- 1 Fiscal Implications: None.
- 2 **Department Testimony:** The Department of Health (DOH) supports Senate Bill 3004 (S.B.
- 3 3004) as a public health measure to establish tobacco-free policies, including electronic smoking
- 4 devices (ESD), on all University of Hawaii (UH) System premises. The purpose of this measure
- 5 is to promote positive health practices and to protect UH students, employees, and visitors from
- 6 exposure to secondhand smoke by prohibiting smoking, including the use of ESDs, and other
- 7 tobacco products. The Department defers to the UH regarding implementation.
- 8 Tobacco use continues to be the leading preventable cause of death and disability in the
- 9 United States and Hawaii. Each year, smoking alone is responsible for more deaths than
- 10 HIV/AIDS, alcohol, motor vehicle crashes, illegal drugs, and fires combined.² In an effort to
- 11 protect youth and young adults against this epidemic, the U.S. Department of Health and Human
- 12 Services (DHHS) partnered with leading policy and educational experts to launch the Tobacco-

- 1 Free College Campus Initiative (TFCCI) in the fall of 2012.³ Former U.S. Assistant Secretary
- 2 for Health, Dr. Howard Koh, one of the founders of this initiative, stated that having tobacco-free
- 3 college campuses is an important opportunity to protect over 20 million people on college and
- 4 university campuses across the nation.⁴ Tobacco and smoke-free college campuses initiatives
- 5 are steadily increasing in number. The American Nonsmokers' Rights Foundation (ANR)
- 6 reported as of January 2018, nearly 1,800 campuses are 100% tobacco-free, up from nearly 1,500
- 7 colleges and universities across the country last year.

19 20 Although the prevalence of adult smokers has declined, due to either cessation or premature death, youth and young adults remain the sole source of "replacement smokers" by the tobacco industry. According to the U.S. Surgeon General's Report, nearly 9 out of 10 smokers started using cigarettes by age 18, and 99% start by age 26.⁵ Data show that if young people do not start using tobacco by age 26, they almost certainly will never start. For these reasons, colleges and universities have an important role in tobacco use prevention and cessation efforts.

Since the UH System is the largest provider of higher education in the state, implementation of tobacco-free campuses has the potential to reduce the health and economic burdens placed upon our state related to smoking. In 2016, 12% of adults aged 18-24 years of age reported being current smokers.⁶ Intervening during a critical age juncture by creating a tobacco-free UH System would positively impact over 50,000 students across all ten campuses.⁷ According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the American Cancer Society, the benefits of smoke-free worksites include increased productivity and decreased use of

SB 3004 – RELATING TO HEALTH

Chairs Baker, Kahele, and Tokuda, Vice Chairs Kim and English, and members of the committees:

I am respectfully submitting written testimony on behalf of the University of Hawai'i regarding Senate Bill 3004 – Relating to Health – which proposes to amend HRS, Chapter 304A, University of Hawai'i System, by adding a new section prohibiting smoking (including the use of electronic smoking devices, and tobacco use) on all University of Hawai'i premises within the State.

In addition, this bill proposes to also amend HRS, Chapter 89, Collective Bargaining in Public Employment, by adding a new section specifying that the above-referenced smoking and tobacco use prohibitions shall not be subject to collective bargaining.

The University fully supports the goal of this bill to promote positive health practices and protect University of Hawai'i students, employees, and visitors from exposure to smoke and other potentially harmful substances caused by tobacco use. The bill would be aligned with similar programs at universities and colleges across the nation implementing campus-wide bans including electronic smoking devices in order to provide healthy learning and work environments for campus communities.

Studies have been conducted showing that a smoke-free campus is an effective intervention for reducing smoking and tobacco use among college students. Studies have also shown that college students are at risk for initiating social smoking practices which later progress to regular smoking, as well as exposure to secondhand smoke in outdoor areas, student residence halls, campus events, and other sporting and social settings. Prohibitions have been shown to reduce both smoking prevalence and second hand smoke, and increase smoke-free social norms.

Lastly, this bill is consonant with the legislature's smoke-free efforts over the years to reduce health problems by implementing smoking restrictions in and near state facilities including complete ban at K-12 public schools and associated events.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in **SUPPORT** of SB 3004, which prohibits tobacco use and smoking, including the use of electronic smoking devices, by any person on University of Hawaii premises.

The Student Health Advisory Council has played a pivotal role in the development and implementation of health policies and tobacco education on the UH System campuses. In 2015, the Student Health Advisory Council actively supported the passing of Legislative Act 122, which prohibits the sale of all tobacco products to anyone under the age of 21. We remain deeply committed to the mission of improving the public health environment and reducing the use of tobacco products, including electronic smoking devices, among the adolescent and young adult population.

There is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke and even minimal exposure can increase risk for multiple health conditions. Currently all students in Hawaii in grades K-12 are able to attend school on tobacco-free campuses. However without tobacco-free college campuses, University of Hawai'i students are no longer protected from the harmful effects of secondhand smoke. Our learning and working environment extends outside the classroom, which can expose us to secondhand smoke. Smoking and the use of electronic cigarettes are not conducive to a healthy learning environment and they can seriously compromise our health.

