Kamaile Academy Public Charter School is in strong support of SB 2278 and SB 2885. SB 2278 establishes the teacher home assistance program to be administered by the Hawai'i Housing Finance and Development Corporation to provide housing vouchers to full-time teachers employed by the department of education, including teachers at public charter schools, who teach in a hard-to-fill school. SB 2885 authorizes the Hawaii housing finance and development corporation to develop and implement a housing voucher program for full-time teachers employed by the department of education or at a public charter school.



I am Randy Cabral, President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,900 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau offers the following comments on SB 2885, which aims to clarify the intent of the Small Business regulatory review board's powers. We believe that the Board should have the broadest authority possible to protect small businesses in Hawaii from unnecessary and overburdensome rules. HFB also believes that the Board should be adequately funded so that it can accomplish its mission.

Over the years, our farmer and rancher members have benefited from the Board's conscientious review of rules and its work to ensure that proposed rules are necessary and appropriate.
