## Comments:

The Land Use Research Foundation of Hawaii (LURF) appreciates the opportunity to provide its comments, concerns and **OPPOSITION** to **SB 3095**, relating to Environmental Protection, which would establish disclosure and public notification requirements for outdoor application of pesticides in various sensitive areas or by large-scale, outdoor commercial agricultural operations. Establishes a pilot program that creates a vegetative buffer zone around five selected schools near a commercial agricultural production area. Effective July 31, 2018.

We can understand that this bill could be a well-meaning, but misguided attempt to address concerns relating to pesticide safety, however, LURF opposes this bill, based on, among other things, the following:

- The proposed requirements are not supported by a specific scientific basis;
- The proposed requirements and buffer zone are inconsistent with, and exceeds
  the Integrated Pest Management approach and the warnings instructions and
  requirements of the Environmental Protection agency (EPA), which apply to
  government agencies, other businesses and industries, and other private users;
- The proposed requirements and buffer zone are inconsistent with the studies of pesticides use under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide & Rehabilitation Act (FIFRA), which apply to government agencies, other businesses and industries, and other private users;
- The bill unfairly discriminates and targets only "commercial agriculture", when commercial agriculture constitutes a small percentage of all Restricted Use Pesticides (RUP) product sales in Hawaii;
- This measure unfairly exempts over 90% of the major purchasers of RUP in Hawaii, including, among others, all government, business and industrial (landscapers, pest control companies), private homeowners and small farms, which apply much more pesticides than commercial agriculture, and have opportunities for direct affects on school children; and
- Finally, SB 3095 is unnecessary, as most of the commercial agricultural companies are already participating in voluntary reporting programs.

Based on the above, LURF respectfully requests that SB 3095 be DEFERRED and HELD by this Committee.
