

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. Section 302A-1004, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

 "(a) The department shall implement a comprehensive system
 of educational accountability to motivate and support the
- 5 improved performance of students and the education system. This
 6 accountability system shall:
- 7 (1) Include student accountability; school or collective
 8 accountability; individual professional accountability
 9 for teachers, principals, and other employees; and
 10 public accounting to parents, community members,
 11 businesses, higher education, media, and political
 12 leadership;
- 13 (2) Link authority and resources to responsibility;
- 14 (3) Define clear roles for all parties and lines of
 15 responsibility and mutual obligation and develop a
 16 collaborative process with stakeholders, including

1		representatives of appropriate bargaining units,
2		parents, administration, and students;
3	(4)	Assess and track measures of academic achievement,
4		safety and well-being, and civic responsibility of
5		individual students at selected grade levels and
6		report trend data on these measures over time
7		annually;
8	(5)	Invoke a full and balanced set of appropriate
9	,	consequences for observed performance, including
10		rewards and recognition for those schools that meet or
11		exceed their goals, assistance to those that fall
12		short, and sanctions for those that, given adequate
13		assistance and ample time, continue to fail to meet
14		goals;
15	(6)	Involve an annual statewide assessment program that
16		provides a report card containing trend data on
17		school, school complex, and system performance at

10		special education services who are in general
11		education classes for eighty per cent or more of
12		the school day;
13	(D)	Increase in the percentage of third grade
14		students reading at, near, or above grade-level
15		expectation;
16	(E)	Increase in the percentage of ninth grade
17		students who are promoted to the tenth grade on
18		time;

20		achievement targets on statewide assessments in

1		English language arts, literacy, mathematics, and

3	<u>(G)</u>	Reduction in the achievement gap between high-

4	(7)	Require that teachers and administrators engage in the
5		continuous professional growth and development that
6		ensure their currency with respect to disciplinary
7		content, leadership skill, knowledge, or pedagogical
8		skill, as appropriate to their position. This
9		requirement may be established by the department in
10		terms of credit hours earned or their equivalent in
11		professional development activity certified by the
12		department as appropriate in focus and rigor;
13	(8)	Establish an explicit link between professional
14		evaluation results and individual accountability
15		through professional development of the knowledge,
16		skill, and professional behavior necessary to the
17		position, by requiring that results of the
18		professional evaluation be used by the department to
19		prescribe professional development focus and content,
20		as appropriate;

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1	(9)	Inclu	ide an annual statewide fiscal accountability
2		progr	cam, which includes a published report card that
3		conta	ains trend data on school, school complex, and
4		syste	emwide plans and results, including:
5		(A)	Amounts allocated;
6		(B)	Amounts expended;
7		(C)	Amounts carried over; and
8		(D)	Any significant changes to the budget, with an
9			explanation for the change;
10	(10)	Incl	de an evaluation of the effectiveness of complex
11		area	superintendents and principals in supporting:
12		(A)	Students' academic achievement, safety and well-
13			being, and civic responsibility; and
14		(B)	The satisfaction of stakeholders affected by the
15			work of the complex area superintendents and
16			principals, which may be measured by broadbased
17			surveys; and
18		(C)	Fiscal accountability."
19	SECT	ION 2	. Section 302A-1301, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	amended t	o rea	d ag followg.

1	"§302A-1301 School system financial accountability[-];
2	reports to legislature. (a) Beginning with the 1995-1997
3	fiscal biennium, the department's administrative expenditures
4	shall not exceed 6.5 per cent of the total department operating
5	budget, excluding expenditures for agencies administratively
6	attached to the department, unless approved by the legislature.
7	(b) Beginning with the 2019-2020 fiscal year, the
8	department's budget for each fiscal year shall allocate ninety-
9	four per cent of all moneys to be appropriated for the operating
10	budget of the department among the complex areas, excluding
11	moneys appropriated for the public library system and agencies
12	administratively attached to the department. The remaining
13	moneys shall be allocated to the department's administration.
14	(c) If a complex area fails to meet departmental minimum
15	benchmarks for any performance indicator listed in section
16	302A-1004(a)(6) for any fiscal year, the moneys allocated to the
17	complex area shall be reduced by five per cent in the next
18	fiscal year, and the moneys resulting from the penalty shall be
19	reallocated among complexes that meet the performance
20	indicators

1	[(b)] <u>(d)</u> Not less than [seventy] per cent of
2	[appropriations for the total budget of the department,
3	excluding debt service and capital improvement programs and
4	appropriations for agencies administratively attached to the
5	department, moneys allocated to a complex area shall be
6	expended by principals $[-]$ within the complex area.
7	(e) The department shall submit an annual report to the
8	legislature on the compliance with this section by the
9	department and each complex area no later than twenty days
10	before the convening of each regular session."
11	SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2019.

Report Title:

DOE; Complex Areas; Financial Accountability; Reports

Description:

Requires the Department of Education's budget to allocate 94% of all moneys to be appropriated for the operating budget of the Department among the complex areas, excluding moneys appropriated for the public library system and agencies administratively attached to the Department. Provides that if a complex area fails to meet performance benchmarks, its budget will be reduced by 5% in the next fiscal year. Requires annual reports to the legislature.

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
