## SENATE BILL NO. 2839 SD1 RELATING TO AGRICULTURE ENTERPRISES

Chairperson Dela Cruz and Members of the Committees:

Thank for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill No. 2839 SD1. This bill establishes a new agricultural enterprise program within the Department of agriculture, establishes positions, and makes an appropriation. The Department supports this measure.

This bill is intended to allow agricultural enterprises on HDOA land. The Ag Park program and the Non-Ag Park program focus on actual, physical farming activity on the land. Ancillary activity is allowed in certain cases, but only under certain conditions. Additionally, strict qualifications as a bona fide farmer must be met to hold these long term leases. However, the HDOA believes that in order to grow the agricultural industry in general, it is in the State's interest to allow on State land, activities that support agriculture, but do not necessarily participate in the growing of a plant or animal. Examples may include, but not be limited to agricultural educational training, farmers markets, food hubs, processing facilities, and animal feed mills, etc. The business of agriculture is far broader than simply the growing of an organism. This program recognizes that the business of agriculture is just as important to the growth of agriculture as the production of the crop itself.

To the Honorable Donovan M. Dela Cruz, Chair; the Honorable Gilbert S.C. Keith-Agaran, Vice-Chair, and Members of the Committee on Ways and Means:

Good afternoon. My name is Melodie Aduja. I serve as Chair of the Oahu County Committee ("OCC") Legislative Priorities Committee of the Democratic Party of Hawaii. Thank you for the opportunity to provide written testimony on Senate Bill No.2839 SD1 relating to Agricultural Enterprises.

The OCC Legislative Priorities Committee is in favor of Senate Bill No.2839 SD1 and supports its passage.

Senate Bill No.2839 SD1 is in accord with the Platform of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i ("DPH"), 2016, as it establishes a new agricultural enterprise program within the department of agriculture to plan, design, construct, operate, manage, maintain, repair, demolish, and remove infrastructure on any lands under the jurisdiction of the department, to support and promote agriculture and establishes the agricultural enterprise special fund.

The DPH Platform states that "[a]griculture in our state must be preserved and its future strengthened. Sufficient prime agricultural lands must be maintained for the health, economic well-being and sustenance of the people. We believe in an integrated approach to agricultural innovation and sustainability. We encourage the responsible development of ocean resources in order to achieve sustainability of our marine resources, and ensure and improve the health of our reef and marine life.

This approach includes but is not limited to, the adoption of the native Hawaiian concept of ahupua'a, an integrated approach to land management. This could also include the development of economic, land and ocean use policies that foster sustainable crops both for local consumption and for export, policies to foster agriculture-related infrastructure at shipping points, and increased inspection to protect against invasive species and to encourage reduced holding times.

We will promote the ethical and safe production of livestock, dairy products, poultry and eggs.." (Platform of the DPH, P.2, Lines 76-88 (2016)).

As an island state, securing affordable food for all is a priority. We support healthy, sustainable, and diversified local food production, and "Buy Local" strategies to assure greater food security and food safety.

We recognize the essential link between the availability of adequate and affordable water and low-cost electrical power as essential components of viable agricultural businesses.

We support land use planning and infrastructure development to support sustainable diversified agriculture, including low-cost inter-island transportation of agricultural products. We likewise support publicly funded research and development for agricultural diversification and value-added products. (Platform of the DPH, P.2, Lines 97-107 (2016)).

Given that Senate Bill No.2839 SD1 establishes a new agricultural enterprise program within the department of agriculture to plan, design, construct, operate, manage, maintain, repair, demolish, and remove infrastructure on any lands to support and promote agriculture, it is the position of the OCC Legislative Priorities Committee to support this measure.

Ulupono believes that self-sufficiency is essential to our future prosperity and will help shape a future where economic progress and mission-focused impact can work hand in hand.

**Ulupono** <u>strongly supports</u> **SB 2839 SD 1**, which establishes an agricultural enterprise program administered by the Department of Agriculture, because it aligns with our goal of creating more locally produced food.

Agriculture is one of Hawai'i's most important and yet most challenging industries. Quality agricultural land is one of the main prerequisites for local food production. The Department of Agriculture, which is knowledgeable about managing agricultural land for farmers and ranchers, should be responsible for managing lands suitable for agriculture.

Another critical challenge for our local farmers and ranchers is to obtain adequate funding. The grant funding in this bill will stimulate and increase new investment in Hawai'i's agricultural industry.

Farming and ranching require a number of costly expenditures to succeed. Some of these costs include rent, water infrastructure, farming equipment, labor expenses, production inputs like seeds, fertilizer, and feed, as well as processing facilities, and marketing development.

With agricultural statistics showing a pronounced decrease in local farming and ranching, there is an increasing need to find new investment to support a diversified agricultural base and find meaningful employment for farm workers.

As Hawai'i's local food issues become more complex and challenging, organizations need



additional resources and support to address and overcome them. We appreciate this committee's efforts to look at policies that support local food production.

We believe that by collaborating, we can help produce more local food and support an economically robust homegrown agriculture industry, which strengthens our community with fresh, healthy food. Thank you for this opportunity to testify.
