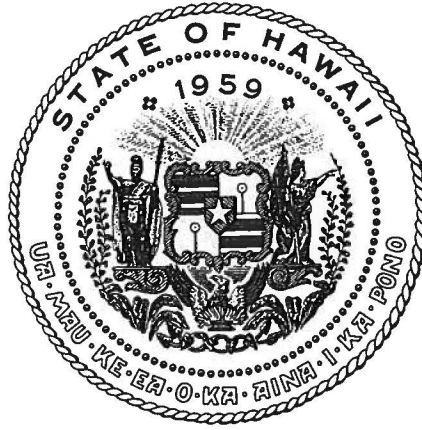

Background and Summary

The applicant, Natural Healing Research Foundation, a Hawaii nonprofit corporation (NHRF), respectfully submits the following background and summary for its grant request:

1. Brief Description of Applicant's Background. NHRF is a Hawaii nonprofit organization whose purpose is advancing research and education in the practice of natural healing remedies for the major diseases and other adverse health conditions facing humanity. NHRF was founded and is headed by Grandmaster Hong Liu, a world-renowned practitioner of traditional Chinese healing as well as a Chinese medical doctor. The conventional medical community is just beginning to explore the synergy between Eastern and Western medicine. Grandmaster Hong has spent a lifetime combining the two systems in a complementary way, both as a western trained, research-based physician, and as a master of natural healing, the highest attainable standing in the centuries-old Chinese healing tradition. Master Hong's unique awareness of how to enhance healing by integrating both systems has been well recognized. For his pioneering cancer research, humanitarian healing programs, community outreach and tireless devotion to teaching people how to heal themselves, he has been proclaimed a Living Treasure in his homeland of China, and in the state of Hawai'i. Through his efforts, NHRF has established Qi Centers on the islands of Oahu and Kauai. The Qi Centers are dedicated to providing health outreach programs to the community, such as health and exercise classes for seniors, native Hawaiians and children, allergy and asthma prevention clinics, drug addiction treatments and numerous other humanitarian programs. It is a model that Master Hong envisions for communities throughout Hawaii and beyond.
2. Goals and Objectives of the Request. The grant is being requested to assist NHRF in meeting the following goals and objectives: (a) providing qi gong and natural healing exercise classes to seniors and other residents; (b) educating seniors, native Hawaiians and other Hawaii residents on traditional and natural healing nutrition and other practices that can aid in allergy and asthma prevention, drug addiction treatments and other humanitarian and health-related programs; (c) providing research opportunities for medical doctors and other health-care practitioners to conduct studies, tests and provide findings on the use of non-invasive and simple natural healing foods, exercises and equipment such as standing, seating and similar devices, to improve health and wellness.
3. Public Purpose and Need to be Served. The grant is being requested to expand natural healing educational opportunities for seniors and residents and research opportunities for medical and healthcare professionals in order to improve the community's access to non-invasive, traditional and natural healing treatments and the overall health and well-being of Hawaii residents. Hawaii's population is rapidly aging and in need of affordable health care alternatives which lessen (as opposed to further burden) our overworked and limited numbers of medical professionals. Providing our seniors and other residents with opportunities to learn about traditional

and natural health care practices which can improve their health and prevent disease is an important goal. Providing health care professionals with opportunities to conduct research to determine the efficacy of various natural healing foods, exercises and devices can lead to important and cost-effective treatments for our seniors and residents.

4. Target Groups. The groups targeted for service with grant funds include the following: (a) seniors; (b) adults; (c) children; (d) physicians; and (e) other medical and healthcare professionals.
5. Geographic Coverage. Currently NHRF proposes using grant funds for the stated purposes on the islands of Oahu and Kauai where NHRF has either educational centers, teachers or volunteers. However, NHRF is open to expanding the programs throughout the entire state of Hawaii to the extent practicable.

