#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTRONIC SMOKING PRODUCTS.

#### **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that tobacco use is the 2 single most preventable cause of disease, disability, and death 3 in the United States. Tobacco use continues to be a problem in 4 Hawaii, causing approximately one thousand four hundred deaths 5 per year among adults. An estimated twenty-one thousand 6 children in Hawaii currently under the age of eighteen will 7 ultimately die prematurely from smoking. Tobacco use poses a 8 heavy burden on Hawaii's health care system and economy. Each 9 year, smoking costs approximately \$526,000,000 in direct health 10 care expenditures and \$387,300,000 in lost productivity in the 11 State.

12 The legislature further finds that tobacco products are 13 addictive and inherently dangerous, causing many different types 14 of cancer, heart disease, and other serious illnesses. Hawaii 15 has a substantial interest in reducing the number of individuals 16 of all ages who use tobacco products, and a particular interest



1 in protecting adolescents from tobacco dependence and the 2 illnesses and premature death associated with tobacco use. 3 The legislature additionally finds that electronic smoking 4 devices, also known as e-cigarettes, are battery-operated 5 products designed to deliver nicotine, flavor, and other 6 chemicals to the user by turning chemicals including highly 7 addictive nicotine into an aerosol that is inhaled by the user. 8 Consumers may choose from varying strengths of e-liquid nicotine 9 as well as liquids consisting of different flavors. 10 The electronic smoking device industry, including the 11 production of e-liquids, is growing rapidly. On December 18, 12 2018, the United States Surgeon General made the unprecedented 13 move of classifying the danger of youth usage of electronic 14 smoking devices as an epidemic. Since the Surgeon General first 15 issued a warning in 2016 about the dangers of these products, 16 data has shown historic rise in use by youth and young adults. 17 According to the 2016 report from the Surgeon General, 18 e-cigarette use amongst the nation's youth and young adults has 19 become a major public health concern. The Surgeon General's 20 report noted that e-cigarette use has increased considerably in 21 recent years, growing an astounding nine hundred per cent among



high school students from 2011 to 2015. In a 2018 study 1 2 conducted by the National Institute on Drug Abuse, the use of 3 electronic smoking devices by teens increased nationally from 4 27.8 to 37.3 in a twelve-month period. The increase translates 5 to 1.3 million more teens using electronic smoking devices in a 6 single year. E-cigarette use among youth and young adults is 7 also strongly associated with the use of other tobacco products, 8 including combustible tobacco products. Toxicologists have also 9 warned that e-liquids pose significant risks to public health, 10 particularly to children. According to the Surgeon General's 11 report, if the contents of refill cartridges or bottles are 12 consumed, ingestion of e-liquids containing nicotine can cause 13 acute toxicity and possibly death. The Surgeon General's report 14 also found that there are numerous policies and practices that 15 can be implemented at the state and local levels to address 16 electronic smoking device use among youth and young adults, 17 including preventing access to e-cigarettes by youth, 18 significant increases in tax and price of e-cigarettes, retail 19 licensure, and regulation of e-cigarette marketing.

20 The legislature additionally finds that the rapid growth of 21 the electronic smoking device industry, including retail



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businesses selling electronic smoking devices or e-liquids,
 necessitates further regulations to protect consumers, such as
 requiring retailers of e-liquids to obtain a retail tobacco
 permit.

5 The legislature notes that the federal Food and Drug 6 Administration recently finalized a rule that expands its 7 regulatory authority to all tobacco products, including 8 electronic smoking devices, cigars, and hookah and pipe tobacco. 9 However, the legislature also notes that there is currently no 10 state tobacco tax attached to e-liquid, even though electronic 11 smoking devices are now regulated as tobacco products. 12 Furthermore, tobacco products other than cigarettes are 13 currently taxed at a lower rate than cigarettes, even though 14 their use carries similar health risks. Research has shown that 15 increasing cigarette prices, such as through cigarette taxes, 16 tends to reduce the rate of smoking by adult and youth smokers. 17 However, the legislature is concerned that as the price of cigarettes increases, smokers may purchase less expensive 18 19 tobacco products, such as electronic smoking devices or 20 e-liquids.



