A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STUDENT JOURNALISTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that states may enhance		
2	the protections guaranteed by the First Amendment of the United		
3	States Constitution through state laws and regulations. The		
4	legislature further finds that the Hawaii Student Free		
5	Expression Act will provide student journalists attending Hawaii		
6	public schools with additional protection against censorship.		
7	The purpose of this Act is to allow student journalists at		
8	public schools to exercise freedom of speech and freedom of the		
9	press in school-sponsored media.		
10	SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
11	amended by adding a new section to part II to be appropriately		
12	designated and to read as follows:		
13	"§302A- Hawaii Student Free Expression Act. (a) As		
14	used in this section:		
15	"School-sponsored media" means any material:		
16	(1) Prepared, written, published in print or online, or		
17	broadcast by a student journalist at a public school:		

1	(2)	Distributed or generally made available, either free			
2		of charge or for a fee, to members of the student			
3		body; or			
4	(3)	Prepared under the direction of a student media			
5		advisor,			
6	regardles	s of whether the material is supported financially by			
7	the publi	c school or by use of facilities of the public school			
8	or produc	ed in conjunction with a class in which the student is			
9	enrolled.	"School-sponsored media" does not include material			
10	intended for distribution or transmission solely in the				
11	classroom in which the material is produced.				
12	"Student journalist" means a public school student who				
13	determine	s, gathers, compiles, writes, edits, photographs,			
14	records,	or prepares information and advertising for			
15	dissemina	tion in school-sponsored media.			
16	"Student media advisor" means an individual employed,				
17	appointed	, or designated by a public school to supervise or			
18	provide i	nstruction relating to school-sponsored media.			
19	(b)	A student journalist shall be allowed to exercise			
20	freedom o	of speech and freedom of the press in school-sponsored			

1	1 media and shall not be discipling	ed for acting in a	ccordance with
2	this section.		
3	3 (c) Nothing in this section	n shall be constru	ed to prevent
4	4 a student media adviser from tea	ching professional	standards of
5	5 English and journalism to studen	t journalists or d	etermining

7	7 (d) Nothing in this section	n shall be constru	ed to
8	8 authorize or protect student exp	ression that:

10	(2) Constitutes an unwarra	nted invasion of p	rivacy;
11	11 (3) <u>Is obscene; or</u>		
12	(4) Incites students to cr	eate a clear and p	resent danger
13	of the commission of a	n unlawful act, th	e violation of
14	school or board polici	es, or the materia	1 and
15	substantial disruption	of the orderly op	eration of the
16	school.		
17	(e) There shall be no prior	r restraint of mat	erial prepared
18	for school-sponsored media excep	t insofar as it vi	olates this
19	9 section. School officials shall	have the burden o	f showing
20	20 justification without undue dela	y prior to a limit	ation of
21	21 student expression under this se	ction. If the pre	scribed time

1	for review elapses without a decision, the material prepared for		
2	school-sponsored media shall be considered authorized.		
3	(f) No publication or other expression of material by		
4	student journalists in the exercise of rights under this section		
5	shall be deemed to be an expression of the school, board, or		
6	department. No state agency, member of the board, officer of		
7	the department, or employee of any agency or the board shall be		
8	held responsible in any civil or criminal action for the		
9	publication or other expression of material by student		
10	journalists in the exercise of rights under this section.		
11	(g) A student media advisor shall not be dismissed,		
12	suspended, disciplined, reassigned, transferred, or otherwise		
13	retaliated against for:		
14	(1) Acting to protect a student journalist engaged in		
15	conduct protected under this section; or		
16	(2) Refusing to infringe on conduct that is protected by		
17	this section."		
18	SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.		

1 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2019.
