A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII PROMISE PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the University of 2 Hawaii's Hawaii graduation initiative is a systemwide strategic 3 initiative endorsed by the board of regents with a goal to 4 increase the educational capital of the State by increasing 5 students' educational participation in and completion of a postsecondary education, particularly for Native Hawaiians, low-6 7 income students, and those from underserved regions and 8 populations, and preparing them for success in the workforce and 9 their communities.

10 The legislature further finds that an educated labor force 11 and engaged citizenry are essential in today's global, 12 knowledge-based economy. Across the nation, states have set 13 ambitious goals to boost college completion rates. Hawaii's own 14 "55 by '25" campaign goal focuses on increasing the percentage of working-age adults with two- or four-year degrees to 15 16 fifty-five per cent by 2025. According to the most recent data available, forty-three per cent of Hawaii's working age adults 17



currently have a postsecondary degree. As the State's sole
 system of public higher education, the University of Hawaii is
 committed to doing its part to close the State's projected
 educational attainment gap.

5 In April 2016, the Institute for Research on Higher 6 Education at the University of Pennsylvania graduate school of 7 education issued a study that analyzed college costs in relation 8 to family income level. The study revealed that higher 9 education has gone from expensive to unaffordable for most lowand middle-income families. According to this same study, 10 11 Hawaii ranked third in the nation for overall college affordability, and the University of Hawaii community colleges 12 13 are the most affordable public two-year institutions in the 14 nation.

15 The report further acknowledged that despite Hawaii's 16 commendable overall college affordability ranking, attending 17 college is a big expense for families earning less than \$30,000 18 annually; Hawaii's financial aid policies are not fully able to 19 alleviate costs for these families; and the State provides 20 minimal need-based aid to students attending public 21 institutions. Since this report, the University of Hawaii has



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implemented the Hawaii community college promise program, which is a need-based award intended to be applied toward the unmet direct cost needs of qualified students enrolled at any community college campus of the University of Hawaii. Awards are contingent upon funding and amounts are determined by the individual students' Free Application for Federal Student Aid information.

8 Financial aid through federal Pell Grants; University of 9 Hawaii and private scholarships; the Servicemen's Readjustment 10 Act of 1944, as amended, otherwise known as the "GI Bill," for 11 service members and veterans; and employers covers much of the 12 cost for need-based students. However, cost is still a barrier for certain need-based students, especially for those who do not 13 14 qualify for the Hawaii community college promise program because 15 they are enrolled at one of the University of Hawaii's four-year 16 campuses.

17 The purpose of this Act is to:

18 (1) Expand the Hawaii community college promise program to
19 provide scholarships for the unmet direct cost needs
20 of qualified undergraduate students enrolled at a
21 four-year campus of the University of Hawaii; and



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1 Provide an appropriation to establish and implement (2)2 the expanded program. 3 SECTION 2. Section 304A-506, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended to read as follows: 5 "[+] §304A-506[+] Hawaii [community college] promise 6 program; established. (a) Notwithstanding section 304A-501, 7 there is established the Hawaii [community college] promise 8 program to be administered by the board of regents. The program 9 shall provide scholarships for the unmet direct cost needs of qualified students enrolled at any [community college] campus of 10 11 the University of Hawaii. 12 (b) A student enrolled at a community college campus shall be eligible for scholarship consideration for a maximum of eight 13 14 semesters if the student: 15 Oualifies for Hawaii resident tuition; (1)Completes and submits the Free Application for Federal 16 (2) Student Aid for each academic year and accepts all 17 federal and state aid, grants, scholarships, and other 18 19 funding sources that do not require repayment; Is enrolled in a classified degree or certificate 20 (3) 21 program with six or more credits per semester;

12	(1)	Qualifies for Hawaii resident tuition;
13	(2)	Completes and submits the Free Application for Federal
14		Student Aid for each academic year and accepts all
15		federal and state aid, grants, scholarships, and other
16		funding sources that do not require repayment;
17	(3)	Is enrolled in a classified degree or certificate
18		program with twelve or more credits per semester;
19	(4)	Maintains satisfactory academic progress, as defined
20		by federal requirements established pursuant to Title
21		IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended,



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1	and determined by the campus at which the student is	
2	enrolled; and	
3	(5) Has been determined by the campus to have unmet direct	
4	cost needs.	
5	[(c)] <u>(d)</u> Scholarships shall be awarded to the extent	
6	possible based on available funds and on a greatest need basis.	
7	An award granted to a student shall be equal to the student's	
8	unmet direct cost need, based on the Free Application for	
9	Federal Student Aid calculation of need, less the amounts	
10	available to the student from Pell grants and other	
11	scholarships.	
12	$\left[\frac{d}{d}\right]$ (e) To maintain a scholarship under this section $\left[\frac{d}{d}\right]$	
13	a] <u>:</u>	
14	(1) A student enrolled at a community college shall meet	
15	the requirements of subsection (b)(4) $[-]$; and	
16	(2) A student enrolled in an undergraduate program at a	
17	University of Hawaii campus, other than a community	
18	college campus, shall meet the requirements of	
19	subsection (c)(4).	
20	$\left[\frac{(e)}{(f)}\right]$ As used in this section, "direct cost" means any	
21	cost directly related to a student's education, including	



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1 tuition; educational fees; and the costs of books, supplies, and 2 transportation between the student's dwelling and the student's 3 campus."

4 SECTION 3. Section 304A-2102, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5 amended to read as follows:

6 "[4]\$304A-2102[4] Hawaii [community college] promise
7 program subaccount. (a) There is established the Hawaii
8 [community college] promise program subaccount within the
9 University of Hawaii general fund. Moneys in the subaccount
10 shall be used to provide financial assistance to qualified
11 students through Hawaii [community college] promise program
12 scholarships under section 304A-506.

(b) The University of Hawaii shall submit a report to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session regarding the subaccount. The report shall include but not be limited to the number of scholarships provided under the Hawaii [community college] promise program during the preceding year.

19 (c) This subaccount is not intended to provide loans or20 keep track of payback provisions."
