A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO GOVERNMENT WEBSITES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

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1	SECTION 1. Chapter 27, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
2	by adding a new section to part VII to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	"§27- State websites; translation to Hawaiian language.
5	(a) Beginning January 1, 2024, all state websites created or
6	updated between December 31, 2019, and January 1, 2023, shall
7	include an option for the English language portions of the
8	website to be translated into the Hawaiian language.
9	(b) Beginning January 1, 2024, all state websites, created
10	or updated on or after January 1, 2023, within one year of
11	creation or update, shall include an option for the English
12	language portions of the website to be translated into the
13	Hawaiian language.
14	(c) Pursuant to section 225M- , the office of planning
15	shall act as the lead agency to coordinate the translation of
16	state websites.



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1	(d) This section shall not apply to any of the following
2	hat may be posted or distributed on a state website:
3	(1) Reports, including reports submitted pursuant to any
4	law or resolution;
5	(2) Statutes, rules, policies, resolutions, or anything
6	with the force and effect of law;
7	(3) Any document with an international standard book
8	number; and
9	(4) Information or documents submitted by a member of the
10	public, including:
11	(A) Documents filed in any court of law or
12	administrative hearing; and
13	(B) Testimony or public comment."
14	SECTION 2. Chapter 46, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
15	by adding a new section to part I to be appropriately designated
16	and to read as follows:
17	" <u>§46-</u> County websites; translation to Hawaiian language.
18	(a) Beginning January 1, 2024, all county websites created or
19	updated between December 31, 2019, and January 1, 2023, shall
20	include an option for the English language portions of the
21	website to be translated into the Hawaiian language.



1	(b)	Beginning January 1, 2024, all county websites,
2	created o	r updated on or after January 1, 2023, within one year
3	<u>of creati</u>	on or update, shall include an option for the English
4	language	portions of the website to be translated into the
5	Hawaiian	language.
6	(c)	Each county shall designate an agency to assist the
7	office of	planning in coordinating the translation of the
8	county's	websites.
9	(d)	This section shall not apply to any of the following
10	that may	be posted or distributed on a county website:
11	(1)	Reports, including reports submitted pursuant to any
12		law or resolution;
13	(2)	Ordinances or anything with the force and effect of
14		law;
15	(3)	Any document with an international standard book
16		number; and
17	(4)	Information or documents submitted by a member of the
18		public, including:
19		(A) Documents filed in any court of law or
20		administrative hearing; and
21		(B) <u>Testimony or public comment.</u> "



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1	SECTION 3. Chapter 225M, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	" <u>§225M-</u> State and county websites; translation to
5	Hawaiian. (a) The office of planning shall act as the lead
6	agency to coordinate the translation of state and county
7	websites into the Hawaiian language.
8	(b) The office of planning may consult with the chief
9	information officer, the university of Hawaii, the office of
10	Hawaiian affairs, the access Hawaii committee, and the
11	appropriate county officials in coordinating the translation of
12	a state or county website into the Hawaiian language."
13	SECTION 4. Section 225M-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
15	"(b) The office of planning shall gather, analyze, and
16	provide information to the governor to assist in the overall
17	analysis and formulation of state policies and strategies to
18	provide central direction and cohesion in the allocation of
19	resources and effectuation of state activities and programs and
20	effectively address current or emerging issues and



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1	opportuni	ties. More specifically, the office shall engage in					
2	the following activities:						
3	(1)	State comprehensive planning and program coordination.					
4		Formulating and articulating comprehensive statewide					
5		goals, objectives, policies, and priorities, and					
6		coordinating their implementation through the					
7		statewide planning system established in part II of					
8		chapter 226;					
9	(2)	Strategic planning. Identifying and analyzing					
10		significant issues, problems, and opportunities					
11		confronting the State, and formulating strategies and					
12		alternative courses of action in response to					
13		identified problems and opportunities by:					
14		(A) Providing in-depth policy research, analysis, and					
15		recommendations on existing or potential areas of					
16		critical state concern;					
17		(B) Examining and evaluating the effectiveness of					
18		state programs in implementing state policies and					
19		priorities;					



