Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Riviere, and Members of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Environment:

The Office of Planning (OP) supports SB 2674 Relating to Sustainable Development Goals. SB 2674 amends Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) Chapter 344, the State's Environmental Policy, to codify one of the United Nations' (UN) Sustainable Development Goals, a group of 17 goals to transform our world; SB 2674 specifically seeks to codify UN Sustainable Development Goal, global goal 13, to take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts for all by 2030.

The Office of Planning appreciates the adoption of global goal 13 to strengthen resilience and adaptive capacity to climate-related hazards and natural disasters statewide; integrate climate change measures into state policies, strategies, and planning; and improve education and awareness-raising on climate change mitigation, adaptation, impact reduction, and early warning opportunities throughout the State of Hawaii by 2030.

The Office of Planning recommends codifying this proposal in Hawaii Revised Statutes Chapter 226, the Hawaii State Plan, to be consistent with HRS § 226-108, the State's sustainability priority guidelines and principles of the Hawaii State Plan. The Office of Planning also recommends adding the climate change goals of the State of Hawaii's 2050 Sustainability Plan into SB 2674.

Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Riviere, and Members of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Environment,

The Office of Environmental Quality Control (OEQC) administers Chapter 343, Environmental Impact Statements (EIS), Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS). The purpose of the EIS law is to "establish a system of environmental review which ensures that environmental concerns are given appropriate consideration in decision making along with economic and technical considerations" (HRS § 343-1). Additionally, the OEQC serves "the Governor in an advisory capacity on all matters relating to environmental quality control," as directed in HRS § 341-3.

Senate Bill 2674 proposes to codify sustainable development goals based on the United Nations' Global Goal thirteen, climate action, into HRS Chapter 344, State Environmental Policy.

Chapter 344, HRS, is an integral statute to the environmental review process. Adding the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) may have unintended effects on the EIS process.

Because the SDGs encompass more than environmental policy and are intended to affect policymaking and planning, perhaps HRS Chapter 226, the Hawai'i State Planning Act, could be a potential statute for housing the SDGs.

The Administration of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs will recommend that the Board of Trustees **SUPPORT** SB2674, which codifies sustainable development goals based on the United Nations' Global Goal thirteen, climate action.

OHA has long sought to promote the resiliency and health of our islands' lands and natural and cultural resources. OHA's strategic priorities include 'Āina (Land & Water), which represents our commitment to maintain Native Hawaiians' connection to the past and a viable land base; by Native Hawaiian participation in and benefit from the responsible stewardship of Ka Pae 'Āina O Hawai'i. In line with this priority, OHA's strategic results specifically seek to preserve cultural and natural resources and historic properties, including by increasing the percent of ahupua'a that are managed sustainably.

In July of 2014, OHA joined the governor, four county mayors, the legislature, and Hawai'i Green Growth public-private partners from across the State, in launching the Aloha+ Challenge, a statewide commitment to sustainability. Since then, OHA has worked in various partnerships to support these goals throughout the islands.

As a member of the Hawai'i Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission established by Act 32 (Reg. Sess. 2016), OHA also currently assists with direction, facilitation, coordination and planning among state and county agencies, federal agencies, and other partners on climate change mitigation (reduction of greenhouse gases) and climate change resiliency strategies, including, but not limited to, sea level rise adaptation, water and agricultural security, and natural resource conservation. OHA understands that the impacts of climate change – such as coastal flooding and erosion and impacts to terrestrial and marine ecosystems – will affect the built and natural environment, as well as the livelihoods and food security of Native Hawaiians. Understanding the extent of these changes and their impacts and identifying early adaptation actions is essential to protecting the communities and natural resources of Ka Pae 'Āina O Hawai'i.

OHA accordingly appreciates and supports the intent of this measure, and believes that the sustainable development goals relating to climate action will reaffirm and reinforce our efforts to ensure the resiliency and sustainable stewardship of our islands

Accordingly, OHA urges the Committee to **PASS** SB2674. Mahalo nui for the opportunity to testify on this measure.

Good afternoon, my name is Melodie Aduja. I serve as Chair of the Oahu County Legislative Priorities Committee of the Democratic Party of Hawaii. Thank you for the opportunity to provide written testimony on Senate Bill No. 2674, relating to sustainable development goals regarding Climate Action as detailed in United Nation's Global Goal Thirteen. The OCC Legislative Priorities Committee is in favor of Senate Bill No. 2674 and support its passage.

Senate Bill No. 2674, is in alignment with the Platform of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i ("DPH"), 2016, as it codifies sustainable development goals based on the United Nations' Global Goal Thirteen on Climate Action. Specifically, the DPH Platform

states that "[t]he Democratic Party of Hawai'i believes that the preservation and restoration of our natural environment are essential. We support a sustainable society that utilizes the earth in such a way that future generations will benefit from the practices of our generation. We support the restoration, preservation, and protection of our native ecosystems on each island. We believe in integrated approaches, practices, and support public policies that create and maintain a sustainable way of life in Hawai'i.

We believe in supporting best management practices in sustaining our environment and in increased citizen involvement. We support programs that encourage sustainable clean, efficient, creative and environmentally friendly modes of transportation, recycling and waste reduction.

The conservation, preservation and restoration of Hawai'i's natural resources are connected to the health and welfare of our people; therefore, we support the conservation and protection of our natural environment, which includes reducing our carbon footprint for the benefit of current and future generations.

We support the protection of our 'aina against destruction by corporate, government, or military usage and expect full restoration and reparation of environmental damage. To handle current and future demands for water, we must assess the current condition of our aquifers and take appropriate actions to secure our freshwater resources.

We believe in the vigorous enforcement of our environmental laws and increased public-private stewardships and citizen involvement in protecting our resources.

We know that climate change is a real threat to our islands and the world. We strongly urge our candidates and elected officials to take immediate action to mitigate and adapt to the consequences of climate change. This includes funding adaption measures including coastal retreat, effective participation of indigenous peoples in climate change governance, and recognition that indigenous, local, and traditional ecological knowledge is key in climate change adaptation solutions." (Platform of the DPH, P. 8, Lines 406-425, 432-439 (2016)).

Given that Senate Bill No. 2674 codifies sustainable development goals based on the United Nations' Global Goal Thirteen pertaining to climate action, it is the position of the OCC Legislative Priorities Committee to support this measure.