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
1	Finally, the legislature concludes that there needs to be a
2	tax on e-liquids and taxing these products as other tobacco
3	products is the most equitable way to do so. Imposing a tax on
4	e-liquids will also encourage users of e-liquids to quit,
5	sustain cessation, prevent youth initiation, and reduce
6	consumption among those who continue to use them.
7	The purpose of this Act is to:
8	(1) Establish the offense of unlawful shipment of e-liquid
9	products;
10	(2) Include e-liquid within the definition of "tobacco
11	products", as used in the cigarette tax and tobacco
12	tax law, thereby:
13	(A) Subjecting e-liquid to the excise tax on tobacco
14	products;
15	(B) Requiring retailers of e-liquid to obtain a
16	retail tobacco permit to sell, possess, keep,
17	acquire, distribute, or transport e-liquid;
18	(C) Prohibit persons from engaging in the business of
19	a wholesaler or dealer of e-liquid without first
20	obtaining a license from the department of
21	taxation; and



1		(D) Applying other requirements of chapter 245,
2		Hawaii Revised Statutes;
3	(3)	Increase the license fee for persons engaged as a
4		wholesaler or dealer of cigarettes and tobacco
5		products;
6	(4)	Increase the retail tobacco permit fee for retailers
7		engaged in the retail sale of cigarettes and tobacco
8		products;
9	(5)	Fund health education and prevention programs about
10		the risks and dangers of the use of electronic smoking
11		devices for youth; and
12	(6)	Repeal various statutory provisions relating to
13		electronic smoking devices.
14	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 245, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended by	y adding a new section to be appropriately designated
16	and to rea	ad as follows:
17	" <u>§24</u>	5- Unlawful shipment of e-liquid products; penalty;
18	reports;	liability for unpaid taxes. (a) A person commits the
19	offense o	f unlawful shipment of e-liquid products if the person:
20	(1)	Is engaged in the business of selling e-liquid
21		products; and



1	(2)	Ships or causes to be shipped any e-liquid products to
2		a person or entity in this State that is not a
3		licensee under this chapter.
4	(b)	This section shall not apply to the shipment of
5	e-liquid	products if any of the following conditions is met:
6	(1)	The e-liquid products are exempt from taxes as
7		provided by section 245-3(b) or are otherwise exempt
8		from the applicability of this chapter as provided by
9		section 245-62; or
10	(2)	All applicable Hawaii taxes on the e-liquid products
11		are paid in accordance with the requirements of this
12		chapter.
13	(c)	Unlawful shipment of e-liquid products is a class C
14	felony if	the person or entity knowingly ships or causes to be
15	shipped e	-liquid products with a value of \$10,000 or more in
16	violation	of subsection (a).
17	(d)	Unlawful shipment of e-liquid products is a
18	misdemean	or if the person or entity knowingly ships or causes to
19	be shippe	d e-liquid products with a value of less than \$10,000.



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
1	(e) For the purposes of this section, a person is a
2	licensee if the person or entity's name appears on a list of
3	authorized licensees published by the department.
4	(f) Notwithstanding the existence of other remedies at
5	law, any person that purchases, uses, controls, or possesses any
6	e-liquid products for which the applicable taxes imposed under
7	title 14 have not been paid, shall be liable for the applicable
8	taxes, plus any penalty and interest as provided for by law.
9	(g) For the purpose of this section:
10	"E-liquid products" means e-liquid, electronic smoking
11	devices containing e-liquid, or component parts containing e-
12	liquid.
13	"Person" shall not be limited to individuals pursuant to
14	section 1-19."
15	SECTION 3. Section 245-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended as follows:
17	1. By adding three new definitions to be appropriately
18	inserted and to read:
19	""E-liquid" means any liquid or like substance, which may
20	or may not contain nicotine, that is designed or intended to be
21	used in an electronic smoking device, whether or not packaged in



1	a cartridge or other container. E-liquid shall not include
2	prescription drugs; medical cannabis or manufactured cannabis
3	products under chapter 329D; or medical devices used to
4	aerosolize, inhale, or ingest prescription drugs, including
5	manufactured cannabis products manufactured or distributed in
6	accordance with section 329D-10(a).
7	"Electronic smoking device" means any electronic product,
8	or part thereof, that can be used by a person to simulate
9	smoking in the delivery of nicotine or any other substance,
10	intended for human consumption, through inhalation of vapor or
11	aerosol from the product. Electronic smoking device includes
12	but is not limited to an electronic cigarette, electronic cigar,
13	electronic cigarillo, electronic pipe, electronic hookah, vape
14	pen or related product, and any cartridge or other component
15	part of the device or product.
16	"Smoke" or "smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning,
17	carrying, or possessing any lighted or heated tobacco product,
18	or similar substance intended for human consumption, including
19	the use of an electronic smoking device that creates an aerosol
20	or vapor, in any manner or in any form."