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1		(C)	Monitoring through surveys, environmental
2			scanning, and other techniquescurrent social,
3			economic, and physical conditions and trends; and
4		(D)	Developing, in collaboration with affected public
5			or private agencies and organizations,
6			implementation plans and schedules and, where
7			appropriate, assisting in the mobilization of
8			resources to meet identified needs;
9	(3)	Plan	ning coordination and cooperation. Facilitating
10		coor	dinated and cooperative planning and policy
11		deve	lopment and implementation activities among state
12		agen	cies and between the state, county, and federal
13		gove	rnments, by:
14		(A)	Reviewing, assessing, and coordinating, as
15			necessary, major plans, programs, projects, and
16			regulatory activities existing or proposed by
17			state and county agencies;
18		(B)	Formulating mechanisms to simplify, streamline,
19			or coordinate interagency development and
20			regulatory processes; and



1		(C)	Recognizing the presence of federal defense and
2			security forces and agencies in the State as
3			important state concerns;
4	(4)	State	ewide planning and geographic information system.
5		Coll	ecting, integrating, analyzing, maintaining, and
6		diss	eminating various forms of data and information,
7		incl	uding geospatial data and information, to further
8		effe	ctive state planning, policy analysis and
9	-	deve	lopment, and delivery of government services by:
10		(A)	Collecting, assembling, organizing, evaluating,
11			and classifying existing geospatial and non-
12			geospatial data and performing necessary basic
13			research, conversions, and integration to provide
14			a common database for governmental planning and
15			geospatial analyses by state agencies;
16		(B)	Planning, coordinating, and maintaining a
17			comprehensive, shared statewide planning and
18			geographic information system and associated
19			geospatial database. The office shall be the
20			lead agency responsible for coordinating the
21			maintenance of the multi-agency, statewide



1 planning and geographic information system and 2 coordinating, collecting, integrating, and disseminating geospatial data sets that are used 3 to support a variety of state agency applications 4 5 and other spatial data analyses to enhance 6 decision-making. The office shall promote and 7 encourage free and open data sharing among and 8 between all government agencies. To ensure the 9 maintenance of a comprehensive, accurate, up-to-10 date geospatial data resource that can be drawn 11 upon for decision-making related to essential 12 public policy issues such as land use planning, 13 resource management, homeland security, and the overall health, safety, and well-being of 14 15 Hawaii's citizens, and to avoid redundant data development efforts, state agencies shall provide 16 17 to the shared system either their respective geospatial databases or, at a minimum, especially 18 19 in cases of secure or confidential data sets that 20 cannot be shared or must be restricted, metadata 21 describing existing geospatial data. In cases



1		where agencies provide restricted data, the
2		office of planning shall ensure the security of
3		that data; and
4		(C) Maintaining a centralized depository of state and
5		national planning references;
6	(5)	Land use planning. Developing and presenting the
7		position of the State in all boundary change petitions
8		and proceedings before the land use commission,
9		assisting state agencies in the development and
10		submittal of petitions for land use district boundary
11		amendments, and conducting periodic reviews of the
12		classification and districting of all lands in the
13		State, as specified in chapter 205;
14	(6)	Coastal and ocean policy management. Carrying out the
15		lead agency responsibilities for the Hawaii coastal
16		zone management program, as specified in chapter 205A.
17		Also, developing and maintaining an ocean and coastal
18		resources information, planning, and management system
19		further developing and coordinating implementation of
20		the ocean resources management plan, and formulating



