#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO VOTER REGISTRATION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that voter turnout in the 2 State remains low and continues to decline. In 2016, Hawaii had 3 the lowest voter turnout in the United States. Only 52.6 per 4 cent of registered Hawaii voters cast ballots in the 2018 5 general election. This represents a sharp decline in voter 6 turnout over the years, as approximately ninety-three per cent of registered voters cast ballots in the State's first 7 8 gubernatorial election in 1959.

9 Additionally, the State has a historically low rate of 10 registering voters. According to a 2016 estimate from the 11 United States Census Bureau, Hawaii had the lowest percentage of 12 registered voters in the country. In 2016, only 49.8 per cent 13 of qualified voters were registered to vote, well below the 14 national average of 64.2 per cent. Therefore, of the 1,111,117 15 people in Hawaii who were gualified to vote in the 2016 16 election, 557,780 were not registered to vote.



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1 The legislature also finds that states with both the 2 highest voter registration rate and highest voter turnout have 3 adopted automatic voter registration programs. Massachusetts, 4 Oregon, and Colorado have all adopted automatic voter 5 registration programs, and each of those states' voter 6 registration rates are some of the highest in the nation, at 7 68.1 per cent, 67.4 per cent, and 68.2 per cent, respectively. 8 Moreover, Massachusetts had the eighth highest voter turnout in 9 the 2016 election at 68.1 per cent, and Oregon had the highest 10 at 80.33 per cent.

11 The legislature further finds that voting is the 12 cornerstone of American democracy and, while other states have 13 been in the news for suppressing voters, Hawaii, by 14 automatically registering qualified voters, can convey a message 15 that voting is an unquestioned fundamental right that should be 16 exercised.

Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to establish asystem for automatic voter registration in the State.

SECTION 2. Chapter 11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended
by adding a new section to part II to be appropriately
designated and to read as follows:



1	" <u>§11-</u> Automatic voter registration; opt-out. (a)
2	Beginning January 1, 2020, any person who is eligible to vote
3	under this part and properly completes and submits an
4	application for a new or renewed motor vehicle driver's license,
5	provisional license, instruction permit, limited purpose
6	driver's license, limited purpose provisional driver's license,
7	limited purpose instruction permit, or identification card shall
8	automatically be registered to vote as provided in subsection
9	<u>(d)</u> .
10	(b) The examiner of drivers of each county shall use
11	application forms for an original, duplicate, or change of
12	address driver's license, provisional license, instruction
13	permit, limited purpose driver's license, limited purpose
14	provisional driver's license, limited purpose instruction
15	permit, or identification card as voter registration
16	applications. The forms shall contain spaces for all
17	information required by section 11-15. Within five calendar
18	days of collection, the examiner of drivers of each county shall
19	electronically transmit the voter registration information to
20	the clerk of the county in which the applicant resides, election
21	officials, and the statewide voter registration system pursuant



1	to subsection (e); provided that the examiner of drivers shall
2	not transmit any information necessary to register an applicant
3	as a voter if that applicant affirmatively declines to be
4	registered to vote.
5	(c) The clerk of each county shall determine whether the
6	applicant is currently registered in the general county
7	register. If the applicant is not currently registered, the
8	clerk shall determine whether the applicant is eighteen years of
9	age or older and a citizen of the United States. If the
10	applicant is less than eighteen years of age, the clerk shall
11	defer the applicant until the applicant reaches eighteen years
12	of age to determine whether the applicant is eligible to vote.
13	(d) Upon determination that the applicant is eligible to
14	vote and not currently registered, the county clerk shall
15	provide written notification to the applicant of the process to
16	opt-out of the automatic voter registration; provided that if
17	the applicant does not opt out of registration within twenty-one
18	calendar days, the clerk shall assign a transaction number to
19	the registration in a manner that is substantially similar to
20	the numbering of affidavits as required by section 11-15(c) and