Currently in the US there are 1757 college campuses that have become smoke-free, and of these 1468 are tobacco-free, with 1331 also prohibiting the use of electronic cigarettes. Four states and one US territory have also passed State laws requiring college campuses to be smoke-free. Hawai'i has always been a leader, protecting the public and its visitors from the dangers of secondhand smoke, and now, the State Legislature has the opportunity to protect everyone on the University of Hawai'i campuses, students, employees, and visitors from the harmful effects of secondhand smoke. It is imperative that we join our fellow institutions of higher education and

pass SB 3004.

My name is Rachel Savereux and I am a student at UH Manoa and Graduate Assistant for Dr. Kristen Scholly, the chair of Health Promotion at UH Manoa, who also helps organize the

smoke-free campus initiative. I am here today in <u>strong support for SB 3004</u>.

As a Graduate Assistant, one of my duties is to help field calls, emails and concerns that come

through our office. I am here today due to the overwhelming concerns that I field from students and faculty in regards to the lack of enforcement and the unclear policies relating to smoking on our campus. Since this initiative launched at our school 2 years ago, our office has an extensive log of valuable information that depicts the failure of our campus' effort to become smoke free.

Smokers on campus have claimed approximately 12 areas across campus. Not only are these unauthorized smoking areas located near heavy trafficked pathways or next to buildings, but many of these areas do not abide by the state's smoking 20ft away from a door policy. Our office is frequently contacted and asked to put up signs that are then almost immediately removed in these claimed smoking areas on campus. When we hang these signs, our office requires that we go out in pairs due to the angry and confrontational backlash that is faced when displaying the no smoking signs around campus. I once was angrily confronted and asked if I was responsible for their missing furniture that they had brought in and placed in their "smoking courtyard". Leading to another problem we encounter with smoking on campus. In these claimed smoking areas, chairs, tables, couches are being brought in and placed in these smoking areas on campus. There is nothing being done, absolutely no enforcement and the no smoking policy is seen as a joke to everyone on campus. One student tweeted:

"UH Manoa has to be the smokiest "smoke-free" campus there is... #didntchangeathing"

At UH, The Department of Public Saftey's mission states: "We are dedicated to providing and promoting a safe and secure campus." The issue of having a no smoke campus now moves beyond the troubles of trying to protecting students second hand smoke, but also now their physical safety.

The following you will find examples of the complaints we continue to receive in our office regarding the occurrence of smoking on campus as well as threatening and negative behavior:

- 1) I have seen the signs and emails regarding our campus being smoke-free. However, there's a very large group of people who like to smoke next to Keller hall. Today, since it was raining, the smokers were all packed into the snack building between Keller and EDM. I couldn't even go in there to get a snack because I didn't want to exposed to the cloud of smoke filling the area. I'd really appreciate if the no smoking policy could be enforced.
- 2) The buildings around Kuykendall hall are not smoke free. Employees who do yard service and janitorial work are still smoking on the side of the buildings were there aren't doors.
- 3) Just wondering what can be done about smokers congregating on the Dole St. side of Holmes Hall? There is considerable foot traffic through that area as well as being right next to the building.

If there is a designated smoking area identified on campus (or off campus), perhaps signs could be put up? Or simply no smoking signs. (Likely noteworthy that this was not an issue before the UH non-smoking policy.)

- 4) Why does UH continue to call itself a smoke free campus when there is zero enforcement of this?? All one has to do is walk near the vending machines next to Keller Hall to realize nothing is being done about smokers.
- 5) I've seen and heard from students that there are people vaping around the vending machines by Keller Hall, regularly. Sometimes there are up to 10 people congregating there. Could there be a "no vaping" sign around there?
- 6) There needs to be more enforcement of the smoke free policy especially near the Hale Kahawai Dorms behind the Center for Korean Studies. I often encounter students smoking in that area and there are so many littered cigarette butts every where its disgusting. If Campus Security is supposed to do it, they need to get out of their cars and actually patrol.

7) Over the past few months, our team has worked out of Crawford Hall (temporarily) and recently moved into our permanent office in Keller 111. Have asked the smokers behind Crawford Hall to please stop smoking on campus several times. Most have been good about stopping. Now that we are in Keller, noticed many smokers at the kiosk every day and throughout the day.....openly smoking. In both cases, they are not abiding by current state law which forbids smoking less than 20 ft away from building entrances and windows.

Could we get help from DPS to enforce the law? Students have also voiced their dissatisfaction of the smoking being done openly without enforcement.

This is not a new issue and thus, apologize if discussion of this issue and next steps have already taken place. If so, it would be good to know what is planned. And if there is anything our team can help with, please let us know.