1		ocean policies with respect to the exclusive economic		
2		zone, coral reefs, and national marine sanctuaries;		
3	(7)	Regional planning and studies. Conducting plans and		
4		studies to determine:		
5		(A) The capability of various regions within the		
6		State to support projected increases in both		
7		resident populations and visitors;		
8		(B) The potential physical, social, economic, and		
9		environmental impact on these regions resulting		
10		from increases in both resident populations and		
11		visitors;		
12		(C) The maximum annual visitor carrying capacity for		
13		the State by region, county, and island; and		
14		(D) The appropriate guidance and management of		
15		selected regions and areas of statewide critical		
16		concern.		
17		The studies in subparagraphs (A) to (C) shall be		
18		conducted at appropriate intervals, but not less than		
19		once every five years;		
20	(8)	Regional, national, and international planning.		
21		Participating in and ensuring that state plans,		



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1		policies, and objectives are consistent, to the extent			
2		practicable, with regional, national, and			
3		international planning efforts;			
4	(9)	Climate adaptation planning. Conducting plans and			
5		studies and preparing reports as follows:			
6.		(A) Develop, monitor, and evaluate strategic climate			
7		adaptation plans and actionable policy			
8		recommendations for the State and counties			
9		addressing expected statewide climate change			
10		impacts identified under Act 286, Session Laws of			
11		Hawaii 2012, through the year 2050;			
12		(B) Provide planning and policy guidance and			
13		assistance to state and county agencies regarding			
14		climate change; and			
15		(C) Publish its findings, recommendations, and			
16		progress reports on actions taken no later than			
17		December 31, 2017, and its annual report to the			
18		governor and the legislature thereafter; [and]			
19	(10)	Smart growth and transit-oriented development. Acting			
20		as the lead agency to coordinate and advance smart			



1	grow	th and transit-oriented development planning
2	with	in the State as follows:
3	(A)	Identify transit-oriented development
4		opportunities shared between state and county
5		agencies, including relevant initiatives such as
6		the department of health's healthy Hawaii
7		initiative and the Hawaii clean energy
8		initiative;
9	(B)	Refine the definition of "transit-oriented
10		development" in the context of Hawaii, while
11		recognizing the potential for smart growth
12		development patterns in all locations;
13	(C)	Clarify state goals for transit-oriented
14		development and smart growth that support the
15		principles of the Hawaii State Planning Act by
16		preserving non-urbanized land, improving worker
17		access to jobs, and reducing fuel consumption;
18	(D)	Target transit-oriented development areas for
19		significant increase in affordable housing and
20		rental units;

1	(E)	Conduct outreach to state agencies to help
2		educate state employees about the ways they can
3		support and benefit from transit-oriented
4		development and the State's smart growth goals;
5	(F)	Publicize coordinated state efforts that support
6		smart growth, walkable neighborhoods, and
7		transit-oriented development;
8	(G)	Review state land use decision-making processes
9		to identify ways to make transit-oriented
10		development a higher priority and facilitate
11		better and more proactive leadership in creating
12		walkable communities and employment districts,
13		even if transit will only be provided at a later
14		date; and
15	(H)	Approve all state agencies' development plans for
16		parcels along the rail transit corridor. For the
17		purposes of this subparagraph, "development
18		plans" means conceptual land use plans that
19		identify the location and planned uses within a
20		defined area[-]; and



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1 State and county website translation into the Hawaiian (11)2 language. Acting as the lead agency to coordinate the 3 translation of state and county websites into the 4 Hawaiian language." 5 SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the 7 8 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 9 2020-2021 for the translation of state websites into the 10 Hawaiian language. The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of 11 planning for the purposes of this Act. 12 13 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 14 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the 15 16 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 17 2020-2021 as a grant-in-aid to the counties for the translation 18 of county websites into the Hawaiian language. 19 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of 20 planning for the purposes of this Act.

SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.





Report Title: Office of Planning; State and County Websites; Translation; 'Ōlelo Hawai'i; Appropriations

Description:

Requires that state and county websites be translated into the Hawaiian language. Appoints the Office of Planning to coordinate the translation. Appropriates funds. (HB1328 HD1)

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
