## In consideration of SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 133 AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF A TERM LEASE COVERING A PORTION OF STATE SUBMERGED LANDS AT KAHALU'U, NORTH KONA, ISLAND OF HAWAI'I

Senate Concurrent Resolution 133 seeks to authorize the issuance of a term lease covering a portion of state submerged lands at Kahalu'u, North Kona, Island of Hawai'i. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this concurrent resolution.

At its meeting on February 9, 2018, under agenda item D-5, the Board of Land and Natural Resources (Board) approved the direct lease of approximately 3.992 acres more or less, seaward of Tax Map Keys (3) 7-8-013:002 & 043, to the abutting landowner, The Trustees of the Estate of Bernice Pauahi Bishop (Applicant). The purpose of the lease is for cultural and historical site preservation. The Applicant requested the lease as part of their Kahalu'u Ma Kai Educational and Cultural Complex. The Complex will be constructed on the Applicant's private property landward of the lease area, will advance their mission of providing high quality educational experiences for Native Hawaiian children and families in collaboration with community stakeholders, and be the center of their educational offerings in the West Hawai'i region.

As required by Section 171-53, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), the Board may lease submerged lands "with the prior approval of the Governor and the prior authorization of the Legislature by concurrent resolution". As the Applicant is a tax exempt 501(c)(3) eleemosynary organization, the Board approved the direct lease at gratis pursuant to Section 171-43.1, HRS. The lease is necessary to allow the Applicant to have the ability to control and limit public access to the submerged land area as it is the site for two heiau. In addition to the two heiau, the Applicant has also identified a "probable burial area" that would be included in the proposed lease area.

The lease will be for the preservation and management of these historic archaeological sites, and no commercial activity or development shall occur in the lease area. Although public access

We ask the members of this committee to vote in support of SCR 133 which will allow Kamehameha Schools to serve the families of Hawai'i by providing quality, innovative 'āina-and culture-based educational experiences while caring for the culturally significant sites located on submerged lands in Kahalu'u, Hawai'i.