8) Unfortunately it looks like all the new signs around the Keller Hall vending kiosk for "smoke free campus" and "not a designated smoking area" were completely torn down by the second day of the semester. Additionally, it appears that someone has also pulled down the large "smoke free" banner that was affixed to the wall around the AC units outside of Bilger.

Many smokers are once again frequently using that area in contravention of the goal of making Manoa a smoke free campus.

Perhaps campus public safety officers could provide friendly reminders to the offenders there. The signs alone are clearly ineffective at dissuading them.

- 9) Just to let you know there were about 25 people smoking (mostly real cigs) yesterday around and in the snack shack next to Keller Hall. Who is enforcing this smoke free campus? Rules are great, but if there is no one to enforce them then they are meaningless. I was not about to confront 25 inconsiderate smokers.
- 10) I am emailing to report the occurrence of cigarette smoke coming into my office, as well as the offices around me. The smoke was very strong to where I needed to leave my office. We believe that the cigarette smoke is coming into the offices from the vent that people are smoking by behind the biomed building. This cigarette smoke is effecting my work environment and productivity, as well as my health.

I hope there is some type of action and enforcement that can taken to prevent smokers from smoking on the University of Hawaii Manoa campus.

11) I am writing to you regarding a concern I have with smokers at UH's Biomed building. For the last two days, cigarette smoke has been coming in my office through the air-conditioning vents. Individuals have also seen smokers near the intake vents at our building. Just today, a fellow colleague told a smoker that he could not smoke. The smoker was situated near an intake

vent at the back of the building. At this area, there are clear ashtrays where smokers place their cigarette butts.

In yesterday's occurrence, UH's Public Safety was called by Dr. Al Katz and they notified him that they cannot do anything regarding smokers. Our Program Chair, Dr. Kathryn Braun in turn called UH Environmental Health and Safety and a representative named Chad came to my office. Chad did acknowledge the cigarette smoke smell in my office and stated that they do not handle cigarette smoke, and deferred me to UH Public Safety. I informed him that they were already called and did nothing. He shrugged and stated that they, too, cannot handle this matter.

The cigarette smoke may not bother others in the building, but I have asthma and have been taking my inhaler excessively the last two days due to asthma attacks caused by the smoke coming into my office. If I do not take my inhaler, I have a hard time breathing which may lead to an emergency room visit. I am in my office for over 8 hours a day and cannot constantly take my inhaler. It is against medical advice to constantly use the inhaler in a small period of time because it will lead to an overdose. It is frustrating that I work at a smoke-free campus, yet suffer because this law is not enforced. Smokers are allowed to violate policy at the expense of the university's students, faculty, and staff. It's disheartening and unfair for those that choose to work in a healthy work environment.

- 12) It's ironic that the area surrounding the vending machines near Keller Hall off of McCarthy Mall is apparently one of the most popular smoking venues on campus despite being plastered with many signs and banners advising that UH Manoa is a smoke free campus. That spot is rife with smokers throughout the day.
- 13) Thank you for your continued effort. I see there are many new signs up around the old smokers' corner adjacent to the Physical Science Building and the kiosk between Keller Hall and Bilger Hall. Unfortunately newcomers to campus have already located this as a space to smoke, including this morning actual cigars. There is one remaining concrete bench there. I think other seating was removed last year, but the remaining bench is an encouragement that is not necessary.

I did speak to the cigar smoker, who was defiant, saying that as he was illiterate he couldn't read the signs! See photo, with another smoker in the back adjacent to one of your new signs.

A pity this policy is not enforceable. I assume that UH Security still wants nothing to do with it? Or is there any recourse if one sees (as is often the case) several to half a dozen smokers in that same old smokers' corner?

14) As of August 17, 2015, the University of Hawaii is a "Smoke-Free" campus. According to the UH Manoa Smoke-Free Campus Website, it is only encouraged that all members of the university refrain from smoking on campus. There are certain places on campus where large groups of people collectively smoke because they think it is a smoking zone. These locations are

areas that I frequently pass to get to my classes and the smoke and smell give me headaches. Many people on campus believe it is authoritarian for UH to actually ban someones right to smoke on campus and continue to smoke, but is there anything you can do to change it to an enforced, campus-wide ban on smoking?

