HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES THIRTIETH LEGISLATURE, 2020 STATE OF HAWAII H.B. NO. 1695

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STANDARDIZED TESTING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the No Child Left 2 Behind Act of 2001 and federal Department of Education Race to 3 the Top program of 2009 shifted education priorities from inquiry-based teaching to standardized testing. Following the 4 5 enactment of No Child Left Behind and the implementation of Race 6 to the Top, Hawaii's public school system spent important 7 resources of time, money, and energy to standardized testing at 8 the expense of authentic education.

9 The legislature further finds that an overemphasis on 10 standardized testing narrows academic curricula, reduces arts 11 and cultural education, causes teachers to teach to the test, 12 decreases vocational programming, and creates a climate of 13 compliance and fear among students, teachers, and 14 administrators. Moreover, research shows that the negative 15 impacts of standardized testing most directly harm students in 16 low-income communities.



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1	The legislature additionally finds that the Every Student
2	Succeeds Act of 2015, which replaced the No Child Left Behind
3	Act, permits states to reduce the amount of time that students
4	spend preparing for and taking standardized tests. Accordingly,
5	the purpose of this Act is to promote real-world learning
6	experiences for Hawaii's children by limiting the amount of time
7	students spend participating in standardized testing.
8	SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
10	and to read as follows:
11	"§302A- Standardized testing limitations; opt out. (a)
12	The department shall only administer standardized tests that are
13	required by law.
14	(b) Each complex area superintendent shall submit an
15	annual report to the board that includes the number of
16	standardized tests required for each school within the complex
17	area, and the amount of instructional time devoted to
18	standardized testing at each school within the complex area.
19	(c) The board shall notify students and their parents or
20	guardians of the right to opt out of participating in
21	standardized testing.

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1	(d) For purposes of this section, "standardized testing"
2	means any assessment that is scored in a consistent manner and
3	intended to measure a student's academic readiness, achievement
4	level, learning progress, or skill acquisition, including any
5	diagnostic, interim, or practice test used to prepare for such
6	an assessment."
7	SECTION 3. Section 302A-638, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8	amended to read as follows:
9	"[[]§302A-638[]] Evaluation of teachers and educational
10	officers. The department shall establish an evaluation program
11	for all teachers and educational officers. The evaluation shall
12	be performed at least once in each school year. The program
13	shall define the criteria for evaluation and assign
14	responsibilities for the application of the criteria. The
15	evaluation of a teacher or educational officer shall be on the
16	basis of efficiency, ability, and such other criteria as the
17	department shall determine [-]; provided that standardized tests
18	shall not be used to evaluate the performance of any teacher or
19	educational officer."
20	SECTION 4. The board of education shall amend any

21 necessary board policies relating to standardized testing or the



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evaluation of teachers and educational officers to conform with
the requirements of this Act.
SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Report Title: Education; Standardized Testing; Opt-out

Description:

Requires each complex area superintendent to submit an annual report to the Board of Education on the number of standardized tests required for each school within the complex area and the amount of instructional time devoted to such tests. Requires the Board of Education to inform students and their parents or guardians of ability to opt out of standardized tests. Removes standardized test results as an evaluation metric on performance reviews for teachers or educational officers.
