A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that although the State
- 2 has taken many important steps to make medical cannabis
- 3 available, further action is needed to ensure access. One way
- 4 is to expand the scope of professionals who may provide written
- 5 certification for qualifying patients to use medical cannabis.
- 6 The legislature further finds that, as determined by the state
- 7 board of naturopathic medicine, it is within the scope of
- 8 naturopathic practice that medical cannabis can be prescribed by
- 9 naturopathic physicians.
- 10 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to improve patient
- 11 access to medical cannabis by authorizing naturopathic
- 12 physicians to provide written certification for medical cannabis
- 13 use to qualifying patients.
- 14 SECTION 2. Chapter 329, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 15 amended by adding a new section to part III to be appropriately
- 16 designated and to read as follows:

1	"§329- Registration of naturopathic physicians; medical
2	cannabis; restrictions. (a) A naturopathic physician may
3	register pursuant to this part to provide written certifications
4	under part IX for the medical use of cannabis.
5	(b) All provisions of this part relating to practitioners
6	who prescribe controlled substances shall be applied to
7	naturopathic physicians providing written certifications under
8	part IX for the medical use of cannabis; provided that this
9	section shall not be construed to authorize any naturopathic
10	physician to manufacture, distribute, prescribe, dispense, or
11	conduct reverse distribution with any controlled substance
12	within this State."
13	SECTION 3. Chapter 455, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
14	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
15	and to read as follows:
16	"§455- Medical use of cannabis; authorization. Subject
17	to any requirements imposed by the department of public safety
18	and the federal Drug Enforcement Administration, a naturopathic
19	physician may register with the department of public safety
20	pursuant to part III of chapter 329 and may obtain any federal
21	Drug Enforcement Administration registration necessary to

- 1 provide written certifications under part IX of chapter 329 for
- 2 the medical use of cannabis."
- 3 SECTION 4. Section 329-121, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended as follows:
- 5 1. By adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
- 6 and to read:
- 7 ""Naturopathic physician" means a person who holds a
- 8 current license issued under chapter 455 to practice
- 9 naturopathic medicine and is registered pursuant to part III to
- 10 provide written certifications under this part for the medical
- 11 use of cannabis."
- 12 2. By amending the definition of "debilitating medical
- 13 condition" to read:
- ""Debilitating medical condition" means:
- 15 (1) Cancer, glaucoma, lupus, epilepsy, multiple sclerosis,
- 16 rheumatoid arthritis, positive status for human
- immunodeficiency virus, acquired immune deficiency
- syndrome, or the treatment of these conditions;
- 19 (2) A chronic or debilitating disease or medical condition
- or its treatment that produces one or more of the
- 21 following:

1	(A)	Cachexia or wasting syndrome;
2	(B)	Severe pain;
3	(C)	Severe nausea;
4	(D)	Seizures, including those characteristic of
5		epilepsy;
6	(E)	Severe and persistent muscle spasms, including
7		those characteristic of multiple sclerosis or
8		Crohn's disease; or
9	(F)	Post-traumatic stress disorder; or
10	(3) Any	other medical condition approved by the department
11	of h	ealth pursuant to administrative rules in response
12	to a	request from a physician, naturopathic physician,
13	or a	dvanced practice registered nurse or potentially
14	qual	ifying patient."
15	3. By am	ending the definition of "primary caregiver" to
16	read:	
17	""Primary	caregiver" means a person eighteen years of age
18	or older, othe	er than the qualifying patient and the qualifying
19	patient's phys	ician, naturopathic physician, or advanced
20	practice regis	tered nurse, who has agreed to undertake
21	responsibility	for managing the well-being of the qualifying

- 1 patient with respect to the medical use of cannabis. In the
- 2 case of a minor or an adult lacking legal capacity, the primary
- 3 caregiver shall be a parent, guardian, or person having legal
- 4 custody."
- 5 4. By amending the definition of "qualifying patient" to
- 6 read:
- 7 ""Qualifying patient" means a person who has been diagnosed
- 8 by a physician, naturopathic physician, or advanced practice
- 9 registered nurse as having a debilitating medical condition."
- 10 5. By amending the definition of "written certification"
- 11 to read:
- ""Written certification" means the qualifying patient's
- 13 medical records or a statement signed by a qualifying patient's
- 14 physician, naturopathic physician, or advanced practice
- 15 registered nurse, stating that in the physician's, naturopathic
- 16 physician's, or advanced practice registered nurse's
- 17 professional opinion, the qualifying patient has a debilitating
- 18 medical condition and the potential benefits of the medical use
- 19 of cannabis would likely outweigh the health risks for the
- 20 qualifying patient. The department of health may require,
- 21 through its rulemaking authority, that all written