- 15) For months now I have been reminding the smokers who congregate daily and stubbornly at the vending machine kiosk next to Keller Hall on the Mall that there is no smoking on campus. This is to no avail. The Chancellor's recent reminder concerning the no-smoking policy on campus prompts me to report these scoff laws to you and ask for your help. Could you please send someone to roust out and remove the smokers there at different times of the day, every day? I have done what I can by my polite reminders, only to receive uninterested looks, glares and worse. Without some policing, these already entrenched smokers will continue to pollute this area next to where I work and must walk every day.
- 16) I was wondering who is in charge of enforcing the smoking ban. Politely asking and reminding smokers blatantly smoking in crowds in the center of the campus has proven to be ineffective. Whose responsibility is it to ensure smokers follow the ban?
- 17) I've seen a lot of smoking on campus this week and am wondering if new students are aware of the non-smoking policy or was wondering if the policy was changed. I don't see many 'smoke free campus' signs any more. The vending machine kiosk outside Keller Hall, Moore Hall, Sinclair Library, Gilmore Hall, and McCarthy Mall are areas that seem to have smokers now, but I didn't notice them fall semester.
- 18) I am a faculty member who is very disappointed to see smoking continuing everywhere on campus this semester, after the well publicized Smoking Ban was put into effect. After reading the policy on the UH website, I now understand that the ban is voluntary and will not be enforced. I am extremely disappointed that an enforceable policy was not implemented. We are still breathing second-hand smoke as we walk between buildings. Why bother with a policy at all? Last year a student pulled out her e-cig during class! How should I react to blatant flaunting of an unenforced policy on campus by both students and UH employees? Please advise?
- 19) Thank you for putting up a banner announcing that UHM is now a smoke-free campus, outside Moore Hall attached to the metal railings facing Maile Way.

Could we please have another to be attached where smokers can actually see it, say, on the metal railings within the Moore Hall courtyard?

As a Department Chair I would very much like to see new students to the campus take note of this policy, and I have a couple of times this semester run across individuals, most recently a group of three, smoking in the Moore Hall courtyard fully in ignorance of the sign which is about 20 feet away out of line of sight of the courtyard (a popular smokers' hangout in days gone by).

If you care to do even more informative signage, the smokers' hangout by the snack machine kiosk adjacent to Keller Hall could also use a banner.

20) Received the attached report regarding smoking near Spalding & Webster. Photo of smokers attached. Appreciate your assistance to have DPS patrol the area and ask smokers to stop or move off-campus to avoid creating further uncomfortable situations for others. We have the same issue at Keller Kiosk daily. Appreciate if DPS could also be visible at Keller Kiosk too. Unfortunately, some smokers get hostile when approached by students, faculty, or staff. DPS seems to get a more cooperative result.

Your team's assistance is much appreciated.

FYI: These types of reports are not whistle-blower cases and thus, will have the reporter contact DPS or Health Promotions in future.

21) What is the general nature of this matter? Two men smoking (one eCig another regular cigarette) next to a big tree at the mauka end of Spalding Hall Where did this incident or violation occur? Spalding Hall - mauka end near a big tree Please provide the specific or approximate time this incident occurred: 10am - about 8 weeks ago - but continue to see them smoking after this How long do you think this problem has been going on? 3 months to a year How did you become aware of this violation? It happened to me Please identify any persons who have attempted to conceal this problem and the steps they took to conceal it: n/a Details: I saw two men smoking (one e-cig - one real cigarette) next to mauka end of Spalding Hall on Nov 6, 2017. (see picture attached) I told them we had a smoke-free campus and they couldn't smoke – but they refused to stop - said it was a "guideline" not enforced like a law and when I disagreed they said they didn't care what I thought (using a very angry tone). I took their picture and they make an obscene gesture (captured in photo) and yelled derogatory things at me. I definitely felt intimidated (didn't linger to hear what they were saying but the larger one was yelling several unsavory, aggressive words). I sent the picture (Nov 7) to Campus Security and filed a complaint about them smoking and saying rude things (not sure what they have done about it). I have since told a friend who works in Webster about these 2 rude smokers and showed her their picture. She told me she recognized them both and had seen them MANY times smoking (e-cig and regular cig) in that same spot around 11:45 to noon. Since Nov, I have now seen them several times in that grassy area around 8am and/ or 10am – in same spot next to a big tree next to Spalding Hall. So they continue to smoke on campus. I am sufficiently intimidated that if I see them smoking and they see me (I have been hiding from their sight so they don't see me when I see them) - I fear a physical reprisal. This is a smoke free campus – it should be enforced especially when smokers are being rude and threatening when asked to stop smoking. I suggest someone go by and witness them smoking and ask them to stop and see what they say. If there is no enforcement how can we say we have a smoke free campus.

However without tobacco-free college campuses, University of Hawai'i students are no longer protected from the harmful effects of secondhand smoke. Our learning and working environment extends outside the classroom, which can expose us to secondhand smoke. Smoking and the use of electronic cigarettes are not conducive to a healthy learning environment and they can seriously compromise our health.

A recent national poll conducted by the American Cancer Society found that 8 out of 10 current college students in the U.S. support policies that prohibit smoking and other tobacco. Additionally, the number of colleges and universities with comprehensive smoke- or tobacco-free policies more than quadrupled from 446 in 2010 to over 2,100 in 2018. Hawai'i has always

SB 3004 - RELATING TO HEALTH

Thank you for the opportunity to provide written testimony in support of SB 3004, which prohibits smoking and tobacco use on University of Hawaii premises. The American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN) is the nation's leading cancer advocacy organization. ACS CAN works with federal, state, and local government bodies to support evidence-based policy and legislative solutions designed to eliminate cancer as a major health problem.

