# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FIREARMS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State has some
- 2 of the strongest qun safety laws in the nation, having received
- 3 an A-minus rating from the Giffords Law Center to Prevent Gun
- 4 Violence. However, the legislature also finds that the State
- 5 can improve its gun safety laws by prohibiting the new
- 6 acquisition and use of large-capacity magazines for firearms
- 7 that can hold more than ten rounds of ammunition. Existing
- 8 Hawaii law prohibits the use of these magazines with pistols but
- 9 not with long guns, such as rifles or shotguns.
- 10 According to the Giffords Law Center to Prevent Gun
- 11 Violence, large-capacity magazines have been used in all ten of
- 12 the deadliest mass shootings that have occurred in the last
- 13 decade. Mass shootings that involve large-capacity magazines
- 14 result in two to three times as many fatalities as other mass
- 15 shootings. By enabling a shooter to fire repeatedly without
- 16 needing to reload, these magazines significantly increase the
- 17 shooter's ability to quickly injure and kill large numbers of

- 1 people. For example, using an assault weapon and a drum
- 2 magazine containing one hundred rounds of ammunition, the
- 3 perpetrator of the 2019 mass shooting in Dayton, Ohio, was able
- 4 to fire at least forty-one rounds of ammunition in less than
- 5 thirty seconds. As a result, the shooter was able to kill nine
- 6 people and wound twenty-six more.
- 7 Further, the legislature recognizes that the amount of time
- 8 a shooter needs to reload a weapon can be a critical factor in
- 9 allowing would-be victims to escape and for law enforcement or
- 10 other persons to intervene. In the 2011 mass shooting in
- 11 Tucson, Arizona, six people were killed and thirteen others were
- 12 wounded, including United States representative Gabrielle
- 13 Giffords. Fortunately, the shooting was interrupted when the
- 14 perpetrator stopped to reload his weapon and was tackled by a
- 15 bystander. Similarly, during the 2018 mass shooting at Marjory
- 16 Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, students were
- 17 able to flee down a stairwell as the shooter paused to reload
- 18 his weapon.
- 19 The purpose of this Act is to reduce gun violence in the
- 20 State by:

2	ammunition or any projectile component thereof designed or					
3	intended to explode or segment upon impact with its target.					
4	(b) Any person who installs, removes, or alters a firearm					
5	part with the intent to convert the firearm to an automatic					
6	firearm shall be deemed to have manufactured an automatic					
7	firearm in violation of subsection (a).					
8	(c) The manufacture, possession, sale, barter, trade,					
9	gift, transfer, or acquisition of detachable ammunition					
10	magazines with a capacity in excess of ten rounds [which are					
11	designed for or capable of use with a pistol] is prohibited[+]:					
12	provided that a detachable ammunition magazine with a capacity					
13	in excess of ten rounds may be:					
14	(1) Possessed by a person who legally possessed the					
15	magazine prior to the effective date of Act ;					
16	(2) Acquired by a person by means of inheritance from					
17	another person who legally possessed the magazine					

prior to the effective date of Act ; or

(3) Acquired, possessed, and used by a law enforcement

agency or duly authorized law enforcement officer for

- 1 This subsection shall not apply to magazines originally
- 2 designed to accept more than ten rounds of ammunition [which]
- 3 that have been modified to accept no more than ten rounds and
- 4 [which] that are not capable of being readily restored to a
- 5 capacity of more than ten rounds.
- 6 (d) This section shall not apply to the manufacture,
- 7 transportation, possession, sale, or rental of blank-firing
- 8 assault weapons and the weapon's respective attachments by
- 9 persons authorized or permitted to acquire and possess these
- 10 weapons or attachments for the purpose of rental for use solely
- 11 as props for a motion picture, television, or digital video
- 12 production or entertainment event.
- [<del>(d)</del>] (e) Any person violating subsection (a) or (b) shall
- 14 be guilty of a class C felony and shall be imprisoned for a term
- 15 of five years without probation. Any person violating
- 16 subsection (c) shall be guilty of a misdemeanor except when a
- 17 detachable magazine prohibited under this section is possessed
- 18 while inserted into a [pistol] firearm in which case the person
- 19 shall be guilty of a class C felony."

- 1 SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 2 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 3 begun before its effective date.
- 4 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 5 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 6 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

#### Report Title:

Firearms; Large-Capacity Magazine; Prohibition

#### Description:

Prohibits the manufacture, possession, sale, barter, trade, gift, transfer, or acquisition of detachable ammunition magazines with a capacity in excess of ten rounds, regardless of the type of firearm with which the magazine is compatible. Allows possession of large-capacity magazines that were legally possessed prior to the effective date of this Act. Allows acquisition by means of inheritance of large-capacity magazines that were legally in possession prior to the effective date of this Act. Allows possession and use by law enforcement agencies and officers. Excepts use of blank-fire assault weapons and attachments for use solely as props for a motion picture, television, or digital video production or entertainment event. (Proposed SD2)
