### Comments:

I am opposed to the portion of this bill which relocates the Kapa'a Industrial Park out of the Kawainui-Hamakua Marsh Complex. The Kapa'a Industrial Park has many dedicated small business owners who have agreed to do their business in ways that mitigate impacts to the environment. Many of these owners could not afford lease rent or relocation costs to other parts of the island, and in addition, many live in Kailua or Kaneohe and are also important constituents of the community.

Making a blanket statement on "relocation" (p.3, line 11) of a dedicated group of community members who are in compliance with the environmental impact mitigation for the Marsh does not take into account or provide for a realistic plan for the impact to their livelihoods.

In addition, the blanket statement that the clean up of the contaminated soil in Kapa'a valley should be conducted, though admirable, does not take into account the enormous cost and time span of such a cleanup.

Finally, showing bias against the Industrial Park tenants (relocating them but no other group) without similar concerns for Le Jardin, the AMRON facility or the Kapaa Transfer Station is not in keeping with the spirit of fairness we collectively stand for.

As a long term resident who lived in Kailua for more than ten years, including in Maunawili, I agree with land restoration where it is feasible and where practical improvements can be made. But I remember when the old drive in theater site sat unused for several years after it closed, with no useful life until Le Jardin was built,. I drove by it daily and wondered why it was left in disrepair in a beautiful part of Kailua. My experience thus makes me an informed skeptic of the pace of change that would actually occur if this bill is passed.

Instead, I see more clearly the harm that would be done by relocating the tenants of the park to an unknown location.