Despite significant progress since the first Surgeon General's report, issued over 50 years ago, tobacco use remains the single largest cause of preventable death and disease and is responsible for about one third of cancer deaths. Of the roughly 20 million college and university students in the United States, more than 1 million are projected to die prematurely from cigarette smoking. While approximately 90% of smokers start by age 18, fully 99% start by age 26, underscoring the importance of supporting young adults with more effective prevention and cessation efforts while eliminating exposure to secondhand smoke and all tobacco use in their learning environments.

Electronic smoking devices, cigars, and other non-cigarette tobacco products are not a safe alternative to cigarettes. Unfortunately, both cigar and e-cigarette use by youth is on the rise. Because they simulate the behavior of smoking, use of these products in public places where smoking is otherwise prohibited complicates enforcement of the

law and weakens its effectiveness. Many of these products resemble traditional cigarettes, and produce a visible cloud when exhaled which can confusion for the public and enforcement officials alike. In addition, the unacceptability of smoking in these places could be compromised which could lead to new users or a reduction in current users who quit.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in Strong Support of SB 3004 – Relating to Health, which urges the State of Hawai'i to prohibit smoking and tobacco use, including the use of electronic smoking devices, by any person on the premises of the University of Hawai'i.

There is no safe level of exposure to second-hand smoke and even minimal exposure can increase risk for multiple health conditions. Currently all students in Hawai'i in grades K-12 are able to attend school on tobacco-free campuses. However without tobacco-free college campuses, University of Hawai'i students are no longer protected from the harmful effects of second-hand smoke. Our learning and work environment extends outside the classroom, which can expose us to second-hand smoke. Smoking and the use of electronic cigarettes are not conducive to a healthy learning environment and they can seriously compromise our health.

In 2009, the American College Health Association (ACHA), a major source of guidance on college health, issued a position statement recommending that all colleges and universities implement tobacco-free policies. In 2011, the position statement was updated to include the recommendation to ban electronic cigarettes. In 2009, there were only 365 smoke-free colleges and universities in the US. However since then there has been a steady rise in new smoking policies across the US. As of last month, there are now at least 2,106 smoke-free colleges and universities across the country, 1,771 of which are 100% tobacco-free. There are also four states, Arkansas, Illinois, Iowa, and Louisiana, and one territory, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, that have laws requiring their public institutions be smoke-free.

While UH Manoa has made efforts to make their campus smoke-free, smoking has continued at many locations around campus, exposing everyone to the harmful effects of second-hand smoke. Additionally, different campuses of the University of Hawai'i have different policies making it confusing for students who attend classes on multiple campuses.

Hawaii has been a leader, protecting the public and its visitors from the dangers of second-hand smoke, and now, the State Legislature has the opportunity to protect everyone on the University of Hawai'i campuses, students, employees, and visitors from the harmful effects of second-hand smoke. As a result, it is imperative that we protect the health of thousands of individuals throughout all 10 campuses of the University of Hawai'i by passing SB 3004.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in <u>SUPPORT</u> of SB3004 which urges the State of Hawai'i to prohibit smoking and tobacco use, including the use of electronic smoking devices, by any person on the premises of the University of Hawai'i.

The Coalition for a Tobacco-Free Hawai'i (Coalition) is a program of the Hawai'i Public Health Institute (HIPHI) that is dedicated to reducing tobacco use through education, policy, and advocacy. With two decades of history in Hawai'i, the Coalition has led several campaigns on enacting smoke-free environments, including being the first state in the nation to prohibit the sale of tobacco and electronic smoking devices to purchasers under 21 years of age.

Tobacco use and exposure to secondhand smoke in any form causes serious health risks such as cancer, heart disease, and respiratory illness. Restricting tobacco and e-cigarette use throughout a campus reduces these risks and promotes the health and well-being of members of the entire campus community. Having a campus-wide policy also helps to reduce the youth initiation to tobacco products,



including electronic smoking devices. In addition, smoke-free policies economically benefit the University of Hawai'i by contributing to reduced health care costs and employee absenteeism, as well as increased productivity and cost savings associated clean-up of cigarette litter.

There is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke.

The level of air pollution from a cigarette is so severe that breathing it is dangerous for anyone, but especially for children. Secondhand smoke has more than 7,000 chemicals, at least 70 of which are known to cause cancer. Further, the 2016 U.S. Surgeon General Report has determined that emissions from e-cigarettes are not harmless. "It can contain harmful and potentially harmful chemicals, including nicotine; ultrafine particles that can be inhaled deep into the lungs; flavoring such diacetyl, a chemical linked to a serious lung disease; volatile organic compounds such as benzene, which is found in car exhaust; and heavy metals, such as nickel, tin, and lead."

This measure aims to protect all students in Hawai'i.

Currently all students attending grades K-12 in Hawai'i are able to attend school on tobacco-free campuses. However because only the University of Hawai'i Manoa is smoke-free, thousands of our students, faculty, and school visitors are no longer protected from the harmful effects of secondhand smoke. Smoking and the use of electronic cigarettes are not conducive to a healthy learning environment and can seriously compromise anyone's health.

