## A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE OFFICE OF THE LONG-TERM CARE OMBUDSMAN PROGRAM.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 The legislature finds that in the executive SECTION 1. 2 office on aging reorganization of June 2015, the long-term care 3 ombudsman program was reduced in staff to only the director, 4 making Hawaii the only state in the country with a long-term 5 care ombudsman program staff of one. In 1995, a time when most 6 residents lived in nursing homes, the Institute of Medicine 7 recommended at a minimum one full-time paid ombudsman for every 8 two thousand long-term care residents. Hawaii has over twelve 9 thousand long-term care residents, most of whom live in the 10 community rather than in nursing homes, which creates greater 11 challenges. Under the 1995 recommendation, Hawaii should have a 12 minimum of six full-time long-term care ombudsmen.

13 The legislature also finds that the long-term care 14 ombudsman program may utilize volunteers. Currently there are 15 nine ombudsman volunteers. Consequently, the volunteer long-16 term care ombudsmen are not reimbursed for 1,248 hours of

service a year, which involves extensive travel to visit the
 long-term care residents in their districts.

3 The legislature further finds that in addition to visits to 4 long-term care facilities, long-term care ombudsmen respond to a multitude of complaints, engage in investigations, and provide 5 information, assistance, and referrals to long-term care 6 7 residents and their families. As of 2019, there were 1,406 long-term care facilities on Oahu, 36 facilities on Kauai, 72 8 9 facilities on Maui, and 182 facilities on Hawaii for a total of 10 1,696 facilities state-wide.

11 The long-term care ombudsman program lacks staff to visit 12 each facility on an annual basis, let alone also facilitate 13 resident and family councils, provide more community education, and work more closely with neighbor island county councils and 14 the area agencies on aging. The long-term care ombudsman 15 16 program requires resources to ensure that the neighbor islands' 17 kupuna and their families receive the same equal access to 18 services that have been provided by the long-term care ombudsman 19 program on Oahu since 1975.

20 The purpose of this Act is to establish and fund long-term21 care ombudsmen specialist positions, including positions for the

1 city and county of Oahu, county of Maui, county of Hawaii, and 2 county of Kauai, within the office of the long-term care 3 ombudsman. The long-term care ombudsman specialists will work 4 under the supervision of the long-term care ombudsman to achieve 5 the goals of the long-term care ombudsman program, as mandated 6 by the United States Administration on Aging through the Older 7 Americans Act.

8 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
10 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2020-2021 to
11 establish full-time equivalent ( FTE) ombudsman
12 specialist positions for the office of the long-term care
13 ombudsman.

14 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the executive15 office on aging for the purposes of this Act.

16 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on December 31,17 2059.