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1	register the name of the voter in the general county register as
2	provided in section 11-14.
3	(e) Databases maintained or operated by the counties or
4	the department of transportation containing driver's license,
5	provisional license, instruction permit, or identification card
6	information, including any documents or images, shall be
7	directly accessible and provided electronically to election
8	officials and the statewide voter registration system to allow
9	for the timely processing of voter registration applications,
10	ensure the integrity of the voter registration rolls, and for
11	any other government purpose, as determined by the director of
12	transportation, and upon request by the chief election officer
13	to the director of transportation for the electronic
14	transmission of the information; provided that the chief
15	election officer shall establish and implement an information
16	privacy policy that:
17	(1) Specifies each class of internal users who shall have
18	authorized access to the statewide voter registration
19	system, specifies for each class the permissions and
20	levels of access to be granted, and sets forth other



1		safeguards to protect the privacy of the information
2		on the statewide voter registration system;
3	(2)	Prohibits any disclosure or transmission of any
4		information not necessary to voter registration,
5		including credit card information received in the
6		course of the underlying transaction with the examiner
7		of drivers of each county;
8	(3)	Protects against public disclosure of full or partial
9		social security numbers, driver's license numbers, and
10		signatures;
11	(4)	Prohibits public disclosure of an individual's
12		decision to not register to vote;
13	(5)	Prohibits the examiner of drivers of each county from
14		transmitting to county clerks information other than
15		that required for voter registration or specified
16		information relevant to the administration of
17		elections;
18	(6)	Prohibits agencies from sharing individuals'
19		citizenship status or information regarding country of
20		origin with any federal agency; and

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1	(7)	Prohibits the disclosure of information relating to
2		persons eligible for confidentiality of record
3		information pursuant to section 11-14.5 and informs
4		individuals of the confidentiality protections
5		available under section 11-14.5."
6	SECT	ION 3. Chapter 286, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended b	y adding a new section to part VI to be appropriately
8	designate	d and to read as follows:
9	" <u>§28</u>	6-A Automatic voter registration; driver licensing;
10	opt-out.	(a) The examiner of drivers of each county shall
11	electroni	cally transmit information that is required by section
12	<u>11- (b)</u>	to the clerk of the county in which the applicant
13	resides f	or all qualified applicants who properly complete and
14	<u>submit an</u>	application for a new or renewed motor vehicle
15	driver's	license, provisional license, instruction permit,

17	driver's	license, or limited purpose instruction permit.
18	(b)	The clerk of the county in which the qualified
19	applicant	resides shall provide written notification to the
20	applicant	of the process to opt out of the automatic voter

2	one calendar days to opt out of automatic voter registration

4	(c) For the purposes of this section, "qualified
5	applicant" means a person who qualifies to register as a voter

7	SECTION 4. Chapter 286, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8	amended by adding a new section to part XVI to be appropriately
9	designated and to read as follows:
10	" <u>§286-B</u> Automatic voter registration; identification card;
11	opt-out. (a) The examiner of drivers of each county shall
12	electronically transmit information that is required by section
13	11- (b) to the clerk of the county in which the applicant
14	resides for all qualified applicants who properly complete and
15	submit an application for an identification card pursuant to
16	section 286-303.
17	(b) The clerk of the county in which the qualified
18	applicant resides shall provide written notification to the
19	applicant of the process to opt out of the automatic voter
20	registration; provided that, upon receipt of notification from
21	the respective clerk, the qualified applicant shall have twenty-



1 one calendar days to opt out of automatic voter registration 2 pursuant to section 11- (d). 3 (c) For the purposes of this section, "qualified 4 applicant" means a person who qualifies to register as a voter 5 pursuant to section 11-15." 6 SECTION 5. Section 11-15, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 7 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows: 8 "(C) The applicant shall then affix the applicant's 9 signature to the affidavit. In the case where an applicant is 10 unable to write for the reason of illiteracy, blindness, or 11 other physical disability, the applicant's mark shall be 12 witnessed by another person who shall sign the affidavit in the 13 space provided. A voter having once been registered shall not 14 be required to register again for any succeeding election, 15 except as provided in this chapter. Affidavits approved by the 16 clerk shall thereupon be numbered appropriately, filed by the 17 clerk, and kept available for election or government purposes in accordance with procedures established by section 11-97. 18 19 Approved voter registration transactions conducted through the 20 online voter registration system established pursuant to section 21 11-15.3 and automatic voter registration established pursuant to



