TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL 2812, SENATE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO THE UNIFORM CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES ACT By Nolan P. Espinda, Director

Chair Mizuno, Vice Chair Kobayashi, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) **supports** Senate Bill (SB) 2812, Senate Draft (SD) 1, which updates chapter 329 of the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), to: 1) incorporate amendments made to the federal Controlled Substances Act, and 2) include emergency scheduling and temporary designation as required under section 329-11, HRS.

First, section 329-11, HRS, provides that if a substance is added, deleted, or rescheduled under federal law, then PSD shall recommend to the Legislature that a corresponding change in Hawaii law be made. As such, PSD supports SB 2812, SD 1, which proposes to amend subsection 329-14(f) and (g), HRS, and subsection 329-16(g), HRS, to reflect the additions made to the federal law.

To avoid the nullification of the controlled substances that were emergency scheduled or temporarily designated during the past year, PSD supports the passage of SB 2812, SD 1. This measure mirrors recent changes to the federal Controlled Substances Act, thereby eliminating differences between federal and state law.

Aloha Committee on Health & Human Services,

The Maui Service Area Board (MSAB) on Mental Health and Substance Abuse strongly supports this measure. However, disagrees with testimony and suggested changes to the language pertaining to cannabinoids. Cannabinoids are within the language of other current measures to treat opioid addiction. In addition, its medicinal use was created by Act 228 (Session Laws of Hawaii 2000), and is codified in the Hawaii Revised Statutes at part IX, Chapter 329, HRS. The Medical Cannabis Dispensary Program was created by Act 241 (Session Laws of Hawaii 2015), and is codified in the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) at Chapter 329D, HRS. This might underscore these efforts and our State's movement to a healthier Hawai'i. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony.
