urge the legislature to regulate and tax e-cigarettes the same way as other tobacco products. ESDs are the only tobacco product without a tobacco tax and increasing the price is a proven strategy that discourages access to these products. In addition, a portion of these revenues should be dedicated to tobacco prevention and quit programs. This bill will also require a permitting and licensing which will allow the state to know who is selling e-cigarettes in Hawaii and work with these merchants to educate them and enforce current tobacco laws.

I strongly support SB2654, SD2, HD1 and ask you to pass this.

By including ESDs in the definition of tobacco and by increasing licensing fees, youth will be less able to access ESDs. To better regulate and protect our youth, I urge the legislature to regulate and tax disposable e-cigarettes and e-liquid the same way as any other tobacco products. I'm writing to voice my concerns with this bill. I was a heavy smoker of 10 years before I quit. During those 10 years, smoking was what I'd describe as a "necessary evil." It wasn't until I switched to electronic cigarettes that I could finally put down those cancer sticks and work towards a healthier self.

Electronic cigarettes are proven to be less harmful than cigarettes. Several universities, including Harvard Health Publishing reported on this fact. If it wasn't for vaping I'd still be smoking 8 minutes of my life away, one cigarette at a time. To see that a bill will hinder and possibly destroy the chances of many to-be-quitters, I was compelled to write in opposition to such movement.

This bill, more importantly than others, ultimately targets the free trade of electronic cigarettes and therefore indirectly hinder the acquisition and prolonged use of electronic cigarettes. Out of the 10 years that I've smoked, electronic cigarettes have been in the market for 7-8 years. The choice to change ultimately came down to health, price, and feasibility of prolonged use.

I manage the merchandising of all Minit Stop Stores on the Island of Maui and the Big Island of Hawaii. I strongly oppose SB2654 on the premise of free commerce and fair taxation for responsible retailers. We offer Tobacco and E-Cigarette products in our stores for sale to customers over the age of 21 years. Our stores are vigilant in ensuring that sales of all Tobacco products and E-Cigarette products are never made to anyone under the age of 21 years.

As a responsible retailer we would never engage in the sale of any product that violates the laws we follow in the State of Hawaii and in the United States of America. The retailing of Tobacco and E-Cigarette products are lawful and are governed by rules put in place by our State Legislature that restrict the sales of Tobacco and E-Cigarettes to adults over the age of 21 years.

Supporters of SB2654 suggest their sole motive for supporting this Legislation is to prevent youth access to Tobacco and E-Cigarettes and to discourage their use. This is noble but unnecessary as retailers like Minit Stop ensure zero youth access though our vigorous enforcement of carding prohibiting sales to minors.

Supporters also have an ulterior motive of making the use of Tobacco and E-Cigarettes prohibitively expensive to stop current Tobacco and E-Cigarette users.