As of January 2, 2018 there are now 2,106 smoke-free campuses in the United Statesⁱⁱ. Hawai'i has been a leader, protecting the public and its visitors from the dangers of secondhand smoke, and now, the State Legislature has the opportunity to protect everyone on the University of Hawai'i campuses from the harmful effects of secondhand smoke.

Thank you and we respectfully ask that you pass SB3004 out of committee.

Aloha, my name is Katie Folio and I am submitting this testimony as a private citizen in STRONG support of SB 3004, which would prohibit smoking and vaping on UH campuses. I often work on the UH campus and I have many friends who attend the school. My own two small children may one day attend UHMC, as it is the only higher education institution on Maui. Our campus is small, yet we have FOURTEEN designated smoking areas (DSAs). There may as well not be a smoking policy with 14 DSAs, since wind carries the smoke across the entire campus. Close to 2,000 campuses nationwide have gone smoke-free, and it is time we get on board. Our kids are protected by the DOE in grades K-12, they should continue to have these protections in college. The unions oppose this bill, but again, they are subject to these conditions for the DOE, so it makes no sense to draw the line here. Secondhand smoke kills. My name is Ivannia Alay and I am a student at UH Manoa and Graduate Assistant for Dr. Kristen Scholly, the chair of Health Promotion at UH Manoa, who also helps organize the smoke-free campus initiative. I am here today in <u>strong support for SB 3004</u>.

As a Graduate Assistant, one of my duties is to help field calls, emails and concerns that come through our office. I am here today due to the overwhelming concerns that I field from students and faculty in regards to the lack of enforcement and the unclear policies relating to smoking on our campus. Since this initiative launched at our school 2 years ago, our office has an extensive log of valuable information that depicts the failure of our campus' effort to become smoke free.

Smokers on campus have claimed approximately 12 areas across campus. Not only are these unauthorized smoking areas located near heavy trafficked pathways or next to buildings, but many of these areas do not abide by the state's smoking 20ft away from a door policy. Our office is frequently contacted and asked to put up signs that are then almost immediately removed in these claimed smoking areas on campus. When we hang these signs, our office requires that we go out in pairs due to the angry and confrontational backlash that is faced when displaying the no smoking signs around campus. I once was angrily confronted and asked if I was responsible for their missing furniture that they had brought in and placed in their "smoking courtyard". Leading to another problem we encounter with smoking on campus. In these claimed smoking areas, chairs, tables, couches are being brought in and placed in these smoking areas on campus. There

is nothing being done, absolutely no enforcement and the no smoking policy is seen as a joke to everyone on campus. One student tweeted:

"UH Manoa has to be the smokiest "smoke-free" campus there is... #didntchangeathing"

At UH, The Department of Public Safety's mission states: "We are dedicated to providing and promoting a safe and secure campus." The issue of having a no smoke campus now moves beyond the troubles of trying to protecting students second hand smoke, but also now their physical safety.

The following you will find examples of the complaints we continue to receive in our office regarding the occurrence of smoking on campus as well as threatening and negative behavior:

- 1) I have seen the signs and emails regarding our campus being smoke-free. However, there's a very large group of people who like to smoke next to Keller hall. Today, since it was raining, the smokers were all packed into the snack building between Keller and EDM. I couldn't even go in there to get a snack because I didn't want to exposed to the cloud of smoke filling the area. I'd really appreciate if the no smoking policy could be enforced.
- 2) The buildings around Kuykendall hall are not smoke free. Employees who do yard service and janitorial work are still smoking on the side of the buildings were there aren't doors.
- 3) Just wondering what can be done about smokers congregating on the Dole St. side of Holmes Hall? There is considerable foot traffic through that area as well as being right next to the building.

If there is a designated smoking area identified on campus (or off campus), perhaps signs could be put up? Or simply no smoking signs. (Likely noteworthy that this was not an issue before the UH non-smoking policy.)

- 4) Why does UH continue to call itself a smoke free campus when there is zero enforcement of this?? All one has to do is walk near the vending machines next to Keller Hall to realize nothing is being done about smokers.
- 5) I've seen and heard from students that there are people vaping around the vending machines by Keller Hall, regularly. Sometimes there are up to 10 people congregating there. Could there be a "no vaping" sign around there?
- 6) There needs to be more enforcement of the smoke free policy especially near the Hale Kahawai Dorms behind the Center for Korean Studies. I often encounter students smoking in

that area and there are so many littered cigarette butts every where - its disgusting. If Campus Security is supposed to do it, they need to get out of their cars and actually patrol.

7) Over the past few months, our team has worked out of Crawford Hall (temporarily) and recently moved into our permanent office in Keller 111. Have asked the smokers behind Crawford Hall to please stop smoking on campus several times. Most have been good about stopping. Now that we are in Keller, noticed many smokers at the kiosk every day and throughout the day.....openly smoking. In both cases, they are not abiding by current state law which forbids smoking less than 20 ft away from building entrances and windows.