Service Summary and Outcomes

The applicant, Natural Healing Research Foundation, a Hawaii nonprofit corporation, hereby submits the following service summary, desired outcomes and measures of effectiveness:

1. Scope of Work, Tasks and Responsibilities.

- a. Exercise Classes. NHRF intends to hold qi gong and natural healing classes for seniors and residents on a bi-weekly or more frequent basis, depending on funding, at its Qi Center in Kaneohe. NHRF also intends to hold classes for seniors on a weekly or more frequent basis at various senior housing projects on Kauai and Oahu. NHRF's goal is to serve and educate 200-300 seniors and other residents on a regular basis with these classes.
- b. Nutrition and Allergy/Asthma Prevention Classes. NHRF intends to hold at least 2 nutrition and allergy/asthma prevention classes per year (one in the winter and one in the summer) on each of the islands of Oahu and Kauai, serving 200-300 residents per class on Oahu and 50-100 residents on Kauai. Depending on the availability of funding, these classes can be expanded to other islands.
- c. Research. NHRF intends to engage up to 10 physicians or similarly trained health care professionals to conduct research on the efficacy of the pyramid seat plate in addressing ailments suffered by office workers, the elderly, students and others who spend long hours sitting. Initial studies indicate that the pyramid seat, a simple device which is placed on most any seat, can aid in the prevention, alleviation and improvement of adverse health conditions often caused by sedentary diseases involving areas of the waist and legs, shoulder pain, issues with male and female reproductive systems and urinary system problems. Those with anal and colorectal disease, cardiovascular disease, depression, stress and other emotional diseases have also experienced many positive effects from use of the pyramid seat plate. NHRF would like to acquire and distribute pyramid seats to the medical professionals and have them conduct scientific studies and tests, collect data and publish studies to confirm the effectiveness of the seat plate so that it can be more widely accepted and used as a simple tool to improve health and wellness for a large segment of our population.

2. Projected Annual Timeline for Accomplishing Results and Outcomes.

- a. Exercise Classes. If full funding is received, NHRF will hold approximately 300 classes on Oahu and 50 classes on Kauai and serve and educate seniors and other residents on a regular basis with these classes.

- b. Nutrition and Allergy/Asthma Prevention Classes. If full funding is received, NHRF will hold at least 2 nutrition and allergy/asthma prevention classes per year (one in the winter and one in the summer) on Oahu, serving 200-300 residents per class. Depending on the availability of funding, these classes can be expanded to other islands.
- c. Research. If full funding is received, NHRF will engage up to 10 physicians or similarly trained health care professionals to conduct research on the efficacy of the pyramid seat plate in addressing sedentary-related ailments, and to publish their findings within the first year.

3. Quality Assurance and Evaluation Plans.

- a. Exercise Classes. NHRF has over a dozen trained and experienced teachers to teach the qi going and natural healing exercise classes to assure quality teaching and education for students and practitioners. Verbal and written feedback is requested and encouraged from students on a regular basis for evaluation purposes, and Master Hong visits and monitors the classes typically on a monthly basis to confirm proper exercises and techniques are being taught.
- b. Nutrition and Allergy/Asthma Prevention Classes. Master Hong, who is a grandmaster of traditional Chinese medicine, as well as trained in western medicine, oversees and teaches each of these classes to assure quality and effectiveness. Classes are evaluated by student and audience feedback, as well as by NHRF's volunteer staff and teachers.
- c. Research. Master Hong will work with each medical professional to plan a specific area of research to focus on to test and collect data on the efficacy of the pyramid seat plate in addressing sedentary-related ailments. The professionals will be required to publish their findings, and both NHRF and the public will have a chance to evaluate the results.

4. Measures of Effectiveness to be Reported to State. For the exercise and nutrition/allergy classes, on an annual basis, NHRF will prepare and submit a written report on effectiveness based on the numbers of classes held, and specific teacher and student feedback on the effectiveness of the classes on improving health conditions. For the research on the pyramid seat, NHRF will gather, summarize and submit to the state the written findings from the studies conducted by the medical professionals as well as recommendations on any further studies or testing needed.

