- 5 also known as intimate partner violence, continues to be a public health problem affecting
- 6 millions of Americans each year. Survey findings from the "Findings from the National Intimate
- 7 Partner and Sexual Violence Survey (2010-1012)" underscore the heavy toll of this violence, the
- 8 young age at which people often experience violence, and the negative health conditions
- 9 associated with these forms of violence.
- Many times Emergency Medical Services personnel are the first health care providers domestic
- violence victims encounter. Often these individuals may not be prepared to deal with their
- situation, therefore early identification and support is critical. Enabling pre-hospital providers
- with a standardized approach to these victims can provide the necessary links to important
- community resources such as crisis intervention, safe housing and early behavioral health care.
- In addition to the medical evaluation, early reporting of these incidents to authorities is
- necessary. This resolution seeks to have the Department of Health convene a statewide task
- 17 force to evaluate rapid identification and reporting of domestic violence situations. Making EMS
- a part of this process is the first step to the domestic violence victim's recovery.

Good morning, my name is Melodie Aduja. I serve as Chair of the Oahu County Committee ("OCC") on Legislative Priorities of the Democratic Party of Hawaii. Thank you for the opportunity to provide written testimony on **SCR129** relating to the Department of Health convening a task force to examine how a statewide use of domestic violence assessments and response protocol by emergency medical services personnel can help to strengthen the State's overall response to domestic violence.

The OCC on Legislative Priorities is in favor of **SCR129** and support its passage.

SCR129 is in alignment with the Platform of the Democratic Party of Hawai'i ("DPH"), 2016, as it requests the Department of Health to convene a task force to examine how a statewide use of domestic violence assessments and response protocol by emergency medical services personnel can help to strengthen the State's overall response to domestic violence by: (1) examining whether the development of domestic violence assessments and response protocol may better protect victims of domestic violence and first responders; and (2) examining the issues relevant to the implementation of domestic violence assessments and response protocol.

The DPH Platform states that: "We believe in a government that will adequately, efficiently, courteously, openly, ethically and fairly administer to the needs of the people." (Platform of DPH, P.5, Line 245-246 (2016)).

We believe in women's equality and right to privacy, including but not limited to equal access to reproductive services and care, shelter and counseling for victims of

domestic violence, and the right of rape victims to emergency contraception in the emergency room. (Platform of the DPH, P. 2, Lines 170-172 (2016)).

We support community health initiatives that provide opportunities for the overall health of communities through strategic projects and programs focusing on increased interaction and physical activities among all age groups, as well as on better nutrition. (Platform of the DPH, P. 7, Lines 378-380 (2016)).

We support restorative justice that repairs the harm caused by criminal behaviors and reintegrates the offenders as contributing members of society. Likewise we support opportunities for those who have been incarcerated to effect a smooth transition back into the community and make available health, educational, and other assistance programs needed to allow them to become productive and respected members of the community. (Platform of the DPH, P. 5, Lines 273-277 (2016)).

Given that **SCR129**requests the Department of Health to convene a task force to examine how a statewide use of domestic violence assessments and response protocol by emergency medical services personnel can help to strengthen the State's overall response to domestic violence by: (1) examining whether the development of domestic violence assessments and response protocol may better protect victims of domestic violence and first responders; and (2) examining the issues relevant to the implementation of domestic violence assessments and response protocol, it is the position of the OCC on Legislative Priorities to support this measure.