Could we get help from DPS to enforce the law? Students have also voiced their dissatisfaction of the smoking being done openly without enforcement.

This is not a new issue and thus, apologize if discussion of this issue and next steps have already taken place. If so, it would be good to know what is planned. And if there is anything our team can help with, please let us know.

8) Unfortunately it looks like all the new signs around the Keller Hall vending kiosk for "smoke free campus" and "not a designated smoking area" were completely torn down by the second day of the semester. Additionally, it appears that someone has also pulled down the large "smoke free" banner that was affixed to the wall around the AC units outside of Bilger.

Many smokers are once again frequently using that area in contravention of the goal of making Manoa a smoke free campus.

Perhaps campus public safety officers could provide friendly reminders to the offenders there. The signs alone are clearly ineffective at dissuading them

- 9) Just to let you know there were about 25 people smoking (mostly real cigs) yesterday around and in the snack shack next to Keller Hall. Who is enforcing this smoke free campus? Rules are great, but if there is no one to enforce them then they are meaningless. I was not about to confront 25 inconsiderate smokers.
- 10) I am emailing to report the occurrence of cigarette smoke coming into my office, as well as the offices around me. The smoke was very strong to where I needed to leave my office. We believe that the cigarette smoke is coming into the offices from the vent that people are smoking by behind the biomed building. This cigarette smoke is effecting my work environment and productivity, as well as my health.

I hope there is some type of action and enforcement that can taken to prevent smokers from smoking on the University of Hawaii Manoa campus.

11) I am writing to you regarding a concern I have with smokers at UH's Biomed building. For the last two days, cigarette smoke has been coming in my office through the air-conditioning vents. Individuals have also seen smokers near the intake vents at our building. Just today, a fellow colleague told a smoker that he could not smoke. The smoker was situated near an intake vent at the back of the building. At this area, there are clear ashtrays where smokers place their cigarette butts.

In yesterday's occurrence, UH's Public Safety was called by Dr. Al Katz and they notified him that they cannot do anything regarding smokers. Our Program Chair, Dr. Kathryn Braun in turn called UH Environmental Health and Safety and a representative named Chad came to my office. Chad did acknowledge the cigarette smoke smell in my office and stated that they do not handle cigarette smoke, and deferred me to UH Public Safety. I informed him that they were already called and did nothing. He shrugged and stated that they, too, cannot handle this matter.

The cigarette smoke may not bother others in the building, but I have asthma and have been taking my inhaler excessively the last two days due to asthma attacks caused by the smoke coming into my office. If I do not take my inhaler, I have a hard time breathing which may lead to an emergency room visit. I am in my office for over 8 hours a day and cannot constantly take my inhaler. It is against medical advice to constantly use the inhaler in a small period of time because it will lead to an overdose. It is frustrating that I work at a smoke-free campus, yet suffer because this law is not enforced. Smokers are allowed to violate policy at the expense of the university's students, faculty, and staff. It's disheartening and unfair for those that choose to work in a healthy work environment.

- 12) It's ironic that the area surrounding the vending machines near Keller Hall off of McCarthy Mall is apparently one of the most popular smoking venues on campus despite being plastered with many signs and banners advising that UH Manoa is a smoke free campus. That spot is rife with smokers throughout the day.
- 13) Thank you for your continued effort. I see there are many new signs up around the old smokers' corner adjacent to the Physical Science Building and the kiosk between Keller Hall and Bilger Hall. Unfortunately newcomers to campus have already located this as a space to smoke, including this morning actual cigars. There is one remaining concrete bench there. I think other seating was removed last year, but the remaining bench is an encouragement that is not necessary.

I did speak to the cigar smoker, who was defiant, saying that as he was illiterate he couldn't read the signs! See photo, with another smoker in the back adjacent to one of your new signs.

A pity this policy is not enforceable. I assume that UH Security still wants nothing to do with it? Or is there any recourse if one sees (as is often the case) several to half a dozen smokers in that same old smokers' corner?

