A brief description of the applicant's background; Hui Pono Holoholona -HPH founded in 2007, is an all volunteer 501c3 non-profit organization, primarily offering to the community low cost-no cost spay and neuter which is scientifically proven to reduce litter births, reducing euthanasia of healthy adoptable animals at our local Humane Society. HPH provides through education guidance to be a better humane animal owner and caregiver. By doing so, this increases better care, treatment, pet responsibility, and less likely for the animal to be turned in to the Humane Society. Statistically, 70+ percent of animals entering local Humane Societies and across our nation are euthanized. It's a horrifically high kill number but fixable to decrease substantially unwanted litter births through schedule spay/neuter clinics. We also provide support to pet owners, caregivers and other loosely formed individuals and groups caring for lost, stray, abandoned, abused, and neglected animals. FYI- Hui Pono Holoholona Sanctuary 20 acres called P.A.W.S - Pono Animal Way Sanctuary, took in 75 feline volcano rescues from Pahoa during the 2015-16 eruption, and from May 4, 2018 over 100 more feline volcano rescues coming from Leilani Estates, Kapoho, Lanipuna Gardens and other areas.

- 2. The goals and objectives related to the request; HPH's goal is to reduce the number of stray, feral and abandoned animals, humanely in Hawaii Island lava evacuation zones, parks and communities. Current numbers of euthanasia on Hawai'i Island is staggering-See included HIHS monthly reports. Every low cost/no cost spay/neuter opportunity needs to be pursued more to decrease the horrific numbers of healthy animals being euthanized daily. Round up to kill over decades has proven unsuccessful, and overall more costly. Also, unwanted litter births leads to animal abandonment. Although local animal s/n groups holding one day a month clinic's is slowing declining the amount of animals being turned in to HIHS daily, a bigger push for large Spay/Neuter clinics is needed. Every animal will be sterilized and microchipped and receive a health check, flea treatment, deworming, and first shots. TNR is not only a humane and compassionate response to pet overpopulation and their euthanasia, but communities will be healthier and safer as a result.
- 3. The public purpose and need to be served: Round-up to kill dogs and cats statistically does not decrease their overpopulation. But what is proven, more effective, and less expensive is financially supporting low cost - no cost spay/neuter the public awareness of the high euthanasia at the humane society facility and unable to afford the cost to S/N, are preferring to abandon animals in the false belief they have a better chance to survive. Our organization was formed to provide low cost/no cost spay/neuter because people told us over and over that they were not able to afford the high cost of that service which can be over \$200 per animal at private Veterinarian businesses. Cost of living in Hawai'i is difficult because of low paying jobs, high cost of rent, food, medical, leaves little or nothing left. People are demanding better animal control solutions, than round up to kill. Pet overpopulation detracts from our communities and burden our families who are struggling to care for their animals. Our time-honored tradition and system of surrendering or calling "Animal Control" to catch or trap stray or feral cats and dogs, take them to crowded shelters, then kill the "surplus" animals to make room for the new ones has proven inefficient and expensive. This method of pet overpopulation management costs the U.S. taxpayer close to \$250 million in euthanizations and disposal alone. Our islanders want a more humane and compassionate approach by giving these animals a second chance at life.

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- 4. Describe the target population to be served; pet owners and persons feeding and caring for community unaltered cat. We support T-N-R-M, (Trap, Neuter, Release and Manage programs for the islands' community cat population. This will humanely reduce the cat population and dramatically reduce the intake and subsequent euthanasia of non-socialized/ unaltered cats to HIHS. These cats are deemed not adoptable as they have not been socialized, or 'tamed', and cannot live in a home. These cats live outside, in a well-managed and monitored colony. Our warm climate and lack of predators contributes to feral cat colony growth especially as animal loving families continue to feed but unable to afford to sterilize. We serve many coming to our clinic's, from backyard colonies.
- 5. Describe the geographic coverage. Our clinics are being held in Hilo and Kea'au. The turnout is 50% Hilo residents, 43% Puna and 7% other. These participants ranged from caregivers of T-N-R-Manage of colony cats, to pet owners, senior citizens and businesses. Many travel over 60 miles or more round trip to Hilo from Kalapana, Volcano, Laupahoehoe, etc. This shows a huge turnout of community support with compassion to spay/neuter the cat population, not to kill.

III. Service Summary and Outcomes

Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities; Hui Pono Holoholona -HPH schedules the clinics, prepares the clinic location, promoting the clinics, providing supplies including microchips, flea treatment and medications and more. HPH schedules the veterinarian staff for clinics. Recruits local volunteers to support clinics including; trapping efforts, admitting, flea treatment, ear tip, vaccination and microchipping, recovery watch and checkout. A Patient Registration Form is filled out at intake for each cat. Each cat is numbered, and the form goes with the animal into the clinic. Each Patient Registration Form is kept in our files. From our prior large clinics we have monitored the HIHS monthly animal intake statistical reports and have noted a reduction in euthanasia. The effectiveness of clinics, shows a dramatic drop in HIHS intake number, thus indicating lives were saved. See included HIHS reports. Specifically, the June 2017 Kea'au HIHS intake of strays/feral cats was 415, by comparison the July intake dropped to 297. This was a decrease of 118 cats being turned in and without doubt as a direct result of 6-day clinic saving lives via S/N by preventing unwanted litter births. Those participating tell us, how much they appreciate helping the community and animals with this humane solution to animal control.

 of the service; 2019 clinic are being scheduled once a month for a 3 day
 weekend, Saturday, Sunday and Monday; based on Veterinarian availability and
 limits. The need is so great that these clinics will be an ongoing necessity.

The Veterinarians are Hawaii Licensed and trained for large spay/neuter clinics. Our primary dedicated volunteers have participated in many clinics. HPH provides follow up care for any problem resulting from our clinics. Our clinic adheres to the highest standards of care and follows medical protocols established by the ASPCA and AVMA. https://www.aspca.org/humane-alliance including veterinarian licensing, drug dispensing, patient communications, patient monitoring, and surgical expertise. We also reports all microchip identification to HIHS-Hawaii Island Humane Society and to Found Animals a national microchip data base that provides the service for free to pet owners so that lost pets find their way home more efficiently and cost effectively.

HPH has been holding cat spay/neuter clinics since 2009, having helped over 5,000 cats to be sterilized. We use only Hawaii Licensed Veterinarians, trained and experienced in high volume, high standard spay/neuter clinics. We are currently using Dr. Katie Spaulding with Animal Balance and Kauai Community Cat Project and Dr. Eric Jayne of the Molokai.

Frannie Pueo, trapper, volunteer, caregiver and founder, president of Hui Pono Holoholona, recognizes the need for more free / low cost spay/neuter services in the community, and has worked with a number of nonprofit animal welfare organizations including AdvoCats Hawaii, Neuter Scooter, Hawaii Island Humane Society, Animal Balance and Humane Society of United States. She has established good workable relationships with a number of veterinarians in private practice. She also manages P.A.W.S – Pono Animal Way Sanctuary on twenty acres, a forever home to over 300 free roaming cats and special needs that are sterilized, microchipped and receive thier daily care. Covered fed shelters accommodates all the recues at PAWS.

Vivian Toellner, since 2008 treasurer, volunteer, clinic and supply coordinator. This includes ordering and maintaining spay/neuter equipment and supplies, schedules the clinics, works with the owners and caretakers to schedule appointments.

Kay Tanaka, Vice President, volunteer, caregiver, and trapper. Maintains a TNRM colony in Hilo.
