STATEMENT OF OBJECTIONS TO SENATE BILL NO. 1405

Honorable Members Thirtieth Legislature State of Hawai'i

Pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawai'i, I am returning herewith, without my approval, Senate Bill No. 1405, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Electronic Smoking Products."

The purposes of this bill are to require public school teachers or educators to confiscate e-cigarettes from students; require public schools to coordinate with the Department of Health for proper disposal of the confiscated e-cigarettes; require the Department of Health to create a safe harbor program for the disposal of e-cigarettes; and increase the fines from \$10 to \$100 for any person under age 21 who violates laws related to electronic smoking devices.

This bill is objectionable because there are considerable implementation concerns and unknown costs relating to certain provisions of this bill. This measure does not include a definition for an "electronic cigarette." A definition is necessary to provide teachers, educators, and students with an understanding of what items are subject to confiscation. Furthermore, confiscating and destroying evidence of a crime may hinder prosecution of those individuals responsible for selling or furnishing electronic cigarettes to persons under the age of 21. It should be noted that the costs to plan for and to create a safe harbor program and store and destroy electronic smoking devices, including the hazardous nicotine waste contained in these devices, are unknown and unfunded.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTRONIC SMOKING PRODUCTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 3 and to read as follows: 4 "§302A- Confiscation of electronic cigarettes. (a) A 5 teacher or educator at a public school shall confiscate an electronic cigarette that is in the possession of a student who 6 is under the age of twenty-one. 7 8 (b) Each public school shall coordinate with the
- 9 department of health for the proper disposal of electronic
 10 cigarettes confiscated pursuant to subsection (a).
- 12 employs the teacher or educator, who acts or fails to act in

 13 accordance with this section shall be liable in any court of law

 14 for acting or failing to act in accordance with this section."
- SECTION 2. Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated

 and to read as follows:

1	"§321-	Safe	harbor	for	disposal	electronic	cigarettes.

- 2 (a) The department of health shall establish and administer a
- 3 safe harbor program by which persons under the age of twenty-one
- 4 may dispose of electronic cigarettes in their possession.
- 5 (b) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, a person
- 6 under the age of twenty-one who disposes of an electronic
- 7 cigarette pursuant to a program established pursuant to this
- 8 section shall not be subject to any penalty relating to the
- 9 underage possession of electronic cigarettes."
- 10 SECTION 3. Section 245-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 11 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
- "(d) Any person who violates this section shall be fined
- 13 \$500 for the first offense. Any subsequent offenses shall
- -14 subject the person to a fine of no less than \$500 but no more
- 15 than \$2,000. Any person under twenty-one years of age who
- 16 violates this section shall be fined [\$10 for the first offense;
- 17 provided that any subsequent offense shall subject the person to
- 18 a fine of \$50, \$100, no part of which shall be suspended, or
- 19 the person shall be required to perform no less than forty-eight
- 20 hours but no more than seventy-two hours of community service

- 1 during hours when the person is not employed or attending
- 2 school."
- 3 SECTION 4. Section 712-1258, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended by amending subsection (6) to read as follows:
- 5 "(6) Any person who violates subsection (1) or (4), or
- 6 both, shall be fined \$500 for the first offense. Any subsequent
- 7 offenses shall subject the person to a fine not less than \$500
- 8 nor more than \$2,000. Any person under twenty-one years of age
- 9 who violates subsection (5) shall be fined [\$10 for the first
- 10 offense. Any subsequent offense shall subject the violator to a
- 11 fine of \$50, | \$100, no part of which shall be suspended, or the
- 12 person shall be required to perform not less than forty-eight
- 13 hours nor more than seventy-two hours of community service
- 14 during hours when the person is not employed and is not
- 15 attending school. Any tobacco product or electronic smoking
- 16 device, as those terms are defined in subsection (7), in the
- 17 person's possession at the time of violation of subsection (5)
- 18 shall be seized, summarily forfeited to the State, and destroyed
- 19 by law enforcement following the conclusion of an administrative
- 20 or judicial proceeding finding that a violation of subsection

- 1 (5) has been committed. The procedures set forth in chapter
- 2 712A shall not apply to this subsection."
- 3 SECTION 5. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 4 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 5 begun before its effective date.
- 6 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 8 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2019.
