### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DETECTOR-DOGS.

### **BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

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### PART I

SECTION 1. The devastating impact of invasive species to
Hawaii's agriculture, environment, natural resources, public
health, and economy cannot be denied or overstated. In
recognition of the consequences of the influx of invasive
species into the State, since 2008, the legislature has
supported and provided for the department of agriculture
biosecurity program.

9 The legislature finds that funding a detector-dog program 10 will improve the effectiveness of the State's biosecurity 11 program. The legislature further finds that a detector-dog 12 program will provide an important resource to improve 13 interdiction of invasive species coming into Hawaii. These dogs excel in the detection of flora, snakes, and aquatic animals and 14 15 in public relations. In airport baggage claim areas, the 16 presence of detector-dogs alone assists in deterring smuggling 17 of commodities through the passenger terminal area.

1	The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds for
2	detector-dogs in the Hawaii invasive species detection and

4	SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
5	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
6	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2019-2020 and the
7	same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
8	2020-2021 for detector-dogs in the Hawaii invasive species
9	detection and prevention program within the department of
10	agriculture.
11	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
12	of agriculture for purposes of this part.
13	PART II
14	SECTION 3. The legislature finds that over ninety per cent
15	of the more than two hundred thousand shipping cargo containers
16	that arrive in Hawaii each year are from the continental United
17	States. Only a small fraction of these containers, however, are
18	inspected by government agencies. Shipping companies conduct
19	random checks of less than five per cent of incoming cargo
20	containers, and these inspections are mainly conducted to ensure
21	that senders of cargo have been properly charged applicable

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tariffs and fees. The lack of sufficient cargo inspections
 means that there is ample opportunity for importing illegal
 fireworks and explosives to the State.

The legislature further finds that increased inspections need to be carefully crafted to avoid delays and inefficiencies in harbor operations that could impede commerce. One promising approach is the use of dogs to inspect cargo after arrival at the harbors and transfer for inter-island transport but prior to retrieval by recipients or distributors.

10 The purpose of this part is to increase capacity for random 11 inspections of incoming cargo for illegal fireworks and 12 explosives by increasing funding for detector-dog inspections 13 within the department of transportation and establishing a pilot 14 program that uses dogs to inspect cargo shipments after arrival 15 at state harbors and transfer for inter-island transport.

16 SECTION 4. (a) The departments of defense and 17 transportation, in consultation with federal and state agencies 18 and private organizations involved with shipping cargo into the 19 State and inter-island, shall develop and implement a three-year 20 pilot program to use dogs to inspect incoming cargo for illegal 21 fireworks and explosives sent to the State and between the

1 The program shall begin no later than January 1, 2020, islands. 2 and shall terminate on December 31, 2022. 3 = The pilot program established under subsection (a) (b) shall include the use of dogs to inspect incoming cargo that, 4 5 after arrival into the State and transfer for inter-island 6 transport, is to be transported from any harbor to: 7 A freight forwarder warehouse or other facility where (1) consolidated cargo in transport from any state harbor 8 9 to its final destination is segregated and prepared 10 for delivery; and Any other commercial facility where cargo containers 11 (2) 12 transported from any state harbor are unloaded. 13 SECTION 5. No later than twenty days prior to the 14 commencement of the regular sessions of 2021 and 2022, the department of transportation shall submit to the legislature a 15 16 report on the implementation of the pilot program established 17 pursuant to this part. The report shall include findings and 18 recommendations, including costs expended to date, the estimated 19 cost of operating the detector-dog program on a permanent basis, 20 and any proposed legislation.