1	certifica	tions comply with a designated form. "Written
2	certifica	tions" are valid for one year from the time of signing
3	provided	that the department of health may allow for the
4	validity	of any written certification for up to three years if
5	the quali	fying patient's physician, naturopathic physician, or
6	advanced	practice registered nurse states that the patient's
7	debilitat	ing medical condition is chronic in nature."
8	SECT	ION 5. Section 329-122, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended b	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
10	"(a)	Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the medical
11	use of ca	nnabis by a qualifying patient shall be permitted only
12	if:	
13	(1)	The qualifying patient has been diagnosed by a
14		physician, naturopathic physician, or advanced
15		practice registered nurse as having a debilitating
16		medical condition;
17	(2)	The qualifying patient's physician, naturopathic
18		physician, or advanced practice registered nurse has
19		certified in writing that, in the physician's,
20		naturopathic physician's, or advanced practice

registered nurse's professional opinion, the potential

21

1	benefits of the medical use of cannabis would likely
2	outweigh the health risks for the particular
3	qualifying patient; and
4	(3) The amount of cannabis possessed by the qualifying
5	patient does not exceed an adequate supply."
6	SECTION 6. Section 329-123, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
7	amended by amending subsections (a) and (b) to read as follows:
8	"(a) Physicians, naturopathic physicians, or advanced
9	practice registered nurses who issue written certifications
10	shall provide, in each written certification, the name, address,
11	patient identification number, and other identifying information
12	of the qualifying patient. The department of health shall
13	require, in rules adopted pursuant to chapter 91, that all
14	written certifications comply with a designated form completed
15	by or on behalf of a qualifying patient. The form shall require
16	information from [the]:
17	(1) The applicant[7];
18	(2) The primary caregiver[7]; and
19	(3) The physician, naturopathic physician, or advanced
20	practice registered nurse, as specifically required or
21	permitted by this chapter.

- 1 The form shall require the address of the location where
- 2 the cannabis is grown and shall appear on the registry card
- 3 issued by the department of health. The certifying physician,
- 4 naturopathic physician, or advanced practice registered nurse
- 5 shall be required to have a bona fide physician-patient
- 6 relationship, bona fide naturopathic physician-patient
- 7 relationship, or bona fide advanced practice registered nurse-
- 8 patient relationship, as applicable, with the qualifying
- 9 patient. All current active medical cannabis permits shall be
- 10 honored through their expiration date.
- 11 (b) Qualifying patients shall register with the department
- 12 of health. The registration shall be effective until the
- 13 expiration of the certificate issued by the department of health
- 14 and signed by the physician, naturopathic physician, or advanced
- 15 practice registered nurse. Every qualifying patient shall
- 16 provide sufficient identifying information to establish the
- 17 personal identities of the qualifying patient and the primary
- 18 caregiver. Qualifying patients shall report changes in
- 19 information within ten working days. Every qualifying patient
- 20 shall have only one primary caregiver at any given time. The

1	department of health shall issue to the qualifying patient a
2	registration certificate, and shall charge \$35 per year."
3	SECTION 7. Section 329-126, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4	amended by amending its title and subsection (a) to read as
5	follows:
6	"§329-126 Protections afforded to a treating physician,
7	naturopathic physician, or advanced practice registered nurse.
8	(a) No physician, naturopathic physician, or advanced practice
9	registered nurse shall be subject to arrest or prosecution,
10	penalized in any manner, or denied any right or privilege for
11	providing written certification for the medical use of cannabis
12	for a qualifying patient; provided that:
13	(1) The physician, naturopathic physician, or advanced
14	practice registered nurse has diagnosed the patient as
15	having a debilitating medical condition, as defined in
16	section 329-121;
17	(2) The physician, naturopathic physician, or advanced
18	practice registered nurse has explained the potential
19	risks and benefits of the medical use of cannabis, as
20	required under section 329-122;