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1 section 11- shall be assigned a transaction number in a 2 manner that is substantially similar to the numbering of 3 affidavits." 4 SECTION 6. Section 286-108, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 6 "(a) Except as provided in section 286-107.5(a), the 7 examiner of drivers shall examine every applicant for a driver's 8 license, except as otherwise provided in this part. The 9 examination shall include a test of: 10 The applicant's eyesight and any further physical (1)11 examination that the examiner of drivers finds 12 necessary to determine the applicant's fitness to 13 operate a motor vehicle safely upon the highways; 14 (2) The applicant's ability to understand highway signs 15 regulating, warning, and directing traffic; 16 (3) The applicant's knowledge of the rules of the road 17 based on the traffic laws of the State and the traffic 18 ordinances of the county where the applicant resides 19 or intends to operate a motor vehicle; provided that 20 the examination shall specifically test the



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1		applicant's knowledge of the provisions of section
2		291C-121.5 and section 291C-137; and
3	(4)	The actual demonstration of ability to exercise
4		ordinary and reasonable control in the operation of a
5	,	motor vehicle.
6	The exami	nations shall be appropriate to the operation of the
7	category	of motor vehicle for which the applicant seeks to be
8	licensed	and shall be conducted as required by the director.
9	The	examiner of drivers shall require every applicant to
10	comply wi	th section 286-102.5.
11	The	examiner of drivers may waive the actual demonstration
12	of abilit	y to operate a motorcycle or motor scooter for any
13	person wh	o furnishes evidence, to the satisfaction of the
14	examiner	of drivers, that the person has completed the
15	motorcycl	e education course approved by the director in
16	accordanc	e with section 431:10G-104.
17	[ <del>At</del>	the time of examination, an application for voter
18	<del>registrat</del>	ion by mail shall be made available to every applicant
19	<del>for a dri</del>	ver's license.]



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For the purposes of this section, the term "applicant" does
 not include any person reactivating a license under section
 286-107.5(a)."

4 SECTION 7. Section 286-111, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:

6 "(d) Every application shall state the full name, date of birth, sex, occupation, veteran status if applicable (including 7 8 veterans of the Korean conflict and persons who served in the 9 armed forces of the Republic of Korea, who fought under the 10 command of the United Nations led by the United States, during 11 the Korean conflict and are currently United States citizens) 12 and desired by the applicant, social security number if the 13 applicant is eligible for a social security number, the 14 residence address, and business address, if any, of the 15 applicant, any information required for an application to 16 register to vote pursuant to section 11-15, shall briefly 17 describe the applicant, and shall state whether the applicant 18 has theretofore been licensed as a driver, and, if so, when and in what state or country, and whether any such license has ever 19 20 been suspended or revoked, or whether an application has ever



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1 been refused, and if so, the date of and reason for the 2 suspension, revocation, or refusal."

3 SECTION 8. Section 286-303, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4 amended to read as follows:

5 "§286-303 Application for identification card. (a) 6 Application for the identification card shall be made in person 7 by any adult or minor. The minimum age for minors to obtain an 8 identification card shall be ten years of age. In the case of a 9 minor under the age of fourteen years, the application shall be 10 made on the minor's behalf by the parent, or by another 11 individual in loco parentis of the minor who can provide proof 12 of guardianship. In the case of an incompetent individual, the 13 application shall be made by the individual having the custody 14 or control of or maintaining the incompetent individual.