1	2. By amending the definition of "tobacco products" to
2	read:
3	""Tobacco products" means [ <del>tobacco</del> ] <u>:</u>
4	(1) <u>Tobacco</u> in any form, other than cigarettes or little
5	cigars[ <del>, that is prepared or intended for consumption</del>
6	or for personal use by humans, including large cigars
7	and any substitutes thereof other than cigarettes that
8	bear the semblance thereof, snuff, chewing or
9	smokeless tobacco, and smoking or pipe tobacco.]; or
10	(2) E-liquid,
11	that is intended for human consumption, or is likely to be
12	consumed, whether smoked, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved,
13	inhaled, or ingested by other means. Tobacco products includes
14	but is not limited to large cigars and any substitutes thereof
15	other than cigarettes that bear the semblance thereof, pipe
16	tobacco, chewing or smokeless tobacco, snuff, snus, e-liquid,
17	electronic smoking devices containing e-liquid, component parts
18	containing e-liquid, and related products."
19	SECTION 4. Section 245-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:



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1 "(b) The license shall be issued by the department upon 2 application therefor, in such form and manner as shall be 3 required by rule of the department, and the payment of a fee of 4  $[\frac{2}{2},\frac{50}{7}]$  \$250, and shall be renewable annually on July 1 for the 5 twelve months ending the succeeding June 30." 6 SECTION 5. Section 245-2.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 7 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows: 8 The retail tobacco permit shall be issued by the "(C) 9 department upon application by the retailer in the form and 10 manner prescribed by the department, and the payment of a fee of 11 [\$20.] \$50. Permits shall be valid for one year, from December 12 1 to November 30, and renewable annually. Whenever a retail tobacco permit is defaced, destroyed, or lost, or the permittee 13 14 relocates the permittee's business, the department may issue a 15 duplicate retail tobacco permit to the permittee for a fee of \$5 16 per copy." 17 SECTION 6. Section 245-15, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 18 amended to read as follows:

19 "\$245-15 Disposition of revenues. All moneys collected
20 pursuant to this chapter shall be paid into the state treasury
21 as state realizations to be kept and accounted for as provided



6	a delivery sale or otherwise ship or transport, or cause to be
7	shipped or transported, any electronic smoking device in
8	connection with a delivery sale to any person under the age of
9	twenty one.
10	(b) A person who makes delivery sales shall not accept a
11	purchase or order from any person without first obtaining the
12	full name, birth date, and address of that person and verifying
13	the purchaser's age by:
14	(1) An independently operated third party database or
15	aggregate of databases that are regularly used by
16	government and businesses for the purpose of age and
17	identity verification and authentication;
18	(2) Receiving a copy of a government issued identification
19	card from the purchaser; or
20	(3) Requiring age and signature verification in the
21	shipment-process-and-upon and before actual delivery.



1	(c) The purchaser shall certify their age before
2	completing the purchaser's order.
3	(d) Any person who violates this section shall be fined
4	\$500 for the first offense. Any subsequent offenses shall
5	subject the person to a fine of no less than \$500 but no more
6	than \$2,000. Any person under twenty one years of age who
7	violates this section shall be fined \$10 for the first offense;
8	provided that any subsequent offense shall subject the person to
9	a fine of \$50, no part of which shall be suspended, or the
10	person shall be required to perform no less than forty eight
11	hours but no more than seventy two hours of community service
12	during hours when the person is not employed or attending
13	school.
14	(e) The department shall not adopt rules prohibiting
15	delivery sales.
16	(f) For the purposes of this section:
17	"Delivery sale" means any sale of an electronic smoking
18	device to a purchaser in the State where either:
19	(1) The purchaser submits the order for sale by means of a
20	telephonic or other method of voice transmission, the

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1	mail or any other delivery service, or the internet or
2	other online service; or
3	(2) The electronic smoking device is delivered by use of
4	the mail or any other delivery service.
5	The foregoing sales of electronic smoking devices shall
6	constitute a delivery sale regardless of whether the seller is
7	located within or without the State.
8	"Electronic smoking device" means any electronic product
9	that can be used to aerosolize and deliver nicotine or other
10	substances to the person inhaling from the device, including but
11	not limited to an electronic cigarette, electronic cigar,
12	electronic cigarillo, or electronic pipe, and any cartridge or
13	other component of the device or related product."]
14	SECTION 9. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
15	matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
16	begun before its effective date.
17	SECTION 10. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
18	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
19	SECTION 11. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2019.

#### Report Title:

Unlawful Shipment of E-liquid Products; Tobacco Products; E-liquid; License Fee; Retail Permit Fee; Health Education and Prevention Programs

#### Description:

Establishes the offense of unlawful shipment of e-liquid products. Includes e-liquid within the definition of "tobacco products", as used in the cigarette tax and tobacco tax law. Increases the license fee for persons engaged as a wholesaler or dealer of cigarettes and tobacco products. Increases the retail tobacco permit fee for retailers engaged in the retail sale of cigarettes and tobacco products. Allocates a portion of funds collected excise taxes on tobacco products to health education and prevention programs about the risks and dangers of the use of electronic smoking devices for youth. Repeals certain provisions of the Hawaii Revised Statutes relating to electronic smoking devices.

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