1	(3)	The written certification is based upon the
2		physician's, naturopathic physician's, or advanced
3		practice registered nurse's professional opinion after
4		having completed a full assessment of the patient's
5		medical history and current medical condition made in
6		the course of a bona fide physician-patient
7		relationship, bona fide naturopathic physician-patient
8		relationship, or bona fide advanced practice
9		registered nurse-patient relationship, as applicable;
10		and
11	(4)	The physician, naturopathic physician, or advanced
12		practice registered nurse has complied with the
13		registration requirements of section 329-123."
14	SECT	ION 8. Section 329-128, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
15	amended b	y amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
16	"(b)	Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, fraudulent
17	misrepres	entation to a law enforcement official of any fact or
18	circumsta	nce relating to the issuance of a written certificate
19	by a phys	ician, naturopathic physician, or advanced practice
20	registere	d nurse not covered under section 329-126 for the
21	medical u	se of cannabis shall be a misdemeanor. This penalty

- 1 shall be in addition to any other penalties that may apply for
- 2 the non-medical use of cannabis."
- 3 SECTION 9. Section 455-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended as follows:
- 5 1. By adding two definitions to be appropriately inserted
- 6 and to read:
- 7 ""Cannabis" shall have the same meaning as in section
- **8** 329-121.
- 9 "Medical use" with respect to cannabis shall have the same
- 10 meaning as in section 329-121."
- 11 2. By amending the definition of "naturopathic formulary"
- 12 to read:
- ""Naturopathic formulary" means vitamins, minerals, dietary
- 14 supplements, botanical medicines, homeopathic medicines,
- 15 hormones, [and] those legend drugs consistent with naturopathic
- 16 medical practice [-], and cannabis for medical use; provided that
- 17 the naturopathic formulary shall not include any narcotic drugs
- 18 or other controlled substances, as defined in section 329-1."
- 19 SECTION 10. Section 455-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 20 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

1	" (a)	In addition to any other actions authorized by law,	
2	the board	shall have the power to deny, revoke, suspend, or	
3	refuse to	renew any license to practice naturopathic medicine	
4	applied f	or or issued by the board in accordance with this	
5	chapter, and to fine or otherwise discipline a licensee for any		
6	cause authorized by law, including but not limited to the		
7	following:		
8	(1)	Failing to meet or maintain the conditions and	
9		requirements necessary to qualify for the issuance of	
10		a license;	
11	(2)	Procuring, or aiding or abetting in procuring, a	
12		criminal abortion;	
13	(3)	Employing any person to solicit patients;	
14	(4)	Obtaining a fee on the assurance that a manifestly	
15		incurable disease can be permanently cured;	
16	(5)	Betraying a patient's confidence;	
17	(6)	Making any untruthful and improbable statement in	
18		advertising one's naturopathic practice or business;	
19	(7)	False, fraudulent, or deceptive advertising;	
20	(8)	Being habituated to the excessive use of drugs or	
21		alcohol; or being addicted to, dependent on, or an	

1		habitual user of a narcotic, barbiturate, amphetamine,
2		hallucinogen, or other drug having similar effects;
3	(9)	Practicing naturopathic medicine while the ability to
4		practice is impaired by alcohol, drug, physical
5		disability, or mental instability;
6	(10)	Procuring a license through fraud, misrepresentation,
7		or deceit or knowingly permitting an unlicensed person
8		to perform activities requiring a license;
9	(11)	Professional misconduct or gross carelessness or
10		manifest incapacity in the practice of naturopathic
11		medicine;
12	(12)	Conduct or practice contrary to recognized standard of
13		ethics of the naturopathic profession;
14	(13)	Using medical service or treatment which is
15		inappropriate or unnecessary;
16	(14)	Submitting to or filing with the board any notice,
17		statement, or other document required under this
18		chapter [which] that is false or untrue or contains
19		any material misstatement of fact, including any false
20		certification of compliance with the continuing
21		education requirement specified under section 455-8;

1	(15)	Failure to report to the board any disciplinary action
2		taken against the licensee in another jurisdiction
3		within thirty days after the disciplinary action
4		becomes final;
5	(16)	Using the title "physician" without clearly
6		identifying oneself as being a naturopathic physician;
7	(17)	Prescribing, administering, and dispensing
8		naturopathic formulary that are not included in the
9		formulary established by the board under section
10		455-6; [and]
11	(18)	Except as otherwise authorized under section 329-122,
12		violation of chapter 329, the uniform controlled
13		substances act, or any rule adopted thereunder; and
14	[(18)]	(19) Violation of any provision of this chapter or
15		rules adopted under this chapter."
16	SECT	ION 11. This Act does not affect rights and duties
17	that matu	red, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that
18	were begun	n before its effective date.
19	SECT	ION 12. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
20	and stric	ken. New statutory material is underscored.
21	SECT	ION 13. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
