My siblings and I continue to practice his teachings and the experiences he shared with us. I am a perpetual student and continue to attend Hawaiian workshops, forums, seminars and training sessions. I began dancing hula at the age of 4 with Kumu Hula Alicia Smith. Throughout the years I was trained by the following revered kumu hula: Nona Beamer, Darrel Lupenui, John Keola Lake, Ho'oulu Cambra, Maiki Aiu Lake, Kaha'i Topolinski, Leina'ala Kalama Heine, Ed Collier and other kumu when selected to dance at special events.