(b) Application for renewal of an identification card issued after November 1, 1998, for an individual eighty years of age or older may be done by mailing in a completed application and fee, if there is no change in name and citizenship status. The director shall adopt rules to allow for renewal by mail for individuals with physical or intellectual disabilities for whom application in person presents a serious burden. For an



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1 individual who has a letter from a licensed primary care 2 provider certifying that a severe disability causes the individual to be homebound, the director shall adopt rules 3 4 allowing for application for renewal of an identification card 5 under this section by means other than in-person appearance. 6 (c) Every application for an identification card or 7 duplicate of an identification card shall be made on a form 8 developed by the director and furnished by the examiner of 9 drivers, signed by the applicant, and signed by the applicant's 10 parent or guardian if the applicant is under eighteen years of 11 age. The application shall contain the following information: 12 (1)Name and complete address, including the number and 13 street name, of the applicant's permanent residence; 14 The applicant's occupation and any pertinent data (2) 15 relating thereto; 16 (3) The applicant's citizenship status; (4) 17 The applicant's veteran status if applicable and 18 desired by the applicant; 19 (5) The applicant's date and place of birth;



1	(6)	General description of the applicant, including the
2		applicant's gender, height, weight, hair color, and
3		eye color;
4	(7)	The applicant's left and right index fingerprints or,
5		if clear impressions cannot be obtained, other
6		identifying imprints as specified by rules of the
7		director;
8	(8)	The social security number of the applicant; [and]
9	(9)	A digitized frontal photograph of the applicant's full
10		face[-]; and
11	(10)	Any additional information required for an application
12		to register to vote pursuant to section 11-15.
13	Each appl	icant shall present documentary evidence as required by
14	the exami	ner of drivers of the applicant's age and identity, and
15	the appli	cant shall swear or affirm that all information given
16	is true a	nd correct.
17	(d)	The application also shall state whether the applicant
18	has an ad	vance health-care directive. If the applicant has an
19	advance h	ealth-care directive, the identification card shall
20	bear the	designation "AHCD".



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1	[ <del>(e) The examiner of drivers, in accordance with section</del>
2	11-15, at the time of application, shall-make available an
3	application for voter registration to every applicant for an
4	identification card who is eligible to register to vote.]
5	[ <del>(f)</del> ] <u>(e)</u> The examiner of drivers shall maintain a
6	suitable, indexed record of all applications.
7	$\left[\frac{g}{g}\right]$ (f) For the purpose of this section, "AHCD", which
8	stands for "advance health-care directive", means an individual
9	instruction in writing, a living will, or a durable power of
10	attorney for health care decisions."
11	SECTION 9. Section 286-311, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
12	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
13	"(a) [All] Except as provided in sections 286-A and 286-B,
14	information and records acquired by the examiner of drivers
15	under this part shall be confidential. All information and
16	records shall be maintained in an appropriate form and in an
17	appropriate office in the custody and under the control of the
18	examiner. The information shall be available only to authorized
19	individuals under such restrictions as the director shall
20	prescribe. The examiner may dispose of any application or
21	identification card, or information or record relating to the



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application or identification card, which does not include a
 social security number, without regard to chapter 94, whenever,
 in the examiner's discretion, retention of the information or
 record is no longer required or practicable."

5 SECTION 10. There is appropriated out of the general 6 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 7 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the 8 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 9 2020-2021 for the electronic transmission, receipt, and 10 processing of voter registration information pursuant to this 11 Act.

12 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department13 of transportation for the purposes of this Act.

SECTION 11. In codifying the new sections added by sections 3 and 4 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating the new sections in this Act.

18 SECTION 12. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed19 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.



SECTION 13. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2020;
 provided that section 10 shall take effect on July 1, 2019.

Automatic Voter Registration; Driver's License; Identification Card; Opt-out; Appropriations

#### Description:

Beginning on 1/1/2020, requires that any person who is eligible to vote and applies for a new or renewed motor vehicle driver's license, provisional license, instruction permit, limited purpose driver's license, limited purpose provisional driver's license, limited purpose instruction permit, or identification card shall be automatically registered to vote if that person is not already registered to vote; provided that, upon receipt of notification from the respective county clerk, the applicant shall have 21 calendar days to opt out of automatic voter registration. Appropriates funds.