The applicant, Natural Healing Research Foundation, a Hawaii nonprofit corporation, hereby submits the following experience and capability information related to its grant request:

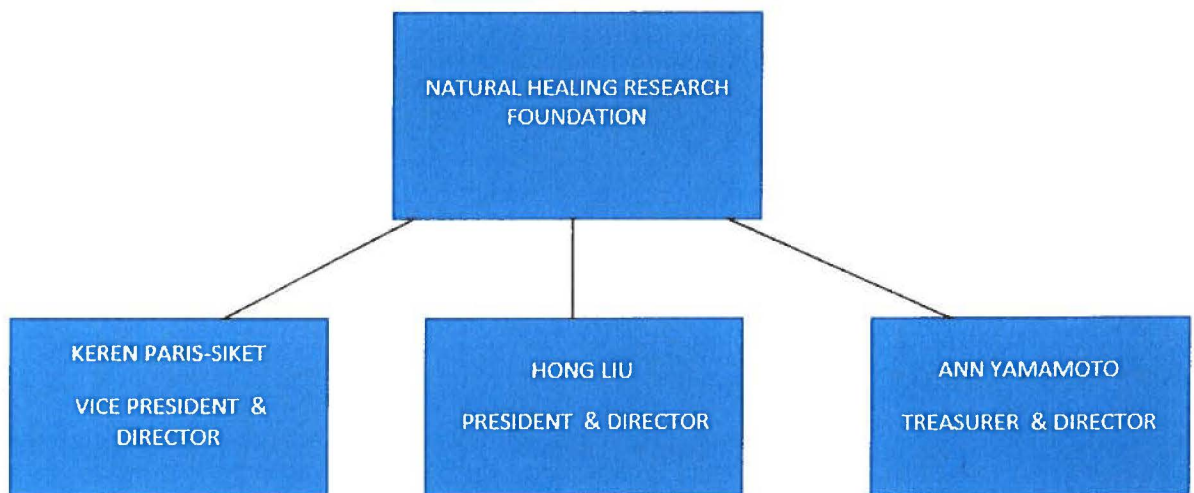
1. Necessary Skills and Experience. NHRF is a Hawaii nonprofit organization whose purpose is advancing research and education in the practice of natural healing remedies for the major diseases and other adverse health conditions facing humanity. NHRF was founded in 2004 and is headed by Grandmaster Hong Liu, a world-renowned practitioner of traditional Chinese healing as well as a Chinese medical doctor with over 40 years of experience in the field. The conventional medical community is just beginning to explore the synergy between Eastern and Western medicine. Grandmaster Hong has spent a lifetime combining the two systems in a complementary way, both as a western trained, research-based physician, and as a master of natural healing, the highest attainable standing in the centuries-old Chinese healing tradition. Master Hong's unique awareness of how to enhance healing by integrating both systems has been well recognized. For his pioneering cancer research, humanitarian healing programs, community outreach and tireless devotion to teaching people how to heal themselves, he has been proclaimed a Living Treasure in his homeland of China, and in the state of Hawai'i. Through his efforts, NHRF has established Qi Centers on the islands of Oahu and Kauai. The Qi Centers are dedicated to providing health outreach programs to the community, such as health and exercise classes for seniors, native Hawaiians and children, allergy and asthma prevention clinics, drug addiction treatments and numerous other humanitarian programs. It is a model that Master Hong envisions for communities throughout Hawaii and beyond
2. Facilities. NHRF currently has a Qi Center facility at 46-032 Kamehameha Highway in Kaneohe, Hawaii where it conducts weekly qi gong and natural healing exercise classes for seniors and others. NHRF also conducts weekly classes in certain affordable housing projects on Oahu and Kauai for seniors. NHRF holds its biannual winter and summer immunity events at public schools on Oahu and Kauai, and on occasion will rent a conference room space at the Ala Moana Hotel or other locations as needed for special events. Funding is needed to continue access to the Qi Center facility in Kaneohe and for special events.

Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

1. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training. NHRF has approximately 5-10 teachers for its qi gong and natural healing exercise classes all of whom have been personally trained and taught by Master Hong or one of his experienced apprentices and are teacher certified. Master Hong personally teaches and supervises all biannual immunity programs and other specialty classes and events.

3. Compensation. All directors and officers of NHRF are unpaid volunteers. Exercise class teachers are paid a small stipend of \$25-50 per class, subject to available funds. Currently, there are not sufficient funds to pay teachers and most are volunteering their time and service.
