Chair Lee, Vice Chair Lowen, and Members of the House Committee on Energy & Environmental Protection.

SB 2977, SD2 makes an appropriation to the Hawaii Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation Commission (Climate Commission) to develop reports assessing the impact of the tourism on climate change no later than December 31, 2020; and requires the Climate Commission to reevaluate and update the said reports by July 1, 2022. The Office of Planning (OP) respectfully offers the following comments, provided that the appropriation does not adversely affect the priorities of the Executive budget.

1) SB 2977, SD2 specifically requires the Climate Commission to develop reports assessing the impact of the tourism industry on climate change when it is reasonable and cost-effective to do so. While OP appreciates that SB 2977, SD2 provides the Climate Commission with flexibility in developing the referenced reports, the exception of only providing reports when it is reasonable and cost-effective may cause the reports to be deprioritized. In addition, in order to retain the intent of this measure to focus on inbound and outbound **travel** to the State, OP suggests amendments to Page 7, Lines 10-15 as follows:

"The commission shall develop reports assessing the impact of the tourism industry on transportation climate change effects unless it is demonstrably and objectively infeasible to do so; [provided that when it is reasonable and cost effective to do so,] the commission shall analyze and categorize the data collected to determine the contribution, if any, that the tourism industry has on transportation greenhouse gas emissions..."

- 2) OP notes that, the current timeline for the reports may be too ambitious given the need to collaborate with Climate Commission members to develop project scope, and comply with State Procurement process to secure a consultant to develop the report.
- 3) OP further suggests aligning SB 2977, SD2 with SB 2965, SD1, which requires the Climate Commission "develop a science-based carbon budget for Hawaii based on greenhouse gas analysis in the United Nations Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change Fifth Assessment Report." Specifically, SB 2965, SD1 provides that the Climate Commission "may also develop individual carbon budgets for Hawaii's major energy use sectors, including electricity generation, ground transportation, marine, aviation, and industrial energy."