- 14) As of August 17, 2015, the University of Hawaii is a "Smoke-Free" campus. According to the UH Manoa Smoke-Free Campus Website, it is only <u>encouraged</u> that all members of the university refrain from smoking on campus. There are certain places on campus where large groups of people collectively smoke because they think it is a smoking zone. These locations are areas that I frequently pass to get to my classes and the smoke and smell give me headaches. Many people on campus believe it is authoritarian for UH to actually ban someones right to smoke on campus and continue to smoke, but is there anything you can do to change it to an enforced, campus-wide ban on smoking?
- 15) For months now I have been reminding the smokers who congregate daily and stubbornly at the vending machine kiosk next to Keller Hall on the Mall that there is no smoking on campus. This is to no avail. The Chancellor's recent reminder concerning the no-smoking policy on campus prompts me to report these scoff laws to you and ask for your help. Could you please send someone to roust out and remove the smokers there at different times of the day, every day? I have done what I can by my polite reminders, only to receive uninterested looks, glares and worse. Without some policing, these already entrenched smokers will continue to pollute this area next to where I work and must walk every day.
- 16) I was wondering who is in charge of enforcing the smoking ban. Politely asking and reminding smokers blatantly smoking in crowds in the center of the campus has proven to be ineffective. Whose responsibility is it to ensure smokers follow the ban?
- 17) I've seen a lot of smoking on campus this week and am wondering if new students are aware of the non-smoking policy or was wondering if the policy was changed. I don't see many 'smoke free campus' signs any more. The vending machine kiosk outside Keller Hall, Moore Hall, Sinclair Library, Gilmore Hall, and McCarthy Mall are areas that seem to have smokers now, but I didn't notice them fall semester.
- 18) I am a faculty member who is very disappointed to see smoking continuing everywhere on campus this semester, after the well publicized Smoking Ban was put into effect. After reading the policy on the UH website, I now understand that the ban is voluntary and will not be enforced. I am extremely disappointed that an enforceable policy was not implemented. We are still breathing second-hand smoke as we walk between buildings. Why bother with a policy at all? Last year a student pulled out her e-cig during class! How should I react to blatant flaunting of an unenforced policy on campus by both students and UH employees? Please advise?
- 19) Thank you for putting up a banner announcing that UHM is now a smoke-free campus, outside Moore Hall attached to the metal railings facing Maile Way.

Could we please have another to be attached where smokers can actually see it, say, on the metal railings within the Moore Hall courtyard?

As a Department Chair I would very much like to see new students to the campus take note of this policy, and I have a couple of times this semester run across individuals, most recently a group of three, smoking in the Moore Hall courtyard fully in ignorance of the sign which is about 20 feet away out of line of sight of the courtyard (a popular smokers' hangout in days gone by).

If you care to do even more informative signage, the smokers' hangout by the snack machine kiosk adjacent to Keller Hall could also use a banner.

20) Received the attached report regarding smoking near Spalding & Webster. Photo of smokers attached. Appreciate your assistance to have DPS patrol the area and ask smokers to stop or move off-campus to avoid creating further uncomfortable situations for others. We have the same issue at Keller Kiosk daily. Appreciate if DPS could also be visible at Keller Kiosk too. Unfortunately, some smokers get hostile when approached by students, faculty, or staff. DPS seems to get a more cooperative result.

Your team's assistance is much appreciated.

FYI: These types of reports are not whistle-blower cases and thus, will have the reporter contact DPS or Health Promotions in future.

21) What is the general nature of this matter? Two men smoking (one eCig another regular cigarette) next to a big tree at the mauka end of Spalding Hall Where did this incident or violation occur? Spalding Hall - mauka end near a big tree Please provide the specific or approximate time this incident occurred: 10am - about 8 weeks ago - but continue to see them smoking after this How long do you think this problem has been going on? 3 months to a year How did you become aware of this violation? It happened to me Please identify any persons who have attempted to conceal this problem and the steps they took to conceal it: n/a Details: I saw two men smoking (one e-cig – one real cigarette) next to mauka end of Spalding Hall on Nov 6, 2017. (see picture attached) I told them we had a smoke-free campus and they couldn't smoke – but they refused to stop - said it was a "guideline" not enforced like a law and when I disagreed they said they didn't care what I thought (using a very angry tone). I took their picture and they make an obscene gesture (captured in photo) and yelled derogatory things at me. I definitely felt intimidated (didn't linger to hear what they were saying but the larger one was yelling several unsavory, aggressive words). I sent the picture (Nov 7) to Campus Security and filed a complaint about them smoking and saying rude things (not sure what they have done about it). I have since told a friend who works in Webster about these 2 rude smokers and showed her their picture. She told me she recognized them both and had seen them MANY times smoking (e-cig and regular cig) in that same spot around 11:45 to noon. Since Nov, I have now seen them several times in that grassy area around 8am and/ or 10am – in same spot next to a big tree next to Spalding Hall. So they continue to smoke on campus. I am sufficiently intimidated that if I see them smoking and they see me (I have been hiding from their sight so they don't see me when I see them) - I fear a physical reprisal. This is a smoke free campus – it should be enforced especially when smokers are being rude and threatening when asked to stop smoking. I suggest someone go by

and witness them smoking and ask them to stop and see what they say. If there is no enforcement how can we say we have a smoke free campus.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in **SUPPORT** of SB 3004, which urges the State of Hawai'i to prohibit smoking and tobacco use, including the use of electronic smoking devices, by any person on the premises of the University of Hawai'i.

There is no safe level of exposure to secondhand smoke and even minimal exposure can increase risk for multiple health conditions. The Mid Pacific campus is in close proximity to University of Hawaii-Manoa campus and that means that when people on the UH Manoa campus Mid Pacific students can also be exposed to the dangers of second hand smoke.

Currently all students in Hawaii in grades K-12 are able to attend school on tobacco-free campuses.
